HODGSON LANE

The case to improve the road surface in Hodgson Lane was heard by the ERYC Environment and Transport Overview and Scrutiny Committee on June 4th in County Hall.

A petition with over 340 signatures was presented to the committee together with letters of support from Graham Stuart MP, Councillor Richard Stead and Doctor Robert Fouracre detailing the appalling state of the road and the urgent need for a much improved road surface.

The Parish Council were represented by David Winter (Chairman) and Barry Lee (Clerk to the Council). A clear and concise presentation was given highlighting the poor state of the road with its uneven surface which leads to frequent flooding and standing water after normal rainfall.

The committee agreed that action was needed and the matter has been referred to senior officers for further consideration. Richard Alderson, a Senior Engineer in the Services, Assets and Strategy department, is the assigned officer and it is very much hoped that his report will speed up the necessary and extremely urgent work that is required to make Hodgson Lane a safer and much improved road that the public of Roos deserve.

I feel we have achieved a favourable result with the committee in unanimous support of our case. With a continuous and positive approach from us all I am sure a satisfactory outcome is assured in the not-to-distant future.

Alec's Patch ... By Alec Dodson

Cut down leaves from daffodil bulbs.

Do not allow grass and weeds to grow right up to the trunk of newly planted trees or shrubs for the first two years, leave a two foot diameter patch around the base.

Clear blanket weed from ponds and leave on the side to allow newts, tadpoles, insects etc to get back into the pond.

Many hedges need the first clip of the year.

Pruning Schedule

Holly - April/May
Privet - May/June & July/August
Thorn - May/June & September/October
Yew - August/September
Beech - July/August
Escallonia - June after flowering
Berberis - June after flowering

Lawns - Raise the height of the cut if we have dry weather also edge off if you want a pristine effect.

Cookery Corner By Ann Coupe

Sticky garlic chicken skewers

Preparation time: 5 minutes + marinating time • Cooking time 10 minutes

Serves 4

Ingredients

3 garlic cloves crushed	2 teaspoons Tabasco sauce
2 tablespoons clear honey	3 skinless, boneless chicken breasts, cut into thin strips
4 tablespoons tomato ketchup	Salt and freshly ground black pepper.
4 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce	Salad and new potatoes, to serve
2 teaspoons English mustard	

Method

1. Soak twelve 25 cm (10 inch) bamboo skewers in water for at least 20 minutes.
2. Meanwhile, mix together the garlic, honey, ketchup, Worcestershire sauce, mustard and Tabasco and season with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Toss in the chicken and stir until well combined, transfer to a non-metallic dish, cover and leave to marinate for 20-30 minutes or overnight.
3. Pre-heat the grill to high. Thread the marinated chicken onto the skewers. Arrange on a foil-lined baking sheet and grill for 6-7 minutes, turning occasionally until well browned and cooked through, or cook over the hot coals of a barbecue for 5-6 minutes. Serve with mixed salad and baby new Jersey potatoes.

Local 20-year-old rugby league player Robbie Smith has been selected to play for Scotland in the Students' World Cup taking place in July in Brisbane, Australia.

Robbie was born in Keyingham and came to Roos as a three-year-old.

His Scottish connections come from his grandfather on his mother's side, who came to the area from Glasgow whilst serving in the RAF.

Educated at Roos and Withernsea schools he began to play rugby and became a winger, playing for Hull Boys' Club before moving to Hull Isberg as he got older. He could have gone down the soccer road as he played for both Leeds United and Hull City Academy sides, but decided on rugby.



His last match was against the Police on 4th June. He leaves for training camp on 21st and then flies from Heathrow on the 29th for three weeks.

All the games will be played in July. His first match is against Greece on Saturday 5th, so not much time for acclimatisation, this being followed by games against Australia on Tuesday 8th and England on Saturday 12th. There are two groups the second comprising Ireland, Wales, France and New Zealand, and the top two from each go forward to the semi finals to be played on 15th and 16th. The final will then be played on 19th. He returns home on 21st. The results can be followed on www.worldcup.aurl.com.au.

Roos Parish Council Meeting 9th June 2008

Six Members were present. Apologies from Councillors Cracknell, Craggs and Smales.

The May minutes were approved. Extracts below.

The full minutes are posted in the parish notice boards.

Proposed sale of land at Manor Farm Tunstall

The Clerk reported that the Registration of Title had now been completed and that this had been granted by the Land Registry as an Absolute Title. It is now the responsibility of the prospective purchasers to approach an Estate Agent/ Land Valuer to ascertain the value of the land for Council consideration.

Hodgson Lane

The Petition containing over 340 signatures was presented to the meeting and the clerk confirmed that it would be despatched together with a covering letter to ERYC at County Hall prior to the deadline, for consideration at the committee meeting on 4th June. *(See front page)*

Parish Plan

Tree-planting - The Chairman further reported that Stephen Robinson of HEYwoods Partnership was still having ongoing discussions with interested parties in relation to tree-planting opportunities with a view to agreeing schemes for implementation in the coming planting season.

Emergency Plan

Councillor Cracknell reported that avenues had been and were being explored for fundraising to hopefully finance the proposed emergency boxes and their respective contents and that tentative discussions were to take place with ERYC as to its possible involvement in testing the Plan in the form of a live exercise.

