UPDATE on future FLOOD PREVENTION

The Roos Parish Council have recently acquired the services of Engineer Simon Taylor to undertake a study of the drainage problems in the village.

Studies are underway and Yorkshire Water have been in the village once again in December, to be shown the problem areas. In the short term, they have agreed to add a new Manhole Inspection Chamber, to the area of the Roos Beck running through the garden of the property named The Paddock, situated to the south end of the village.

Further inspections are planned with ERYC and together with Mr Taylor's findings it is very much hoped that appropriate improvements can be made as soon as possible.

ERYC are also carrying out their own review of the June floods and a report is expected at the end of May 2008. The Roos Parish Council have sent several letters to the Review Committee explaining in detail our serious concerns.

The Roos Beck at the present moment in time is clear and running freely, and riparian owners have been contacted regarding their responsibilities.

ERYC have agreed to maintain and regularly inspect two of the five grilles situated along the Roos Beck. These grilles are situated in Lamb Lane and on Rectory Road. The remaining three grilles at the Church, Dove Lane and at Sycamore House are the responsibility of the riparian owners.

Councillors Winter, Grant and Dodson have agreed to regularly inspect the beck and the five grilles and the Roos Parish Council would appreciate that any blockages that cannot be cleared by riparian owners be reported as soon as possible, in order that they can be dealt with and removed with a minimum of delay.

INCREASING TREE COVER IN ROOS PARISH - CAN YOU HELP?

Roos Parish Council is examining ways by which tree cover in the area can be increased, and your help could be vital.

David Winter, Chairman of Roos Parish Council explains; "Our Parish Plan clearly outlined the value of increasing tree cover in our parish and identified plenty of sites to plant individual trees which we are currently considering. However, we are also keen to see local landowners in the parish consider increasing woodland cover in our area and we want to help them to do this. Also it is an important factor in helping prevent future flooding problems."

The Parish Council is currently working with HEYwoods, the tree and woodland initiative for the East Riding of Yorkshire and Hull area, to help deliver the tree-related objectives of the Parish Plan.

Stephen Robinson of HEYwoods said "We are pleased to be working with Roos Parish Council to increase tree cover in the area. There are opportunities for local landowners to take advantage of a variety of grants available to plant areas of new woodland. The HEYwoods Initiative has a wealth of experience of working with landowners to develop woodland schemes and also in helping them to secure the money to do so. We would be pleased for landowners in Roos area to contact us to look at any potential opportunities that may be available to them."

New Season begins.

Order seeds, Gladioli, onion and potato sets or visit Garden Centres, not forgetting garden sundries such as canes, tree stakes, pea sticks, pots and seed trays. If you already have pots and seed trays from previous season, clean well using Jeyes Fluid. Leave for 30 minutes then rinse thoroughly. Keep away from children and pets.

Lawn Mowers & Cultivators

These should be sent for servicing now to avoid delays when they are required.

Rhubarb

Cover existing rhubarb with a deep bucket or bin with the bottom removed and used as a lid. Make a circle of slug pellets or sharp grit around the base, then fill the bin with straw. Rhubarb should be ready by the end of February, beginning of March. (Happy Crumbling)

Beware Herons

January is the coldest month and any cold snap encourages Herons to visit garden ponds. Use netting where possible or circle ponds with fine fishing line on 18" canes to deter access.

Cookery Corner

Pineapple Pudding

Ingredients

Serves 4 - 6

4-6 trifle sponges

425g/15oz canned pineapple pieces

25g/1oz butter

25g/1oz plain flour

450ml/¾ pint milk

2 size 3 eggs (seperated)

100g/4oz caster sugar

Method

- **1.** Cut sponge cakes in half and place in bottom of ovenproof dish. Soak with pineapple juice.
- 2. Place pineapple pieces on top.
- **3.** Melt butter, add flour, cook for 1-2 mins. Gradually add milk, bring to boil, stir continuously. Simmer for one minute.
- **4.** Cool sauce and beat in egg yolks. Pour over sponges and pineapple.
- **5.** Meringue whisk egg whites until stiff, gradually beat in half the sugar and fold in remaining sugar. Spread or pipe meringue on top or around edges of pudding. Bake mark 3, 160C/325F or fan oven 140C for 30-35 minutes.

Roos Parish Council Meeting 14th January 2008

7 Councillors were present + Cllr Stead. Apologies from Cllrs Cracknell & Smales

Prior to the meeting a minutes silence was held in memory of former member. Ken Cook who recently passed away.

The Chairman welcomed Councillor Craggs who had recently been co-opted onto the Council

The December minutes were approved. Extracts below.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

Proposed conservation areas within the parish

The Clerk reported receipt of confirmation from ERYC that the Hilston Conservation Area had now been formally approved. A decision on the Roos and Tunstall areas were still awaited.

Proposed sale of land at Manor Farm Tunstall

The Clerk reported that all the legal documentation was now in the hands of the solicitors for submission to the Land Registry.

Kerb on Hodgson Lane

It was reported that the dropped kerb had now been put in place, but that the poor state of the BT cover in the highway had not been attended to and it was resolved that the Area Engineer be reminded to pursue the matter further.

