

MOTHERING SUNDAY - *MOTHER'S DAY*

The phrase "Mother's Day" was trademarked in 1912 in America by Anna Jarvis, and should not to be confused with Mothering Sunday. The modern Mother's Day holiday was created by Anna in Grafton, West Virginia, as a day to honour mothers and motherhood, especially within the context of families, and family relationships. It is now celebrated on various days in many parts of the world, often in May, some of which have a much older tradition than the modern holiday (e.g. dating to the 16th century in the UK).

The holiday eventually became so commercialised that many, including its founder, Anna Jarvis, considered it a "Hallmark Holiday", i.e. one with an overwhelming commercial purpose. Anna eventually ended up opposing the holiday she had helped to create.

Mothering Sunday is a Christian festival celebrated throughout Europe. Secularly it is used as a celebration of motherhood, and is synonymous with Mother's Day as celebrated in other countries; the latter name is also increasingly used.

A religious festival celebrating motherhood has been existent in Europe since neolithic times. In the Roman religion the festival was in honour of the mother goddess Cybele and it took place during mid-March. As the Roman Empire and Europe converted to Christianity, Mothering Sunday celebrations became part of the liturgical calendar as Laetare Sunday, the fourth Sunday in Lent to honour the Virgin Mary and the "mother church".

During the sixteenth century, people returned to their mother church for a service to be held on Laetare Sunday. This was either a large local church, or more often the nearest Cathedral. Anyone who did this was commonly said to have gone "a-mothering", although whether this preceded the term Mothering Sunday is unclear. It was often the only time that whole families could gather together, if prevented by conflicting working hours.

It is one of the few opportunities for children to say 'thank you' to their Mothers for all the love and care given to them throughout the year. This 'thank you' often takes the form of a small gift, a spray of flowers or a greetings card.

This tradition lives on and many local churches give a small spray of flowers to the children in the congregation to give to their Mothers as a token of their love and respect. Another name attributed to this festival is Simnel Sunday. Simnel Sunday is named after the practice of baking Simnel Cakes to celebrate the reuniting of families during the austerity of Lent. *Cont.*

Another tradition associated with Mothering Sunday is the practice of "clipping the church", whereby the congregation form a ring around their church building and, holding hands, embrace it.

In later times, Mothering Sunday became a day when domestic servants were given a day off to visit their mothers and other family members.

Simnel cake is a light fruit cake, similar to a Christmas cake, covered in marzipan, and eaten during Lent or at Easter in Great Britain, Ireland, and some other countries. A layer of marzipan or almond paste is also baked into the middle of the cake. On the top of the cake, around the edge, are eleven marzipan balls to represent the true disciples of Jesus; Judus is omitted. In some variations Christ is also represented, by a ball placed at the centre.

The cake is made from these ingredients: white flour, sugar, butter, eggs, fragrant spices, dried fruits, zest and candied peel.

Simnel cakes have been known since mediaeval times, and were originally a Mothering Sunday tradition, when young girls in service would make one to be taken home to their mothers on their day off. The word *simnel* probably derived from the Latin word *simila*, meaning fine, wheaten flour with which the cakes were made.

Rooster Association Annual General Meeting

On 25th February seventeen donor-members met in the Black Horse dining room for what proved an enjoyable and profitable meeting.

The Chairman, Alec Dodson, greeted the company and briefly reviewed the Association's four-year history. He then outlined the pattern of the evening : a session for informal discussion of the newsletter, a break for refreshments and then the AGM proper.

Discussion session : Topics raised

- <u>Profiles</u> Gerard Baker thought that profiles should include some younger residents.
- <u>Archive items</u> Gerard could offer details of village shops at the end of World War 1. Willis Ainley said that there were materials on the parish website and that he had old photographs on his computer. Leslie Helliwell also had photographs, some already used in *The Rooster*, and there must be many more in people`s homes. He said that County Archives had many old documents about Roos, especially about All Saints` church.

Gerard suggested an Archives Day for residents to display their photographs and old documents. Willis said such materials could be copied and stored electronically - but who should initiate the event? – Was it an appropriate role for the Association?

Other members thought it was and approved an Archives Committee comprising the following volunteers : Willis Ainley, Gerard Baker, Alec Dodson (Convenor), Margaret Dodson, Steve Pearson.

