Roos Community First Responder scheme is looking for more volunteers.

Community First Responders are volunteers who are trained by the Yorkshire Ambulance Service to provide immediate life-saving care to members of their local communities in an emergency medical situation, such as heart attack, breathing difficulties or a collapse, in the vital minutes before the ambulance arrives.

They are trained in Emergency Life Support including Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and the use of an Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) which delivers a controlled electric shock to restart the heart. Community First Responders also carry portable oxygen.

Community First Responders make a valuable contribution to their communities. We know that in many medical emergencies the first few minutes are critical. If effective treatment can be performed within those first minutes, lives can be saved. Being a Community First Responder can be extremely rewarding and I would encourage anyone who may be interested in taking on the role to contact us or the Roos coordinator Harry Gregg.

Many people volunteer to gain experience, to help their local communities and some people have had personal experience of a loved one needing prompt medical attention and can see the value in this initiative. Volunteers come from all walks of life, young and older, working or retired, from teachers and drivers to shop keepers and army sergeants.

Full training is given to successful applicants who need to be over 18, physically fit and hold a full driving license with no more than six penalty points. YAS will also run Criminal Records Bureau (CRB) checks on candidates.

PLEASE NOTE IN CASE OF EMERGENCY RING 999 REQUESTING AN AMBULANCE

More than 260,000 people suffer a heart attack in the UK each year, about a third of whom die before reaching hospital due to cardiac arrest. A cardiac arrest most often occurs as a result of a heart attack, when the heart is starved of oxygen. Cardiac arrests cause the heart either to quiver, known as fibrillation, or stop beating altogether. The defibrillators carried by Community First Responders work by delivering a controlled electric shock through the chest wall to the heart to restore a normal heartbeat after a cardiac arrest. The faster this treatment is delivered, the better the outcome for the patient.

Community First Responders can also administer oxygen and are trained in basic

life support skills, which could be invaluable in the minutes before the ambulance arrives. All Responders carry YAS ID cards and may attend patients with chest pain or difficulty breathing and patients who are unconscious or who have collapsed.

When an emergency call is received at the A&E communication centre, an ambulance or Rapid Response Vehicle is dispatched as soon as possible. At the same time a Community First Responder, on-call in the area, can be alerted with the relevant details and asked to assist at the 999 incident.

***Cookery Corner* by Ann Coupe**

FOR THE CHILDREN

Cheese and Marmite Scones

Ready in 25 - 35 minutes

Makes 8..

Ingredients:

140g (5oz) self-raising flour	1 medium-sized egg
140g (5oz) wholemeal flour	1 tablespoon Marmite
1 teaspoon baking powder	3 tablespoons milk
50g (2oz) cold butter cut into small cubes	2 tablespoons Greek yogurt
50g (2oz) grated mature cheddar cheese	Extra 25g (1oz) grated cheese for topping

Method:

Pre-heat the oven to 190°C, Gas mark 5, Fan oven 170°C.

Sift together both flours into a bowl with the baking powder. Rub in the butter until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs.

Stir in the grated cheese.

Whisk together the egg, Marmite, milk and yogurt in a jug.

Pour this mixture into the flour and bring together with a knife to make a soft dough.

Tip:- If the dough is too dry add a little extra milk before rolling out.

Turn the dough onto a floured surface and roll out to 2cm ($\frac{3}{4}$ in) thick.

Stamp out the scones using a round cutter.

Place on a greased baking sheet. Glaze the tops with a little milk and sprinkle with the extra cheese.

Bake for 10 - 12 minutes or until golden.

Cool on a wire rack.

High summer means that the gardening season is in top gear, hedges to be trimmed, vegetables and borders to be kept weed-free and watering to be done. Leafy crops like lettuce must never be short of water and all crops need copious watering in the two weeks before harvesting.

Containers and hanging baskets need watering every day and sometimes twice. Also climbing roses and other wall shrubs often need water during the present dry spell. Finally if you've any energy left or need a breather, remove dead flowers from lupins, delphiniums and paeonies as they fade.

Lawns - do not cut too close as the grass stems will protect the lawn from scorching. Recovery will soon take place when rain returns.

Dear Friends in Roos,

Last month I explained to you a little bit about weddings in church. This month I turn to the old problem of money! There's never enough of it! All Saints' church is a grade 1 listed building and a beautiful asset to our community, a lovely place where God is worshipped week by week, a special place for baptisms, for weddings and for funerals.

But sadly we are not paying our way. Contrary to popular opinion, the church is not rich financially, neither your church in Roos, nor the diocese (nearing insolvency if things don't change) nor central church funds. Plans are now in place to cut clergy numbers in South Holderness so Roos will soon be part of a much bigger group.

The cost of a priest has to be met partly on a local level and last year we didn't manage to pay that money. (We are asked for around £9,000 each year; this is about a quarter of the cost of providing a priest, including training and housing and wages.)

So we are in debt. We also have to find over £2,000 per year for insurance, a similar sum for churchyard maintenance, £500 for electricity and so on, amounting in total to around £20,000....not taking into account extra money needed for additional repairs.