Highway matters

It was reported that ERYC had resurfaced the road at Owstwick at the junction near the post box and also the kerb slippage at North End, Roos.

Planning applications

Erection of a replacement dwelling following demolition of existing dwelling at The Bungalow, Kiln House Lane, Tunstall for Mr R Dry.

Members recommended approval for the above.

Change of use of land to relocate and extend caravan park with ancillary facilities, new vehicle access, and engineering works to form a wildlife lake at Sand-Le-Mere Caravan Park, Seaside Lane, Tunstall, for Mr A Ellis.

Councillors Cheeseman and Smales declared a prejudicial interest in the matter and left the meeting whilst the item was discussed.

Following the previously held site meeting it was recommended that, if the application is approved, complete measures be taken to ensure that foul and surface water is adequately disposed of from the site to the entire satisfaction of all the relevant public agencies.

Retention of two stable buildings at land south of Booths Cottage, Main Street, Tunstall for Mr D Birkett.

Members recommended approval for the above.

Display of non-illuminated doublesided freestanding sign at land south of Inglepool Corner, Withernsea Road for Mr D Grayson.

It was recommended that the application should be

refused as the proposed sign would be inappropriate for the location and could possibly distract motorists. It was also agreed to point out to ERYC that the sign's proposed wording was incorrect.

Decisions

The following two applications were granted by ERYC:-

Erection of a conservatory to the rear at 16 Hinch Garth, Roos and change of use from agricultural land to domestic curtilage at land east of 1 Pinfold Cottage, Pinfold Lane, Roos.

Flooding within the parish

The Chairman and Councillor Grant gave a further update report on the situation with regard to various discussions and correspondence they had had with all the relevant agencies to address the whole matter of flooding in the parish.

The Chairman also reported on his attendance at a Flood Review Panel meeting held at Withernsea on 28th November and he also confirmed that he had secured the services of Simon Taylor, a retired consultant engineer, who had offered to carry out a thorough survey of the drainage systems in Roos without charge other than reimbursement of expenses. He also confirmed that a site meeting had been arranged for 11th December with a representative of Yorkshire Water to walk the village to inspect the drains, particularly in the vicinity of Dimples Cottage in South End where ERYC had confirmed that the drain running from South End to the rear of the cottage is shown as an adopted sewer on Yorkshire Water's records and as such is deemed to be a public sewer maintained by Yorkshire Water.

The Clerk reported that he had received approval from ERYC for the £5,000 available to the parish to bring relief to the community, to be allocated towards a scheme for the improvement of drainage in the vicinity of Dimples Cottage in South End, Roos

The Chairman reported that he had visited Mr & Mrs Audley in response to their letter with regard to non-reinstatement of their garden area and had also sent a copy of their letter to ERYC for comment.

A letter was received from Mr & Mrs Earle together with copy letter from their insurance broker relevant to their recent claim following flooding. It was noted that copies had also been forwarded to ERYC ward Councillor Stead and it

Barish matters Minutes of the December Parish Council Meeting

was agreed that copies be sent to ERYC legal section for their information and attention.

Parish Plan

Tree planting - The Chairman reported that he had been in contact with Stephen Robinson of HEYwoods who had agreed to assist in the implementation of a proposed scheme to increase tree and woodland cover within the parish.

Mr Robinson had explained that the key to realising more tree cover was in getting landowner co-operation and similarly that of ERYC for proposed planting in the narrow strips of highway land.

It was agreed that Mr Robinson's assistance be sought in this respect and that the Area Engineer of ERYC be contacted in the matter and that a suitable article be placed in "The Rooster" inviting interested landowners to contact the Parish Council.

A letter was also received in this respect from Mr Ainley of the Parish Plan Committee who also raised the question of possibly co-opting further members of the council to serve on the committee. After discussion, it was agreed that sufficient Councillors already serve on the committee at present with no need to increase the Council's representation.

Emergency Plan

Councillor Cracknell tabled two copies of the draft emergency plan for members consideration and it was agreed to circulate the comprehensive documentation amongst members for discussion at the next meeting.

Treasurer's Report

The treasurer sought and was given approval for payment of £70 to Avondale Landscaping for the purchase of bulbs for planting in the parish and £22.50 to the Memorial Institute for hire of the hall. He also reported receipt of a wayleave payment from YEDL in

Any other Business

Proposed 30 mph flashing slow signs

It was agreed that ERYC be asked for an update on the proposed signs at either end of Roos Village which were requested earlier in the year.

Hodgson Lane

Members expressed concern at the lack of improvement works to the entire length of the lane by ERYC which had been promised some time ago and it was agreed to contact ERYC in the matter.

Public Session

The question of repairs to the bus shelter at Tunstall was raised and Mr Dry who was present confirmed that he would attend to repairs as soon as possible.

Councillor Dodson expressed his concern that the Chairman had been unfairly criticised by some residents in relation to his efforts in connection with the summer floods. He pointed out that the Chairman had worked tirelessly in this matter both up front and behind the scenes and had spent many hours in discussions, meetings and correspondence with all the relevent statutory bodies in order to resolve matters raised in the wake of the flooding. He further commented that the personal verbal attacks on the Chairman were completely unwarranted and expressed his thanks to him for his sterling efforts in difficult circumstances.
