FLOOD REPORT

The Simon Taylor Report on the flooding in Roos has recently been completed and distributed to members of the Parish Council for their consideration. The report contains a total of 30 recommendations and explains why the floods happened in June 2007.

Some of the recommendations have already been implemented by the Parish Council such as advice on Fly Tipping and having an Emergency Plan procedure available in the village to deal with future flooding and any other potential disaster. The other recommendations can be split into three categories, namely: Short-term objectives, Medium-term objectives and Investment from ERYC and the Utility Companies in order to carry out necessary and essential improvements to the drainage system.

The Taylor report blames the unprecedented volume of rain for flooding together with inadequacies with the village drainage system and serious shortcomings with new developments within the village. Mr Taylor goes on to state: "As a result of my investigation I am no longer surprised the village of Roos flooded. Roos was always a flood accident waiting to happen and who is to blame? Well in part, the usual suspects, the Local Authority or whichever Utility is found responsible for draining within the village, but by far the main culprits are the people of Roos themselves."

The details below are actual extracts from the report, of the main recommendations, split into three categories.

Short-term recommendations.

1. A full camera survey should be undertaken of the enclosed culvert running through the centre of the village. This survey should identify the condition of the culvert, works required as well as ownership and responsibility.
2. A regime of inspection and clearance must be adopted to ensure culverts are regularly inspected and cleared. The design and suitability of the existing grilles should be reviewed. Robust security fencing must be erected around the entrance to the culverts including harness and safety-line fixing.
3. Create more access inspection points to the Beck / culverts.
4. Remove construction work that impedes the free flow of water down the Beck.
5. Sources of foul water entering the Beck should be identified and eliminated.
6. Investigate the removal of drop kerbs (access to driveways) or find other ways of containing water in the road gullies on Rectory Road.
7. The Utilities, ERYC, Government Agencies should come forward and tell the Roos Parish Council what they are responsible for and what they are liable for.

8. There should be no more development within the village until the recommendations in the report have been implemented.

Medium-term recommendations.

1. Investigate some recent enclosures of the Beck. Wherever possible remove and restore the open Beck.
2. Riparian owners to be identified and agreements must be made for access to the Beck. A schedule of what is expected of Riparian owners to be drawn up together with a system of inspection and verification.
3. There is a need for flood water-storage areas on Rectory Road and north of the school at North End.
4. The open Beck along its full length is in poor condition. All vegetation and trees should be removed from the Beck sides and at least three metres along the bank tops. All roots should be removed from the bank sides and all loose debris and fly-tipped materials must be removed.
5. Restore the open Beck north of Dove Lane. Build an embankment along Dove Lane so as to form a storage area for water over-topping the Beck/culvert.
6. South of Dove Lane restore the valley profile. Remove the earth embankments. Allow free passage of water overflowing the culverts to move downhill. Provide protection for homeowners.
7. Encourage water to overflow the Lamb Lane culvert. Remove obstructions that will prevent the passage of overflow waters. Create encapsulated features i.e. embankment sides, concrete or brick walls.

Finally The Taylor Report discusses the problems at the area of Dimples Cottage and Roseneath and recommends the following:-

1. Upgrade the 225mm link pipe
2. The grass verges should be encapsulated in concrete kerbs to prevent soil blocking the road gulleys.
3. Investigate discharging water from the low point opposite Dimples Cottage to an access point in the Beck further down-stream, i.e. join up with drainage heading south of Elm Garth.
4. Investigate the construction of an underground sump, or storage tank in South End Road to collect storm water. This water should then be pumped away, discharging into the Beck much further down stream.

These particular points require multi agency input and the implementation of a sound engineering solution backed by significant investment.

For this report to be carried out, it needs a spirit of co-operation and goodwill from the public of Roos. If we all play our part and the Taylor Report is fully supported the chances of another flood disaster will be greatly reduced. The full report, will hopefully be available on the village web site in the near future and is well worth reading. If I can be of any help with the report please feel free to contact me.

Alec's Patch ... By Alec Dodson

Pruning Invest in some good secateurs so that you have good clean cuts.
Hydrangeas - Prune back by half to good buds and remove any dead or crossing branches.

Forsythia - Cut back immediately after flowering.

Cornus (dog wood) - Cut back hard to encourage coloured stems.

Buddleia - Also cut back hard. These flower August/September on the growth they make this season.

Planting Evergreen Shrubs can be planted now in showery weather. As soon as the soil warms up after the present cold snap, plant onion sets and early potatoes.

Mulching This is also a good time to mulch beds and borders with garden compost to retain moisture and cut down on weeding.

Frost Watch If any plants are frosted try to get to them before the sun does. Cover with newspaper or spray them with cold water to allow them to thaw gradually.

House Plants Give these a spring clean. Remove dead leaves and sponge large leaves with tepid water. Watering can also be increased as the temperature rises and daylight increases.

Nature Watch Continue feeding the wild birds, due to late spring. Some are already nesting. Early nesters such as Blackbirds are likely to choose a site under cover e.g. garden sheds, so take care not to shut them in.

