FLY -TIPPERS BEWARE

As a direct result of the flooding in 2007 the Parish Council are asking **HOUSEHOLDERS** to ensure their waste is disposed of properly, or risk an appearance in court.

Local authorities have powers under the Environmental Act of 1990 to prosecute "Fly-Tippers".

<u>Section 33, Environmental Protection Act 1990</u> <u>Unlawful Deposit of Waste (Fly-tipping)</u>

Under section 33 of the Environmental Protection Act 1990 a person shall not deposit controlled waste, or knowingly cause or knowingly permit controlled waste to be deposited in or on any land unless a waste management licence authorising the deposit is in force and the deposit is in accordance with the licence;

The penalty on summary conviction for fly-tipping is:

- (a) On summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding £50,000 and/or imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months.
- (b) On conviction on indictment, to an unlimited fine and/or imprisonment for a term not exceeding five years.

Section 34 (Duty of Care), Environmental Protection Act 1990

Since 21st November 2005, householders now have a responsibility to make sure their waste is disposed of in a correct manner and is only passed to an authorised person (Registered Waste Carrier). Those who do not take reasonable measures to do so can be prosecuted and fined.

The aim of this duty is to stop people paying a "bloke in the pub" or disreputable contractor to take their waste away.

The penalty for failing this duty can result in a fine of up to £5,000 in a Magistrates Court or, an unlimited fine in a Crown Court if the waste is discovered fly-tipped, even if this person has paid someone in good faith to take the waste to the tip.

THE ABOVE ACTS ALSO APPLY TO RIPARIAN OWNERSHIP WHERE DYKES RUN ADJACENT TO OR ON THEIR LAND.

If anyone witnesses someone fly-tipping waste, or wishes to report fly-tipping, they should contact the Council on 01482 393939.

The Roos Parish Council is asking all Parishioners to respect the Environmental Act and furthermore we urge all residents to report any incidents with immediate effect in order to help keep the Parish in a clean and tidy manner.

Cookery Corner

Country Pate

Ingredients

Serves 4

5-6 rashers streaky bacon

15g/½ oz plain flour

15g/½ oz butter

150ml/¹/₄ pint milk

100g/4oz belly pork

100g/4oz pigs liver

25g/1oz onion

100g/4oz sausage meat

1 clove garlic (finely chopped or crushed)

2 tablespoons dry sherry or brandy, optional

Salt and pepper

1 bay leaf

Method

- Remove rind from streaky bacon. Flatten each rasher with blade of knife, then use to line a 500ml/1pint pate mould or loaf tin.
- Place the flour, butter and milk in a saucepan and heat, whisking continuously, until sauce thickens.
- Mince the pork, liver, onion, and sausage meat together twice and add to sauce. Stir in the garlic and sherry. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- **4.** Turn the pate mixture into the lined mould. Top with a bay leaf. Cover with a lid or aluminium foil. Stand in a roasting tin half filled with water. Bake mark 4. 180C/350F or fan oven 160C for one hour.
- 5. Let the pate become cold in the tin before turning out then leave for a day or overnight in a cold place for flavours to develop. Serve sliced with hot toast.

Alec's Patch By Alec Dodson

Now is a good time to plant any new shrubs and trees and also re-site plants you wish to move. The soil is still

Rake leaves into piles, cover compost to keep warm. Rose leaves are best removed to avoid spreading

Check stakes and tree ties to make sure there is no rubbing on the branches. Stakes must not be any higher than the first branch.

Greenhouses:- Clean the glass inside and out with warm water and detergent.

Ventilate on sunny days but close up early to conserve warmth.





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Roos Parish Council Meeting 12th November 2007

All Councillors were present except Councillor Smales

The October minutes were approved. Extracts below.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

Proposed conservation areas within the parish

Receipt of an amendment to the boundary together with associated plan for the proposed Roos South Conservation Area following representations made by the Council was reported from Mr Atkinson of ERYC.

It was resolved that the proposed amendment be accepted.

Members further considered the proposed Tunstall Conservation Area and upon being put to a secret ballot the result was three in favour and three against the establishment of proposed conservation area for Tunstall.

It was resolved that ERYC be informed of the Council's decision in the two matters.

Proposed sale of land at Manor Farm Tunstall

The Clerk reported receipt of a letter and draft Statutory Declaration from David McNamara, Commissioner for Oaths. The letter confirmed his proposed charges of £305.50 including vat, which was accepted by the Council and subject to minor amendments to the draft and proof of identification requirements, it was agreed to ask Mr McNamara to proceed with proving title to the land with the Land Registry.

