# New Year New Hobby?

Why learn to ring? It is a hobby which involves:

Being part of a team.

Providing a service to the Church.


Healthy light exercise.

It's also very enjoyable!

It helps if you have a sense of rhythm and coordination but you do not have to be musical. It is said that if you can ride a bike you can ring! You need to be able to count but more demanding brain activity is optional!

It generally takes beginners several weeks to learn the basic skill of ringing a bell. Tuition would be on a one-to-one basis after which they should then be ready to ring with the rest of the band.

In English church towers, bells are generally hung for full circle ringing. This practice started in the 16<sup>th</sup> century when church bells started to be fitted with a full wheel. This gave ringers control of their bell and meant continuous sets of changing patterns could be rung.



The bell swings through a full circle in both directions.

There are five bells hung in the tower at Roos Church. However this has only been the case since 1911 when the treble (lightest) and tenor (heaviest) were added to the original three. The older bells date from the second half of the 17<sup>th</sup> century. Our tenor weighs nearly 13cwt.

Without going into a lot of detail, the general idea is that the bells are rung one after another in a variety of different sequences known as changes. They should be evenly spaced. So if you hear two bells ringing simultaneously or an erratic rhythm, things are not going according to plan!

There are over 40,000 change ringers (campanologists) in the British Isles and smaller numbers in Australia, New Zealand, Canada, South Africa and the USA. Once you have learnt the basics you will be made welcome at any tower practice night.

Some bell ringers like to ring peals. A peal is a minimum of 5000 changes and typically takes around three hours.

Tuesday is the bell ringers' practice night and we are also in action before Sunday morning service and sometimes after weddings. We need more ringers to keep this ancient tradition alive in Roos.

# Alec's Patch ... By Alec Dodson

In the gardening year January is almost always a difficult month, the old adage "*as the days lengthen the cold strengthens*" often rings true. However a walk round the garden in suitable weather can be both therapeutic and instructive, as bulbs are already emerging and you may consider improvements by planting winter flowering or berried shrubs such as Jasmine, Hamamelis, Viburnum tinus, Garrya or Cotoneaster frigida. A visit to a local garden centre or nursery will also provide inspiration.

You may have to resort to armchair gardening if the weather is bad, study catalogues for vegetables and flower seed for new varieties or introductions. Incidentally the sale of vegetable seeds has overtaken those of flowers, evidence of the trend to grow your own.

#### <u>Geraniums</u>

If you are over wintering these popular plants, water sparingly and check regularly and remove dead leaves or damaged shoots.

#### House plants

The loss of many Christmas presents is often caused by over watering so be careful and also check to see that there are drainage holes in the pot or container.

#### **Paving and patios**

Keep these areas clear of leaves and moss to prevent slipping over.

#### Vegetable Curry

#### Serves 4

#### **Ingredients**

2 tablespoons oil
1 onion (chopped)
1 level tablespoon curry powder, or to taste
1 teaspoon paprika
2 teaspoons tomato purée
1 tablespoon apricot jam or redcurrant jelly
300ml/½ pint milk
50g/2oz raisins or sultanas
1kg/2lb mixed vegetables i.e. carrots, cauliflower, potatoes
4 size 3 eggs (hard-boiled and halved)
Watercress for garnish

#### <u>Method</u>

**1.** Put the oil in a saucepan, add the onion and fry gently for a few minutes without browning. Add the curry powder and paprika and continue cooking for 2 - 3 minutes.

**2.** Add the purée, lemon juice, jam, milk and raisins. Bring mixture to the boil, simmer, uncovered for 10 minutes.

3. Prepare the vegetables as normal. Cook in boiling water for 10 minutes. Drain well. Stir into the curry sauce. Continue simmering until the vegetables are tender.

4. Garnish with hard-boiled egg and watercress. Serve with chutney and diced cucumber mixed with natural yogurt.

### Roos Parish Council Meeting 12th Jan 2009

All members were present. The December minutes were approved. Extracts below.

The full minutes are posted in the parish notice boards.

#### **Emergency Plan**

In the absence of Cllr Cracknell it was agreed to defer discussion on the final elements of the Emergency Plan including the provision of emergency boxes at the agreed locations until the next meeting.

The Chairman reported that he had recently arranged for Radio Humberside to interview local residents with regard to the plan and that the interviews had also recently been broadcast.