Incidentally we saw a Red Kite flying over the disused railway line at Hedon (a bird not a dragon on a string).

Cookery Corner

Roasted Peppers with Cottage Cheese and Tuna

Ingredients

1 x 250g tub natural cottage cheese	1 x tablespoon semi-skimmed milk
1 x 200g tin tuna in brine	4 x peppers
2 x large eggs	Salt and pepper
2 x tablespoons low-fat mayonnaise	

Method

1. Pre-heat the oven to 200c/400f/gas mk6/180fan
2. Drain the tuna, break the eggs into a bowl and add all the other ingredients, except the peppers, and mix well.
3. Cut the tops off the peppers, remove the seeds and stand them upright, slightly trimming the bottoms so that they do not fall over.
4. Spoon the tuna mixture into the pepper shells and bake for 20/25 minutes until golden and firm.

Serve them warm or cool.

He also delivered *The Rooster* in Tunstall village for many years. Brian leaves wife Pat, a daughter Louise, a son Nick and two grandchildren Lydia and Willem.

Roos Parish Council Meeting 14th April 2008

All Councillors were present inc. Cllr R.Stead

The March minutes were approved. Extracts below.

Proposed sale of land at Manor Farm Tunstall

The Clerk confirmed that he had supplied copy rent receipts to the solicitors and informed them that after extensive enquiries no one was able to explain how the Council acquired the land in the first instance.

Hodgson Lane

Councillor Coupe reported that she had approximately 100 signatures to date on the petition she was circulating and ERYC Ward Councillor Stead advised that the Council present the petition to the Leader of ERYC at a council meeting on the 2nd April. It was agreed to adopt this suggestion and the Clerk confirmed that that he would forewarn the Chief Executive of ERYC that this would happen.

Parish Plan

Tree-planting - The Chairman reported that Stephen Robinson of HEYwoods Partnership had now written to all parties who had expressed an interest in tree-planting opportunities in the parish.

Grass verges

The Clerk reported that he had met the Area Engineer of ERYC who had confirmed that the damaged verges would be attended to early in the coming financial year.

Recent heavy rainfall

It was reported that Mr Dry's invoice for work carried out during January had been presented to ERYC for payment.

Pilmar Lane garages/carpark

Councillor Coupe reported that the electricity cable being linked to a nearby house had now been removed.

Visits to parishioners

The Chairman reported that he had visited Mr and Mrs Hersom and Mr Baker to assure them of the Council's integrity in dealing with their concerns over flooding issues.

Flooding

Members had each been circulated with a copy of the Taylor Report containing over twenty recommendations and it was reported that Mr Taylor was prepared to attend a private meeting with members to discuss the contents of his report. It was agreed to invite him to such a meeting to be arranged for 7pm on the 26th March and that thanks be extended to him for his invaluable services to the Council in this respect.

It was reported that ERYC had been requested to ascertain from Mr Beal whether permission had previously been given for the potting of the Beck within the property at Dove Lane.

The Clerk reported that he had met the Area Engineer of ERYC who was considering the Council's request to remove some of the bars on the grille at Lamb Lane to allow small-sized debris to pass through with the general flow of the watercourse. It was also reported that a site meeting had taken place with the Environment Agency about the proposed potting of a section of the Beck upstream from Mr Baker's property and that Mr Quarmby had no objections. Councillor Grant confirmed that the scheme would cost in the region of £1,200 and it was agreed that on official approval by the Environment Agency an application be made to ERYC for monies from the relief fund to finance the work.

It was reported that ERYC had also been active at North End to improve drainage and that they had paid Mr and Mrs Audley in full for the damage caused to their garden area due to emergency works during the summer floods of 2007.

Proposed Tedder Hill Wind Farm

A letter was received from Mrs Blenkin which pointed out that now that the Conservation Areas had been approved by ERYC the expert opinion of Mr Atkinson Conservation Officer of ERYC be sought on any impact the proposal may have on them and that if such impact be detrimental to the Conservation Areas an objection be sent to ERYC. It was agreed that this course of action be taken.

Easington to Ganstead gas pipeline project.

A pamphlet from the National Grid was circulated showing the line of the new pipeline and explaining the work to be carried out.

Road closure - Pasture Lane and Hogsea Lane Tunstall

Notification of a further 18 months extension to the above road closures was received from ERYC and noted.

Planning applications

Relocation of field access at land south of Poplar Farm, Hilston Road, Roos for ERYC.

It was agreed to recommend approval of the above application.

Erection of 1 no dwelling at land east of The Paddock, South End, Roos for Vidi Vici.

It was agreed to defer a decision until the next meeting, that the proposals be circulated amongst members and that ERYC be asked for an extension of time to consider them.

Decisions

The following application was refused by ERYC:-

Erection of a dwelling in connection with vehicle repair workshop at Peart Auto Services, Quaker Road, Owstwick.

Any other Business

Bus shelter at Tunstall

It was reported that repairs to the shelter were now nearing completion.

Public Session

Comments from the floor were made on the planning application in respect of The Paddock, South End, Roos and Mrs Earle remarked that ERYC should defer consideration of future planning applications until such time as all flooding issues had been resolved.