- <u>Parish Council</u> Alec Dodson said that the newsletter's reports were unsatisfactory. The Parish Council Minutes were not available until a month after each meeting and were too long to print in full. Instead, summarised extracts were printed – and late. No solution was suggested.
- <u>Illustrations</u> Leslie Helliwell wished some local artist could offer cartoons on local issues. Ann Coupe mentioned the current prize competition for Roos pupils to submit pictures about Easter.

The AGM proper

<u>Chairman</u> Alec Dodson reported welcoming Tim Newton back to the Committee and thanked all members for their support, especially Ann Coupe and Lawson Lewis who bore the brunt of producing *The Rooster* and managing deliveries. He thanked the volunteers who delivered copies in all weathers throughout the year and The Black Horse – Ron and Denise Symes, later Paul and Steph Kitchen – for allowing the premises to be used for meetings. He thanked Ann Coupe and Margaret Dodson for organising the evening`s refreshments.

He reminded members that items for printing should be passed to him or Ann Coupe and *not* be left with donations at the Roos Store.

Treasurer	Ken Cross's Report had been printed in February's newsletter. He said that from July 2007 to December 2009 the laser printer had saved $\pounds 1,264.79$ over previous costs. A replacement would be expensive but the cost was affordable.								
	There had been an increase in income from both advertisements and donations, though the number of donors had dropped : fewer donors had contributed more.								
	Gary Collinson said that the Roos Flying Club would probably be willing to make a substantial donation. Ann Coupe said that an article about the club would be appropriate.

Tunstall News

During late February the coastal part of the village experienced the annual spring tides. This year they were accompanied by extremely rough seas. But over the last six months there has been a steady build up of sand at Sand-Le-Mere and this has protected the coast from serious erosion by preventing the destructive waves from pounding the base of the soft boulder clay cliffs. This however could only be temporary and if the pattern of sea currents changes this sand could disappear in a matter of days. Unfortunately the erosion to the north at Hilston, and to the south towards Waxholme has continued unabated. In fact on March 2nd at 5.46pm, when the tide was at its highest, the waves could be seen breaking right over the top of the cliffs down the coast towards Withernsea.

I have been informed that the construction of the barrier to protect Tunstall Drain from the sea will commence in May. This will be a substantial structure across the valley and is intended to protect Roos flooding from that particular direction.

To the east of the barrier a salt marsh will eventually form, but here there could be an unsightly environmental problem. For some reason, not easily explained, objects made of expanded polystyrene and plastic, from large industrial barrels to the smallest water bottle, collect here having travelled many miles down the coast and from out at sea. Let's hope that in years to come the salt marsh becomes a tourist attraction, and not one huge unsightly plastic depository.

Simnel Cake

<u>Serves 10 - 12</u>

Ingredients

110g/4oz butter or margarine 110g/4oz soft brown sugar 3 eggs, beaten 150g/5oz plain flour Pinch of salt ½ tsp ground mixed spice (optional) 350g/12oz mixed raisins, currants and sultanas 55g/2oz chopped mixed peel ¹/₂ lemon, grated rind only 1-2 tbsp apricot jam 1 egg, beaten for glazing For almond paste: (Marzipan) 125g/4¹/₂oz caster sugar 125g/4¹/₂oz ground almonds 1 egg, beaten ¹/₂ tsp almond essence

Method

- 1. To make the almond paste. Place the sugar and ground almonds in a bowl. Add enough beaten egg to give a fairly soft consistency. Add the almond essence and knead for a minute until the paste is smooth and pliable. Roll out a third of the almond paste to make a circle 18cm/7in in diameter and reserve the remainder for topping of the cake.
- **2.** Preheat oven to 140°C/275°F, Fan 120/ Gas 1. **To make the cake.** Cream the butter and sugar together until pale and fluffy. Gradually beat in the eggs until well incorporated and then sift in the flour, salt and spice (if using) a little at a time. Finally add the dried fruit, peel and grated lemon rind and mix well.
- **3.** Put half the mixture in a greased and lined 18cm/7in cake tin. Smooth the top and cover with the circle of almond paste. Add the rest of the cake mixture and smooth the top leaving a slight dip in the centre to allow for the cake to rise. Bake in the preheated oven for 1½ hours. Once baked, remove from the oven and leave to cool.
- **4.** When you are ready to decorate the cake, preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F, Fan 160/ Gas 4. Brush the top of the cooled cake with the apricot jam. Divide the remainder of the almond paste into two. Roll out a circle to cover the top of the cake with one half and form 11 small balls with the other half.
- **5.** Place the circle of paste on the jam and set the balls round the edge. Brush all the top with a little beaten egg.
- **6.** Return the cake to the preheated oven for about 10 minutes or long enough for the almond paste to brown.