We are extremely grateful for all of you who help us in any way whether financially or with practical help. So far we are keeping going! Without your help, the church would be closed.

Sadly its future is by no means secure. But if everyone were able to give a small monthly donation, even just £2 a month, there would be no problem! What a challenge! Do please think about this. Isn't it amazing how much easier a task becomes when everyone joins in!

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Community

Roos Parish Council Meeting 13th July 2009

Only eight Council members were present.

The June minutes were approved. Extracts below.

The full minutes are posted in the parish notice boards.

Proposed allotments in Roos

Councillor Ward reported that he hoped to have the list of landowners in the parish for contact as to possible availability of land for allotment purposes completed for presentation at the next meeting.

Safe routes to school programme

The Clerk reported that he had been unable to contact Mr Lockwood on any progress he had made in his discussions with the other joint developer Mr Hurd in relation to highway and footpath improvements in Greenacre Park.

Councillor Craggs reported that he understood that the school had requested a 30mph slow down flashing sign on Main Street as part of the above programme.

Highway matters

It was agreed that ERYC be reminded that its landscaping contractor had still not strimmed the overgrown area at Aldbrough crossroads.

Hodgson Lane

The Chairman reported that ERYC would be contacted for an update on when the proposed improvements are expected to commence this financial year.

Emergency plan

Councillor Cracknell reported that the updating of contact details of parties who had previously offered assistance in the event of an emergency should be completed in time for the next meeting.

Sea embankment at Tunstall

The Clerk reported receipt of an acknowledgement from the Environment Agency on the Council's response to the scoping consultation document on feasible solutions/options for the proposed coastal defence scheme in which they had also confirmed that it was considering holding a public event where the people could see the plans and speak directly with the project team.

Parish paths

It was reported that, following the meeting of the Chairman and Councillor Dodson with ERYC's Countryside Access Officer, the authority had now provided a small bridge on footpath no. 10 at Tunstall to alleviate access problems.

Guide to facilities within the parish

Members commented on the excellent initial draft copy of the guide which had been kindly produced by Mr Ainley and it was agreed that subject to one or two

minor literal amendments, to proceed with producing the leaflet initially in mono format.

Wayside seat - Withernsea Road

Councillor Dodson reported that he had tidied up the grass area around the seat and that he had also attended to the area around the seat on Tunstall Road.

Flooding and related matters

The Chairman reported that he had been informed by Neil Agar of ERYC that outstanding riparian ownership issues in relation to Roos Beck on the south side of Lamb Lane were still being pursued, Mr and Mrs Stephenson had attended to their riparian ownership section of the beck and ERYC had sent further reminders in relation to the debris in the ditch alongside The Old Rectory in Rectory Road.

It was also reported that Millers had now removed the root mass identified in the beck under Beckside Manor and Councillor Grant reported that he understood Mr Beal would soon be attending to the beck area on the north side of Dove Lane.

It was agreed to contact the Area Engineer of ERYC to seek confirmation as to when the clearing of the trees/bushes would take place to allow improved access to the grille across the beck on the north side of Lamb Lane.

It was reported that the Chairman and Councillor Grant had met representatives of ERYC and Flood Review Panel ERYC member Councillor Grove on site at the school in relation to the likely drainage benefits that the provision of the attenuation pond in the vicinity of the school would have in the immediate area and for the village as a whole and that they had been assured that the pond would improve the current situation in retaining water when necessary prior to release into the drainage system. It was also reported that ERYC's contractors would have to move the millennium stone slightly to accommodate the works.

Telephone kiosk at Tunstall

Receipt of an e-mail from BT was reported which stated that ERYC had objected to the withdrawal of the telephone facility at the kiosk and that until the matter was resolved the Council would not presently be able to adopt the kiosk as originally intended.

Planning

Applications

Erection of two storey extension to rear following demolition of existing conservatory at Cornelian, South end, Roos for Mr & Mrs Megson.

It was agreed that no objections be made to the above proposal.

Decisions

It was reported that ERYC had approved the following applications:-

Erection of conservatory at 18 South Park.

Appeal

Notice of a Public Inquiry on appeal against enforcement notice.

It was reported that the appeal by Michael Green and William Grant (Paull) Ltd in relation to the siting of a caravan at Elm Farm, Rectory Road, Roos would be held at County Hall, Beverley on the 14th July at 10.00am

Any other business

Parish paths

Councillor Coupe referred to a footpath on the boundary with Burton Pidsea which had been backfilled and Councillor Dodson offered to investigate the matter as it was possible that the path at the particular location was not within Roos parish.

Highway matters

It was agreed to refer the following to ERYC for attention:-

Overhanging hedge at Quaker Road/B1242 junction, potholes outside Tunstall Church, white line re-lining required at South End/Lamb Lane junction after recent road surface dressing, signage reappraisal at the same junction in relation to direction of traffic to Halsham and Patrington and inconsistency in gang mowing of grass verges in Roos generally.