Parish Plan

It was reported that all the members had still not fully studied and considered the substantial Quality Council documentation which was circulated previously and it was agreed to defer further consideration until the next meeting.

Flooding within the parish

Receipt of acknowledgement letters from the Environment Agency and Yorkshire Water were reported in response to the circular letter prepared by the Chairman and Councillor Grant in relation to the area between Dimples Cottage and Roseneath on South End, Roos. In particular, the response from Yorkshire Water stated that a survey would be undertaken of the surface water drainage in the South End area, which was expected to take place within the next four weeks.

Vacancy for a Councillor

The Clerk reported receipt of a letter from ERYC which confirmed that a request to fill the vacancy by way of an election had not been received within the prescribed time period and that the Council could now fill the vacancy by co-option.

It was agreed that suitable notice be displayed in the notice boards inviting applications to fill the vacancy for consideration at the next meeting.

Grassed area in Pilmar Lane

The Chairman reported that Mr Bailey had agreed to continue mowing the area.

Kerb in Hodgson Lane

It was reported that the Area Engineer had agreed to attend a site meeting on the 15th October and it was agreed that the Chairman accompany the Clerk at the meeting.

CORRESPONDENCE

ERYC budget conferences 2008/9

An invitation for up to two delegates to attend one of the three ERYC budget conferences was received and it was resolved that Councillors Coupe and Cracknell attend with first choice being Beverley Leisure Centre on the 19th November with second choice of 26th November at Bridlington North Library.

Jelly Tots Parent and Toddler Group

Receipt of a letter from the Secretary of the group was reported requesting financial assistance towards the purchase of play mats for pre-school children.

Councillors Coupe and Ward declared an interest in the matter and took no part in the ensuing discussion.

The Chairman reported on the current financial situation where an invoice from ERYC had been received for £1467.10 for the recharge of election costs in May. He further confirmed that the Clerk had disputed the excessive amount as indeed other local Councils had and suggested that until the disputed invoice was resolved, the request from Jelly Tots be deferred for the time being. It was agreed that this course of action be taken.

PLANNING

Applications

Erection of a conservatory to the rear and boundary fence at 16 Hinch Garth Roos for Mr & Mrs Lavendar

Members recommended approval for the above. Change of use from agricultural land to domestic curtilage at land east of 1 Pinfold Lane Roos for Mr & Mrs D Murrell

Members recommended approval for the above with a proviso that the land is used only as a garden amenity with no infill development.

Decisions

The following applications were granted by ERYC:-

Conservatory extention to front and side at The Bungalow Tower Road Hilston.

Harish matters Minutes of The Roos Parish Council Meeting

Erection of general purpose agricultural building to replace existing piggery at Kiln House, Kiln House Lane.

The following applications were refused by ERYC:-Erection of a dwelling at former bungalow Rectory Road, Roos.

Proposed wind turbines within the parish.

A letter was received from ERYC setting out the timetable for site visits and pre-committee presentations on 16th & 17th October followed by consideration of the application by ERYC Planning Committee on the 18th October.

FLOODING WITHIN THE PARISH

Receipt of further letters from ERYC were reported relevant to the detailed review being undertaken into flooding in the East Riding. The letters further confirmed that it was expected that the findings would be reported to the Council in May 2008 after wide consultations with all interested parties.

In relation to the Emergency Plan Committee, Councillor Cracknell sought the Council's approval for a contribution of £100.00 towards the printing costs of a questionnaire which would be circulated throughout the parish. The request was approved and it was further agreed that the Chairman and Councillor Cracknell submit the bid for the £5000 available to the parish to bring relief to the community and that the proposals by the Emergency Plan Committee requiring finance be circulated amongst members for their consideration.

Footpath No.5 - blocked off alongside farmer's field. Rectory Road - fly-tipping.

PUBLIC SESSION

Mrs Cook referred to the matter of riparian owners being notified of their responsibilities with regard to Roos Beck and the Chairman confirmed that the matter was in hand.

Mr Midgley asked of the situation with regard to the repair of the bus shelter at Tunstall and also as to the question of rumours of closing Seaside Lane, Tunstall. The Chairman agreed to once again approach Mr Dry relevant to the bus shelter and that enquiries would be made of ERYC in respect of Seaside Lane.
