Circulation

The Rooster is supplied to 540 addresses, including some outside the parish. It is funded entirely by voluntary donations from its readers and local institutions. Local groups are offered free publicity for their forth coming events. Businesses and individuals who advertise their services are charged a small fee.

In 2009 132 households (24.5%) donated £923.00, an average of £6.99p per household. An extraordinary donation of £100.00 was received from the Friends of the WI Business advertisements contributed £504.94

Expenditure

Printing remains our main expenditure and this year it accounted for 79% of our budget, but since purchasing the laser printer and keeping the printing in house, we have achieved a saving over the 2008 expenses of £300.00. Whilst we are pleased with this saving we must bear in mind that the printer has been used for 30 months, the model of printer we are using has become obsolete and we are now having difficulty in finding toner cartridges. We also pay more and more as supplies dry up. We are very grateful for the time given free of charge by volunteers who deliver *The Rooster* and by the committee members. Expenses are kept to a minimum.

The bank account for *The Rooster* is still held at Lloyds TSB and a balance of £1848.68p was held in credit at the 31st of December 2009.



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Tunstall News

Over the last eight months developments at Sand-Le-Mere have rapidly progressed as the 'roll back' of the Park takes place. Twenty chalet pitches, along with their utilities, have already been laid down, including a new electric substation. The road network is taking shape and overhead power lines are being replaced by underground cables that will allow the new fishing lakes to be dug out. Plans will soon be lodged with ERYCC for the Park's new facilities and once planning permission is granted contractors will be able to commence the work. There must come a time very soon when, due to coastal erosion, Seaside Lane will be closed. Access to the Park will then be through the new road leading off Southfield Lane. Plans are already afoot to move the Park's general office to a new site a hundred yards east of the original farm buildings. Southfield Lane now has the most substantial passing points in the whole of the East Riding, financed by the Park owner, in preparation for its increased use when Seaside Lane is eventually closed. But Southfield Lane itself, which is also a school bus route, is in an appalling state and deteriorating almost daily. In the interests of all who use the Lane it is hoped that the Council will give it a high priority in its future highways programme.

To those who like a good read, a reminder that a mobile library comes into Tunstall every fortnight. It parks on Main Street, just above the road junction. For your first visit you need some form of identification. Its next visit is on Tuesday 16th February, 2.20 - 2.40pm.

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Cookery Corner by Ann Coupe

Pancake Day - Shrove Tuesday 16th Feb 2010 St. Clement's Layer

Serves 4 - 6

Ingredients

1 teaspoon almond essence 300ml/½ pint pancake batter mix Butter for frying 225g/8oz cream cheese 225g/8oz cottage cheese 50g/2oz flaked almonds ½ teaspoon vanilla essence 2 tablespoons honey 2 tablespoons lemon juice

2 large oranges (peeled and sliced) 15g/½ oz flaked almonds (toasted)

Method

- **1.** Whisk the almond essence into the batter. Use to make 8-10 medium sized pancakes.
- **2.** Mix together the cream cheese, cottage cheese, almonds and vanilla essence. In a pan, warm the honey and lemon juice and mix thoroughly.
- **3.** Brush a pancake with the honey and lemon mixture. Spread a little of the cheese and almond mixture over. Repeat for four more pancakes layering each one on top.
- **4.** Lay half the orange slices over the top layer. Then place a pancake on top and repeat step 3 for the remaining pancakes, finishing with just a pancake. Reserve a little of the honey mixture for decoration.
- **5.** Cover with foil and bake in oven mark 4, 180°C/350°F, Fan 160 for about 15 minutes or until heated through.
- **6.** Just before serving, brush top with reserved honey and lemon, Arrange remaining orange slices and the toasted almonds on top.

Alec's Patch ... By Alec Dodson

Helleborus:

As the current winter continues, there is evidence of plants gradually becoming active. Snowdrops are already in flower and that other early flowering plant the Helleborus will soon be making an appearance. These hardy perennials are becoming more popular. Their wide range of colours and often handsome leaves make them a welcome addition, particularly in the smaller garden.

Natives of Western Asia and Southern Europe, they flower from January until April. They thrive best in a well-drained rich soil and partial shade is preferable to full sun.

Once established they are best left undisturbed but can be moved in October/November or in March providing there is plenty of soil around the roots.

Most commonly grown are:-

- Christmas rose, *Helleborus niger* flowers in winter.
- Lenten Rose, Helliborus orientalis flowers February to May.

Propagation is by division of roots in Spring after flowering, and also by seed. In fact the tendency to self sow around parent plants has given rise to many other colours and leaf variations in recent years.

nutes of the January Parish Council Meeting

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Roos Parish Council Meeting 8th February 2010

Councillor Cracknell did not attend.

The January minutes were approved. Summary below.

Proposed allotments in Roos

The nine landlords approached had now indicated that they had no land available. Consideration to be given at the next meeting with a view to possibly seeking the assistance of ERYC in acquiring suitable land by compulsory purchase. Mr Kerr-Delworth thanked the Council for its efforts.

Safe routes to school programme

ERYC is still pursuing the joint developers of Greenacre Park to secure the satisfactory completion of the highway.

Road Bollards

Councillor Grant and the Clerk reported on their recent site meeting with the Area Engineer of ERYC who had agreed to improve the carriageway width at Rectory Road in the current financial year, to hopefully prevent further damage to the remaining bollards.

ERYC Chairman's award.

It was agreed to nominate the Roos Parish Emergency Plan team under the Chairmanship of Councillor Cracknell for the community award.

Flooding and related matters

ERYC has agreed to provide a suitable locking gate at the access to the grille on the beck north of Lamb Lane in the next financial year now that the area has been cleared. Councillor Grant confirmed that grading, levelling, tree-stump uprooting and seeding would cost in the region of £750.00 to complete the work. It was agreed that the Parish Council fund this work.

Planning

Applications

Discharge of section 106 legal agreement from application relating to occupancy at Owstwick Grange Cottage, Fitling Road, Owstwick.

Lengthy discussions ensued and it was agreed after a vote to recommend refusal.

Decisions

It was reported that ERYC had refused the following applications:-

Erection of entrance gates, steel boundary fence and alterations to existing vehicular access at Hilston Cottage, Tower Road, Hilston.

Proposed Monkwith wind farm.

Councillor Cracknell reported that the above application previously refused by ERYC was to be reconsidered on a technicality at a Planning Committee meeting to be held on the 14th January. It was agreed to ask the case officer to resubmit the Council's original objections to the proposal.

Parish Plan

The Chairman reported that the ongoing tree-planting scheme included for twenty trees to be planted at Tower Road, Hilston and five at Rostun Road, Roos.

Treasurer's Report

Approval was given for payment of the following account:-

Mr B Lee - Clerk's salary for three months - £675.00

Receipt of wayleave payment of £27.68 from YEDL was noted.

It was also confirmed that the Clerk's salary had been increased with effect from 1st January 2010 to £3100.00 per annum to include expenses.

Any other business

Reference was made to the need for salt bins at Beechwood Views, Eastfield Estate and at Tunstall in the vicinity of the church and an extra one on Southfield Lane. The matter of extra bins had already been raised with ERYC.

Bus service 313 Roos to Withernsea School

Correspondence between Mrs Spikings and ERYC in relation to her request for the possible re-routing of the above particularly during bad weather was bought to the Council's attention and it was agreed to contact ERYC in support of Mrs Spikings to ask for reconsideration to the decision not to change the service route.