Alec's Patch ... By Alec Dodson

Spring is in the air, or nearly!! The lengthening daylight and sunshine encourages gardeners to venture out after the longest cold spell for many years. Take advantage of sheltered areas of the garden and the sun to carry out the following traditional tasks.

Rose pruning. For all roses use sharp clean secateurs. If yours are old and worn, invest in new ones. It will make the job easier and will result in cleaner cuts. Remember the three 'Ds' - dead, diseased and dying - and remove these first followed by any crossing or rubbing branches. When making a cut just above a bud imagine a new shoot growing from there. Will it crowd the inside of the bush or cause crossing branches? Aim to keep the centre of the bush open. Hybrid Teas are pruned to about 8" - 10" and floribundas to about 12".

<u>Shrubs.</u> Those that flower in the summer such as Buddleia, Lavatera and Cornus (Dogwood) are also pruned now.

Perennials. These can be divided and replanted if necessary. At the end of the month Snowdrops can also be separated and replanted. They benefit from being moved 'in the green' i.e. straight after flowering.

Greenhouse. If you have one check it over now as the winter weather may have caused glass to slip or problems to develop. If you winter Geraniums and Fuchsias, increase watering gradually. Remove dead leaves and cut back damaged stems. Ventilate the greenhouse on good days.

Roos Parish Council Meeting 8th March 2010 Apologies from Councillor Ken Grant. The January minutes were approved. Summary below.

2no oundary minutes were approved. B

Proposed allotments in Roos

Councillor Ward reported that a meeting was to take place shortly of interested residents to determine whether there was still a requirement for allotments.

Safe routes to school programme

It was agreed to press ERYC further in pursuing the joint developers of Greenacre Park to ensure early completion of the highway improvement works.

Carriageway at Rectory Road

It was reported that ERYC had improved the carriageway width at the problem location near North Farm and it was agreed to monitor the situation in the future.

Roos Playing Fields

A reply was received from the Chairman of the Playing Field Association stating that it was hoped to install a series of speed bumps when finances were available.

Flooding and related matters

The tree trunk which had fallen into the open beck below Lamb Lane had now moved downstream to the grille near Mr Beal's property in Dove Lane. Water was flowing freely and attempts to remove it would take place in the near future.

Grading, levelling and tree-stump uprooting works had now been completed at the access area to the grille on the beck north of Lamb Lane with seeding to follow in springtime.

A possible bund storage scheme for Rectory Road prepared by Mr Frisby of ERYC was circulated which it was intended to submit to ERYC for inclusion in its programme of works in the next financial year.

Applications

Erection of car port at 8 Hinch Garth Roos

It was agreed to raise no objections to the above proposal.

Decisions

Discharge of section 106 legal agreement from application relating to occupancy at Owstwick Grange Cottage Fitling Road Owstwick

It was reported that ERYC had refused the above application.

Appeals

The public inquiry into the appeal by Renewable Energy Systems against ERYC's refusal to grant planning permission for the erection of 9 no. wind turbines and associated works at land west of Ivy House, Rectory Road, Roos, would take place at County Hall on the 9th March at 10am with a local session at Roos Memorial Institute on the 16th March at 5.00pm.

It was reported that the Secretary of State had allowed the appeal by E. On UK Plc against ERYC's refusal to grant planning permission for 3 no. wind turbines

and associated works at land south of Pilmar Lane, Roos.

Parish Plan

An e-mail from Stephen Robinson of ERYC stated that it was hoped to undertake hedgerow planting along the northern boundary of Roos Playing Field when funding became available.

Treasurer's Report

Approval was given for payment of the following accounts:-

Councillor Dodson reported that he had met the Countryside Access Officer of ERYC to discuss a programme of proposed works on the paths in the next financial year.

Highway matters

It was agreed to refer to the Area Engineer of ERYC, overgrown hedges on Rostun Road, the damaged footpath on Pilmar Lane leading into Beechwood Views and a pothole at the edge of the carriageway on Burton Pidsea Road near the junction with the road to Owstwick, for attention.

Derelict farm building at South End

It was agreed to ask Mr Quarmby to attend to the unstable roof which was flapping around in the wind.

New 30 mph signs

Councillor Cheeseman referred to the new signs which were causing concern to motorists as there is now no speed limit sign on the left, when approaching the school along main street from north end and the Chairman confirmed that ERYC would be surveying the signage in the near future and reporting its findings back to him.
