# Cup and League Double for Roos F.C

Unbeaten throughout the season, Roos 'A' have made history by pulling off the Cup and League Double, a magnificent achievement by any standards.

# The Piper Cup

The Cup Final against Beverley Borough on 17th April was a memorable occasion. The weather was perfect - dry and pleasantly warm - and the Boothferry Park pitch was in very good condition after recent heavy rain. The result, 6 - 4 to Roos after extra time and penalties, reflected the tightness of an evenly-matched game in which Roos just had the final edge.

Having lost the toss and kicked off towards the South Stand end, Roos immediately faced heavy pressure from lively and skilful Beverley Borough forwards. As they have done all season, however, the Roos defence proved equal to the task and gradually subdued these early assaults to enable the midfield and front players to start to take control.

#### First-half Lead

With Dave Hampton and Geoff Newton prompting well, the front three of Mike Clarkson, Sean Royce, and Dave Cowell were causing Beverley a lot of problems and it was no surprise when Roos took the lead in the 25th minute.

After sustained pressure, during which Sean Royce hit a shot just past the post, the Beverley defence was at sixes and sevens. Dave Hampton picked up a poor clearance and threaded an excellent through ball behind some static defenders for an ever-eager Mike Clarkson to run on and leave the goalkeeper with no chance against a fine left-foot shot on the run.

After this goal, both defences got on top and play was confined mainly to midfield with only the odd bit of goalmouth activity. However, this was never a dull game and both sides showed plenty of skill and endeavour. At half time Roos were leading 1 - 0,

# Second-half Reply

The second half continued in the same way, with the back four of Chris Hodgson, George Bilton, Andy Bailey and Stu Blenkin generally in control, ably

supported by Pete Dearing in goal, and it seemed that the one goal would prove sufficient to win the match.

However, Beverley had other ideas and snatched an equaliser with only six minutes left. The Roos defence, which had been looking so solid, suddenly relaxed to leave two Beverley forwards unmarked from a far-post cross and one of them gratefully accepted the opportunity to head in from six yards. This goal, so near the end of the game, allowed Beverley to take the initiative and the spectators must have thought Roos would wilt - but they didn't.

# Recovery Frustrated

Showing once more tremendous character in fighting back against adversity, Roos got back on top and should have taken the lead again and won the match in the last minutes.

George Bilton, who had a great game throughout, set Dave Hampton free on the edge of the Beverley penalty area. Dave jinked brilliantly round the centre back and found himself one-on-one with the goalkeeper eight yards out. However, the keeper spread himself well at Dave's feet and made a marvellous save. Ninety-nine times out of a hundred Dave would have scored from such a situationbut on this occasion it was not to be and the game went to extra time.

# Missed Chances in Extra Time

Both sides had winning opportunities in the extra half hour but the finishing from both was rather indifferent. In almost the last minute, however, the last chance fell to Beverley.

A high ball from midfield found the Roos central defence in no man's land and left a Beverley forward with a clear run on goal. Fortunately for Roos, a combination of his tired legs, a difficult bouncing ball, and pressure from chasing defenders forced him to hit his shot over the bar.

So the game had to be decided on penalty kicks, five for each side.

# Trial by Penalty

Pete Dearing won the toss and elected to take the first penalty : if Roos scored first, the pressure

would always be on the opposition. The strategy was effective, Andy Bailey scoring the first goal. The first Beverley player also scored: 1 - 1. Dave Hampton scored: 2 - 1. Then, from the second Beverley penalty, Pete made an excellent save, which proved crucial. Chris Hodgson strode up to hammer home his kick to put Roos 3 - 1 up and now it only needed Geof Newton and Mick Clarkson to score theirs for Roos to gain the victory. This they duly did to give Roos the Cup. Dave Hampton won the man-of-thematch award, which he richly deserved.

# Reward - and Disappointment

This was an excellent all-round performance against quality opposition - the best team Roos have faced this season. All the players deserve commendation for their performance, not only in this game but throughout the season, during which their application has been excellent,

Commiserations here for perhaps the most disappointed person on the day, Nick Derbyshire, who has had to miss the latter part of the season because of a hip injury. However, he may have found himself a new vocation as a T.V. cameraman, to judge by the quality of his video pictures from the dressing room both before and after the match.

# Top of the League

Going into this Cup Final, Roos knew that they had clinched the League title the previous Sunday, After drawing with White Print 1 - 1, beating Swift Caravans 2 -0, and picking up two points when Kelvin Hall were unable to raise a team, Roos needed just two further points from their last three matches to become League Champions. In fact, only one game was needed, On 10th April at home Roos defeated a ten-man North Bank Police side by 6 - 0 to go into the Cup Final knowing that their double was on.

### The Record

In their last match of all on 24th April, Roos beat Saints 3 -1 to finish the season unbeaten. This is a magnificent achievement and each and every player deserves immense credit. The squad is ; Andy Bailey, George Bilton, Stu Blenkin, Mick Clarkson, Dave Cowell, Nick Derbyshire, John Dearing, Pete Dearing (Captain), Dave Hampton, Chris Hodgson, Geoff Newton, Sean Royce, Gary Thompson, and Richard Young.

#### Roos Parish Council

Councillor G.E.Winter chaired the meeting of 11th April. All other members were present except Councillors Grant and Quarmby, who sent their apologies. County Councillor Croft also attended.

# Minutes

The April Minutes were approved.

<u>Pinfold Lane</u>, Referring to the complaint from Mr H.Cutler at the previous meeting, the Chairman reported that the state of Pinfold Lane had improved. The Clerk said that surface water had gone after Mr T.Calvert had cleared a ditch in a nearby field.

