

Wind Farm Update.

After more than two years since the first Wind Turbine Industrial Estate was proposed, for three turbines at the Tedder Hill location between Roos and Rimswell, a planning date was finalised. There where several reasons for the delay.

The application was first brought before planning together with the other two sites proposed for Roos Parish, namely Sunderland Farm of eleven turbines and Monkwith of seven turbines. Both these where refused mainly on grounds of objection by the Ministry of Defence. However Tedder Hill was deferred for further information on tourism, route, shadow flicker and any other new evidence. Tedder Hill, unlike the other two sites, had been deemed acceptable by the planning officers as it was considered to be a site of a lesser environmental impact.

Although we welcomed the decision to obtain more evidence for its impact, it was a concern that the planning officers had guided the members of the Council to use the Tedder Hill site to fend off the threat of any new wind-farm applications in the future although it contravened the planning policy documents that should have been sufficient grounds for its refusal.

At the hearing, several objections were raised as follows:-

- Adverse effects on tourism, namely the Holderness Country Park less than 400m away.
- Shadow flicker upon residences and visual impact on Holderness's 'Big Skies.'

• Against planning policy documents Holderness-Wide Plan and Village Design Statement adopted by East Riding.

• Strong objections from the Conservation officer, comments echoed by English Heritage to back his findings as to the adverse impact upon the three conservation areas of Roos Parish.

Tedder Hill is reported by E.on to have a magnitude of change upon this particular area and will be 'substantial' and its overall effect would be 'major'.

• Cumulative sequential testing has been omitted, such as:

Visual Impact on the landscape from other wind farms combined with Tedder Hill.

This area, proposed for tourist regeneration would be industrialised.

Why is there a need for 3 poorly sited turbines if E.on claim their Humber Gateway offshore wind farm could supply enough electricity for the whole of the East Riding?

The final decision was a split vote with the deciding vote cast by Councillor Hunter who found in our favour and refused planning, a welcome result after a two year battle.

Tedder Hill Wind Farm was considered to be in contravention to planning policy and would have an adverse Impact upon the Holderness Landscape, Tourism and have an inadequate route. Currently E.on are considering an appeal. *Cherie Blenkin (Showt)*

Cookery Corner By Ann Coupe

Carrot and Pineapple Buns

Ingredients Makes 10 - 12

125ml/4fl oz sunflower oil 150g/5oz soft brown sugar ½ teaspoon vanilla essence 2 medium eggs 75g/2 ½ oz plain flour 75g/2 ½ oz wholemeal flour 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

1 level teaspoon cinnamon 125g/4oz carrots, grated ½ x 425g can unsweetened pineapple, crushed 60g/2oz sultanas 10 - 12 patty tin tray, lined with paper bun cases

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Set the oven to moderately hot, Gas Mark 5 or 190°C/375°F. Fan 170.
- 2. Put the oil, brown sugar, vanilla essence and eggs in a bowl and lightly beat the eggs with a fork.
- **3.** Sieve both flours, the bicarbonate of soda and cinnamon into the bowl. Tip in any bran left in the sieve. Stir, then beat with a wooden spoon for a minute or so until smooth.
- 4. Stir in the grated carrot, pineapple and sultanas.
- 5. Spoon the mixture into the bun cases, so that they are two thirds full.
- **6.** Bake towards the top of the oven (adjust for Fan Oven) for about 25 minutes or until firm.

<u>Dahlias</u>

Dahlias provide welcome colour this month. Check any stakes and ties as autumn winds can cause damage. Feed with liquid fertiliser to build up the tubers.

Alpines

Transplant any plants needing a new location. If you are making a new raised bed or rockery choose an open site which is well drained and away from trees. Leave the bed to settle for a week or so before planting.

Greenhouse

Remove any shading from the glass.

Lawns

September is a good time to sow a new lawn or repair an existing one. The soil is still warm and there is likely to be enough rain to reduce the need for watering. Both seeding and turfing can be carried out.

Trees

Check newly planted trees, any stakes may need replacing or ties adjusting.

Roos Parish Council Meeting 8th September 2008 Seven members were present. Apologies from Councillor Bob Smales.

The August minutes were approved. Extracts below. The full minutes are posted in the parish notice boards. Proposed sale of land at Manor Farm Tunstall

The Chairman announced that the item would be discussed in camera at the end of the meeting.

Hodgson Lane

Arising from the discussions at the annual parish assembly it was agreed not to adopt option 2 of ERYC comprising of a one-way system but to favour a scheme based on option 1 with also possible kerbing in areas not earmarked for footpath provision and minor carriageway widening as shown on the plan. It was agreed that the Chairman and Clerk progress the matter further with ERYC with consideration also given to a possible 20 mph speed restriction.

Parish Plan

Tree-planting - The Chairman reported that HEYwoods had confirmed the prioritisation list for planting commencing in the coming planting season and that in relation to the proposed playing field planting scheme careful consideration and planning were required in order to deliver the scheme upon which Mr Robinson would report back in due course.