Parish paths

Councillor Dodson reported that the contents of the parish paths leaflet would shortly be available for print and it was agreed that a price for an initial 100 colour copies be sought for the publication.

Flooding

The Clerk reported receipt of a reply from ERYC which confirmed that the Town and Parish Flood Fund monies had now all been allocated, but that the authority had agreed that any under-spend on previously approved projects together with the £5000 still available to the Council could both be allocated to another scheme.

In view of the above and the initial verbal estimate of circa £8000 for improvement works for the proposed provision of a storm overflow pipe within the gardens of three properties in Cherry Hill Park to discharge into Roos Beck, it was agreed that consideration be given to a revised scheme for discussion at the next meeting.

The Chairman reported that he had now obtained a price of approximately

£800 for a possible camera survey of the potted section of the beck and that although a tentative date had been arranged it was understood through ERYC Councillor Grove that ERYC may consider carrying out the survey in view of the authority's permissive powers in relation to the responsibilities of the riparian owners. This avenue was to be explored and a report considered at the next meeting.

The Chairman reported on the useful meeting attended by Graham Stuart MP in April at which he offered full support to the Council in all its efforts to secure improvements to the drainage system. He also expressed hope that the recommendations in the Taylor Report would be fully considered by ERYC, Yorkshire Water and the Environment Agency and implemented in the near future. Mr Stuart also offered his assistance in chasing Yorkshire Water for the provision of a manhole inspection chamber at South End where the piped section meets with the enclosed section of Roos Beck.

The Area Engineer of ERYC reported that he was reluctant to remove any bars from the grille in Lamb Lane as the current spacings prevent the possibility of someone being trapped, mindful of the tragedy which occurred at Hessle during the flooding last year.

A reply from the Environment Agency was reported in connection with the development at Roos Beck adjacent to 3 Beckside Manor, Roos which stated that it was considered that the works did not contravene the relevant section of the Land Drainage Act requiring consent for specific works. It was agreed that the Environment Agency be invited to a site meeting to consider and discuss the contents of the response. It was envisaged that the Chairman and Councillor Grant would attend.

Proposed Tedder Hill Wind Farm

Further representation had been made to ERYC in light of the likely detrimental effect the proposal would have on the designated Conservation Areas. The applicant has been asked to produce a Conservation Addendum, when ERYC would then undertake some re-consultation with interested parties. The earliest available Committee dates for determining the application would be 19th June or 10th July.

ERYC matters

It was agreed that a total of 11 pallets of sandbags each containing 40 bags be requested from ERYC. Seven to be stored at Councillor Smales's premises, two at Tunstall Village Hall and three at Councillor Grant's, all for use should there be further flooding.

The question of winter gritting of Southfield Lane had also been referred to ERYC and the damaged footpath at Hazledene, South End had been discussed at a site meeting with the Area Engineer of ERYC.

East Riding Local Development Framework

The Core Strategies and Options document received from ERYC is to be circulated to members, initially to Councillors Coupe and Cracknell as they will be attending the group meeting at Sproatley Primary School on 4th June.

Review of payphone kiosks

A letter from ERYC reported that BT Payphones had notified the Authority that it was proposed to remove the kiosk from Main Street, Tunstall. Members noted the contents as it was understood that it had been earmarked previously for removal.

Planning

Decisions

Erection of a 2kw wind turbine on a nine metre tapered tower at Manor Cottage, Main Street, Tunstall for Mr J Smith.

It was reported that ERYC had refused the above application.

Relocation of field access at land south of Poplar Farm, Hilston Road, Roos.

It was reported that ERYC had approved the above application.

Applications

Erection of 1 no dwelling at land east of The Paddock, South End, Roos for Vidi Vici.

Resulting from the representation made to ERYC a reply had been received from the authority stating that additional information had been requested and that the Council would be re-consulted prior to the application being determined. The application is likely to be considered on either 30th June or 21st July.

Proposed construction of the Humber Gateway Offshore Wind Farm 8km east of the Holderness Coast for E ON.

It was agreed to circulate the documentation to individual members for discussion at the next meeting.

Any other Business

Hilston Road (Furze Road) and standing water at Southfield Lane

Councillor Smales identified the location of the piped section under Hilston Road and it was agreed to refer this to the Area Engineer of ERYC for attention, together with the issue of standing water at the entrance to the log cabin development at Southfield Lane.

Fly-tipping Beechwood Views

It was agreed to inform ERYC that garden waste was being dumped in the vicinity of the walkway to the rear of the properties to the east of Beechwood Views.

Emergency Planning

The Clerk had been notified by Humber Emergency Planning Services that an example emergency plan for the fictional parish of *Wesley* modelled on the Council's actual plan had been circulated to all Parish and Town Councils within the East Riding.

Public Session

Mrs Earle referred to the works undertaken at Roos Beck in Becksie Manor and commented that the bank was being eroded by virtue of the works that had taken place.

Mr Ainley informed members that a meeting of the Parish Plan Committee would be held shortly at which the East Riding Local Development Framework Core Strategies and Options document would be considered and that a copy of any comments made on its contents would be made available to the Council to assist in any representations which the council may wish to make to ERYC.