Roads and Footpaths. The Area Surveyor had inspected some roads and footpaths with the Chairman and Councillor Quarmby. He had written to the Clerk about the dyke on Main Street opposite the school; danger to the footpath would be removed by piping a short section of the ditch north of the white fence.

<u>Verge Damage</u>, The Chairman referred to damage caused opposite the Roos Arms by brewery delivery lorries,

# Correspondence

Condition of footpaths. The Clerk had written to Humberside Technical Services about footpath damage caused by horses. Replying for the Director, Mr S.Shuttleworth said that notices would be placed at each end of Footpath 17 (past Ivy Row), i.e. at the access points from Rectory Road and Coltman Row. As to Dove Lane, he said that it was not a footpath but "an unclassified county road" under the care of the Area Surveyor at Hedon; as such, it was open to all traffic and prohibition notices were not permitted.

Councillor Priest explained why one horse had used Dove Lane, and apologised on behalf of the rider. He stressed, however, that the condition of Dove Lane would remain unacceptable until there was adequate drainage to get rid of surface water.

County Councillor Croft said that it was possible to obtain details of rights of way from the specialist section at County Hall,

Councillor Helliwell referred to the footpath from

Dent's Garth down to the church, Mr Peter Robinson had voluntarily cleared the mud to expose the underlying gravel and had cut overgrown parts back to well-defined edges. Local residents wanted to record their appreciation of Mr Robinson's public spirit. The Parish Council warmly supported the sentiment. Since the land was thought to belong to the church, it was agreed to ask the Parochial Church Council to maintain the path in its restored condition.

Siting of Intensive Livestock Units. The Director of Development had sent a copy of a letter he had written to the Secretary of State for the Environment. The letter argued against government proposals to permit livestock units to be sited closer to housing areas — as close as 400 metres. The Parish Council supported the Director's arguments.

Roos Village Plan. Before his departure, County Councillor Croft said that the Village Plan had been referred to the County Council. He asked if the Parish Council wished to make any observations to the County Council. The Parish Council said that they were on the whole satisfied with the Plan, though they had protested at the exclusion from the final version of the specific limit of houses on the land south of Dove Lane (Site C), a restriction clearly set out in the consultative version of the Plan.

Public Entertainment Licence, Elms Farm, Notification had been received of an application for a licence by Mr A.R.Grant in connection with a Barn Dance and Barbecue, 13th - 14th May, on behalf of the Playing Field Committee.

North End Cottage, North End (Mr J.L.Beal), Replacement of a flat roof with a pitched roof, Heathcote, Main Street, (Mr K.Richardson), Extension to provide new bathroom, kitchen, and double garage, The Old Rectory, Road. (Mr P.Turner, Eurographics, Ltd), Internal alterations and change of use from business premises to a home for the elderly, One or two councillors had misgivings about such use but the majority thought the building suitable and saw

# Outstanding Items

The Chairman, though disagreeing with some items on the list supplied by Councillor Helliwell, said that he was impressed by its detail and presentation.

# 1. Roos Beck

Councillor Helliwell said that past discussion had blurred two issues that, though related, could be considered in turn; the clearing of rubbish from the beck and the possibility of piping it.

As to clearing the debris, both the Borough Council and the Water Authority insisted that riparian owners were responsible. Without appeal to some higher authority, this ruling would have to be accepted.

As to piping the beck, not all landowners might want it piped — and perhaps none would want to share the cost. However, Mr Colin Hogg, for the Borough, had said at a Village Plan meeting that eventually the beck probably would be piped. Piping would certainly cure the problem of debris.

The Chairman spoke of the high cost of such work and said that the Borough's officers did not favour piping a long section since any blockages were then harder to deal with. Councillor Clark and others thought that the Roos Beck issue could not be settled at a stroke. It was agreed not to pursue it further at present.

# 2, Litter

Councillor Bowden argued that the provision of proper litter bins was long overdue. He produced a current catalogue of various designs. Interest was shown in a free-standing (i.e. post-mounted) model with a hood. The basic cost was £34,00 and in addition a liner would be needed. Councillor Bowden urged the need for several such bins. It was agreed that he should seek the advice of cleansing department staff as to the model they would prefer to handle and that he should report back to the next meeting.

It was decided to defer other outstanding items to the next meeting.

# Any Other Business

Roadsweeping. Councillor Priest referred to a previous complaint that the road lorry could not sweep Pilmar Garth effectively for lack of space to manoeuvre. He reported that the lorry had swept the road; difficulties arose when access to the gutter was obstructed by parked cars.

Site near The Chestnuts, Councillor Bowden said that he understood the building plot near The Chestnuts had been sold, It would be necessary to ensure that the new owner observed the restrictions and conditions when the site was developed,

<u>Grass-cutting</u>, Councillor Bowden asked when grass verges were to be cut; the grass was growing fast and an early cut was needed to keep it under control.

The Chairman thought that the first cut was normally later. The authorities would not want to cut the grass while bulbs were in flower - the daffodils on the Withernsea road, for example, were a welcome enhancement of the village approaches. Councillor Bowden agreed but said that he was talking about grass-cutting within the village proper where no bulbs were in flower and where the grass was in danger of becoming long and straggly.

# Annual General Meeting

The Chairman pointed out that the next meeting on 9th May would be preceded by the A.G.M., at which officers for 1988 - 9 would be elected.

# Public Session

A resident complained that debris in Roos Beck near Ivy Row was causing an offensive smell.

There was further discussion of verge damage by brewery lorries delivering to The Roos Arms, Some action was urged. The situation should be monitored, If necessary, a letter should be sent to the brewery.