Emergency Plan

Councillor Cracknell reported on the meeting with ERYC, also attended by the Clerk, in which it had been suggested that a table-top style exercise as opposed to a live exercise would be more appropriate and it was agreed that this course be taken with a provisional date of 28th September at Tunstall Village Hall for the exercise. Councillor Cracknell also confirmed ERYC's involvement on the day and said that precise details would be available nearer the event. It was also agreed to invite neighbouring parish councils as observers.

Parish paths

Councillor Coupe produced costings for producing 100 copies of the parish paths leaflet in colour in the sum of $\pounds 40.00$ printed on card and folded. It was agreed to proceed with the printing and that a Council copyright be printed on the finished leaflet.

Proposed allotments in Roos

The Chairman reported that Mr Hodgson did not wish to provide any of his land for an allotment site and the Clerk further reported that he had made initial enquiries of ERYC as to land availability and was awaiting a response. It was agreed to approach the Church authorities as to possible land availability.

EYMS Saturday bus service

The Clerk was pleased to report that after representation to ERYC they would financially support the service and it would therefore continue.

Brown refuse bins

The Clerk informed members that ERYC had agreed to roll out the above bin type throughout the East Riding area by 2009 following successful trials.

Flooding and related matters.

Councillor Grant informed the meeting that works had been undertaken at North End to improve the drainage in the area and to hopefully alleviate future flooding at a cost of £938.00 plus VAT. Members were reminded of the recent grant to the Council of £500.00 for flooding issues and Councillor Cracknell produced a cheque for £400.00 from the Community Flood Fund also for such purposes. It was agreed to utilise the total of £900.00 plus a further Council contribution of £38.00 to fund the above works. It was agreed to write to the three riparian owners involved stating that the work had been carried out on a goodwill one-off basis and that the cost of any future maintenance or work required would fall on each of the riparian owners.

In respect of the recently completed works at Cherry Hill Park, the Clerk reported that ERYC had now agreed to accept responsibility for payment of the submitted account in full as presented after representation by him, the Chairman and Councillor Grant.

It was further reported that ERYC had completed some survey works of the potted section of Roos Beck and that the results would be relayed to the Council in the near future and that following the recent site meeting in the vicinity of Dimples Cottage, South End, ERYC had sought and gained approval in principle from the owner of The Paddock to lay a new pipeline across his land and that Yorkshire Water had agreed also in principle to contribute to the scheme by constructing a new manhole chamber on the culvert with a 375mm stub pipe to accept a new connection.

The Clerk reported that he had ascertained that the owner of the garage at Lamb Lane over Roos Beck was Mr I McCunnell of The Cottage, Lamb Lane.

Councillor Cracknell further reported that she was still awaiting feedback from ERYC on the signing off of risk assessments in relation to working in and around Roos Beck and flooded areas generally.

Correspondence

Parish Council liaison meeting 2008

Receipt of a letter was reported from ERYC giving preliminary notice of meetings to be held in October in relation to the planning process and that an announcement would be made nearer the events. Councillor Cracknell expressed an interest in attending one of the events.

Proposed speed re-active sign, Pilmar Lane, Roos

The Clerk reported that the Council's application for a speed re-active sign had been successful and that it was anticipated that the sign would be in position by the end of the year. Members expressed satisfaction at the outcome and trusted that the school would also support the application for a similar sign on Main Street near the school.

Planning

Applications

Erection of first-floor extension to side and single storey extension to rear at South Field, Dove Lane, Roos for Mr & Mrs P Beal 10 It was agreed to recommend to ERYC that the application be approved.

Erection of 3 no wind turbines control room and alterations to existing access north east of Wadworth Hill, Green Lane, Burton Pidsea for Aeolian Holderness Ltd.

It was agreed that in line with Council policy to recommend refusal of the above and that members wishing to submit further comments should do so by contacting the Clerk no later than 4th September.

Decisions

Variation of condition to allow extension of season of caravan park at Holderness Country Park, Southfield Lane, Tunstall

It was reported that ERYC had approved the above subject to the site being used only for holiday accommodation and not permanent residential occupancy.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer sought approval for payment of the following accounts:-

Avondale Landscapes - work on parish paths - £108.75 Audit Commission - audit of accounts - £120.00 plus VAT. Ashdales - valuation of land at Tunstall - £75.00 plus VAT.

Any other Business

ERYC Task Force visit

It was reported that a walkabout had been arranged for 20th August prior to the Task Force visit of week commencing 8th September and it was agreed that Councillors Coupe, Cracknell, and Craggs assist the Chairman at the walkabout with ERYC to identify areas/problems in their particular localities requiring attention. The Chairman pointed out that he had already an initial list for consideration and that any member wishing to put forward areas for improvement should supply details to him prior to the 20th August.

Rectory Road, Roos - speeding vehicles

It was resolved that the police be asked to monitor vehicle speeds on the above road.

Public Session

Mr Ainley referred to the likely traffic knock-on effects in relation to Lamb Lane and Pinfold Lane with regard to the proposals for the improvements to Hodgson Lane. The Council might also wish to consider amending the plan in the parish paths leaflet if claiming copyright on the leaflet as the plan was probably ERYC copyright material.