#### Flooding and related matters

The Clerk reported that he had been informed by ERYC that consideration of proposed improvements to potted sections of Roos Beck would now be considered by ERYC Cabinet on 20<sup>th</sup> January 2009 and that he had been in contact with ERYC Councillor Grove on several occasions since the last meeting to seek his support for the urgently required improvement works.

The Chairman and Clerk reported that they had been in further contact with ERYC regarding the delay in the provision of the three gullies in the vicinity of Dimples Cottage and a further reply from ERYC was received which stated that an order had been placed with Warcups for the necessary work. It was agreed to remind ERYC of the continued delay and if necessary to contact the contractor directly in order to secure the completion of the works.

Discussion ensued on the grille areas of the beck and it was agreed in principle that when appropriate and if necessary between October and December assistance be sought on an informal basis in the removal of foliage debris from the grille areas and that consideration be given to a possible announcement in "The Rooster" to this effect.

Proposed water retention areas off Rectory Road and north of the school as outlined in the Taylor Report were discussed and it was agreed to contact ERYC Land Drainage to seek the department's views in this respect.

The Clerk reported that he had written to Mr Kettle arising from the drainage improvements at North End expressing the Council's apologies for the damage caused to his property during the works and that he had also visited Mr Kettle to assure him that the works had been carried out with good intent.

It was agreed to invite the Area Engineer of ERYC to a site meeting to discuss difficulty in gaining access to the beck on the south side of Lamb Lane.

#### East Riding Local Development Framework

The Chairman of the Parish Plan Committee presented proposed amendments to the local settlement profile for the parish and it was agreed that these be relayed to ERYC



#### Grips - Hilston Road, highway at Memorial Institute and footpaths

It was reported that grips had been provided by ERYC on Hilston Road, that the tarmac area outside the Institute had been repaired and that the footpaths requiring improvement works had been attended to.

#### **Illegal tipping at South End**

The Chairman reported that he had been informed by ERYC that a letter would be sent to residents of South End advising them of the consequences of anyone found flytipping in the area.

#### **ERYC** annual Chairman's awards

It was unanimously agreed to nominate Simon Taylor for an award for enhancing the East Riding of Yorkshire.

#### **Dispensing of medicines**

The Clerk reported receipt of an acknowledgement from the Government department to the Council's representations to the proposed withdrawal of patient's choice to receive medicines from the doctor's surgery and also a reply from Graham Stuart MP assuring the Council that he was also making strong representations to the Government to ensure that the existing arrangements remain in place in future.

#### Correspondence

#### **NHS East Riding of Yorkshire**

A letter was received from the Chairman of the above organisation requesting a meeting with the Council on a suitably convenient date to discuss health services to local communities and it was agreed to invite her to a meeting in the near future.

A copy of the organisation's newsletter was circulated for members' consideration.

#### Speed reactive sign at Pilmar Lane

The Clerk reported that he had chased ERYC on the provision of the above sign and reported a reply which stated that the sign was now being manufactured and that it was anticipated that the scheme would be completed during January 2009.

The Clerk also advised that a similar sign in the vicinity of the school was dependent on the views of the school under the safe routes to school programme and school governor Councillor Craggs undertook to follow this up with the school authorities.

#### **Proposed 30mph speed limits**

The Clerk reported receipt of a reply from ERYC which stated that the proposed new limits for Rectory Road, North End, Pinfold Lane and Main Street were envisaged to be implemented by autumn 2009.

#### Planning

#### Applications

Proposed alterations and extension to Roos CE VC Primary School Main Street Roos for ERYC

Councillor Craggs as a school governor declared an interest in the application and took no part in the discussion or voting in the matter. It was agreed to recommend that the application should be approved.

#### Treasurer's report and precept for 2009/10

An account for payment from Avondale Landscapes in the sum of £70.00 for the provision of flowering bulbs was presented and approved.

It was agreed that a precept of  $\pounds 6,000.00$  be requested of ERYC for the ensuing financial year.

#### Any other business

#### **ERYC budget conference**

Councillor Coupe reported on her recent attendance at the above conference which she had found to be most informative.

#### **Southfield Lane - Tunstall**

It was agreed to ask ERYC once again to consider winter gritting of the lane and to remind the ERYC Area Engineer to address the issue of standing water opposite the entrance to the new log cabin development.

#### **Proposed allotments in Roos**

The Clerk reported that ERYC had confirmed that it did not own the field which had recently been the subject of a recent planning application in its name and that a local farmer owned the land and that as enquiries of ERYC were now exhausted an approach would now be made to the Church authorities as to possible land availability.
