Printing crisis for The Rooster

Unless someone is found to print the newsletter it may cease publication in a month or so.

This daunting realisation faced the Rooster Association Committee at a meeting on 29th April. Last month's request for a volunteer to take over from Lawson Lewis (who in June will have done three years in the job) produced no definite volunteers.

We could have the newsletter printed professionally but this would be a backward step. The Committee invested in a laser printer that has saved hundreds of pounds in costs. As one member said, "What we need is an operator, not an expensive external printing service."

Eventually it was agreed to make a final appeal - this one.

Usually 550 copies of *The Rooster* are printed: four sheets of A4 printed on both sides, i.e. 4400 printed sides in all. The process takes about six hours overall, though the operator does not need to be in constant attendance. The operator will <u>not</u> be asked to assemble and staple the pages.

All expenses (including the cost of materials) will be met from the Association's funds

What we are seeking is a person who owns a computer and will offer to:

- use our laser printer to print the pages from a disc (or e-mail) supplied;
- inform the Committee promptly of any problems (e.g. sickness or holiday dates).

NOT TO BE TAKEN SERIOUSLY

What a shame that those responsible for painting the new SLOW signs in Main Street didn't know up from down. Also that they made such a mess of their mistake before doing it properly. And all because of a lunatic fringe of drivers who probably can't read anyway.

My interest in signs, if you can call it that, goes back to my working days down south when I was often required to visit large estates of council flats. You could rarely see the name of the block from a distance but what you did see beside each one of them was NO BALL GAMES. All the lovely green areas where children in densely populated areas would most like to play their favourite games were forbidden. But it made me wonder whether those responsible had really thought about what they were doing because when you specifically ban one thing you tacitly accept all the others. So if you took your dog out for exercise you might have to beware of archers or javelin throwers but woe betide anyone playing table tennis.

A very common sign which I encountered said UNAUTHORISED PARKING IS PROHIBITED. When I was at school "unauthorised" meant not permitted and "prohibited" meant not permitted as well so this sign is a statement of the obvious. Here I must apologise to the trustees of the Memorial Institute who have a similar sign presumably to deter the miscreants who don't recognise iron railings and padlocked gates. But the same applies as to tacit acceptance so where, on one estate, the sign read NO UNAUTHORISED PARKING IN THE PARKING AREA it was taken to mean that anybody could park on the grass verges and estate roads without authority.

A similar pointless sign in Blackheath reads THIS CAR PARK WILL BE CLOSED HALF AN HOUR AFTER CLOSING TIME and another on an estate reading STOP COCK HERE. Now I've seen plenty of signs saying STOP COCK but that one made me wonder who might put one elsewhere. And does anyone know what to do when you are advised on the M25 that wild animals may be on the road for 3 miles.

In Withernsea at the bottom of Seaside Road we are advised to BEWARE OF BOATS CROSSING THE ROAD. Now I try to be aware of anything crossing the road and I would treat a wayward boat with the same caution but it does say something about the navigational skills of some of the boatmen. If we are to share the highway with wayward boats we must look carefully at the road signs. For instance, GIVE WAY to a motorist means slow down or even stop if there is anything in the way but to a boatman GIVE WAY means move off. And have you noticed how many of the boats in the yard have HULL painted on the hull. I suppose this is to help the inexperienced boatmen to launch them the right way up.

So when you read a sign don't take it too literally or you could end up in trouble.

Cookery Corner by Ann Coupe

Puff Pastry Mince Roll

Serves 6

Ingredients

1 (350g/12oz) packet frozen puff pastry

2 onions

1 small leek

350g/12oz white cabbage

100g/4oz mushrooms

450g/11b mixed minced meat

1 tablespoon butter

2 egg yolks

Salt and freshly milled white pepper

1 teaspoon soy sauce 100g/4oz Gouda cheese

1 egg seperated

450 calories per serving

Method

- **1.** Defrost the pastry. Dice the onions. Trim, wash and cut the leek into rings and the cabbage into fine strips. Trim, wash and finely slice the mushrooms.
- 2. Fry the onions and minced meat in the butter in a large frying pan. Add the vegetables and braise for 10 minutes, stirring frequently. Remove the minced meat and vegetables from the heat and work in the egg yolks, salt and pepper and the soy sauce. Finely dice the cheese.
- 3. Roll out the pastry into a large rectangle and spread it with the meat mixture, leaving 2.5cm/linch of pastry around the edge. Sprinkle with the cheese. Brush the pastry edges with beaten egg white and roll up the pastry, pressing the edges lightly together.
- **4.** Place the roll on a moist baking sheet and brush with egg yolk. Bake for 35 minutes in a moderate oven (200°C/400°F, gas 6, Fan 180°C) and serve hot.

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
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Alec's Patch ... By Alec Dodson

After a late spring, plants respond quickly to milder conditions in May. Gardeners should still be cautious when planting out tender plants as frosts can still be a problem when night skies are clear.

<u>Herbaceous Borders</u> Stake Delphiniums and other tall plants. Water any new plants and hoe between them to control weeds. Mulching with garden compost after rain has dampened the surface is a good tip.

<u>Greenhouse</u> Ventilate on fine days and damp down to maintain humidity. If you have taken cuttings make sure they do not dry out.

<u>House plants</u> The sun on south-facing windows can be too much for most house plants, so move them to another area.

Ponds If you have a pond, May is a good month to put in some new plants.

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Minutes of the April Parish Council Meeting

Roos Parish Council Meeting 10th May 2010

All Councillors were present.

The April minutes were approved. Summary below.

Tunstall coastal defence scheme

It was reported that the proposed public meeting to present scheme proposals had been cancelled at short notice by the Environment Agency and that it was understood that the schematic diagram originally presented by Angie McKinney to the Council at a recent meeting had since been amended. It was agreed to enquire of her the current position in relation to these two issues.

Councillor Craggs reported that he had forwarded to the Environment Agency photographs of debris build-up in the existing small lagoon together with concerns regarding borrow-pit depth and he circulated the response.

Proposed allotments in Roos

Members had inspected sites proposed by those interested in renting an allotment and after initial consideration it was agreed that prior to any decision on any of the proposed sites a further approach be made to the agents of the church authorities as to whether any land in its ownership was now available.

Safe routes to school programme

The Clerk reported that the highway improvement works had now been finally completed at Greenacre Park and that the further 30mph speed signs had now been provided by ERYC.

Salt Bins

The Chairman reported that the new salt bins at Beechwood Views, Roos, and near Tunstall Church provided by ERYC were now in situ.

East Riding draft tourism accommodation guidance

It was reported that circulation of the above document between members had been too slow resulting in a missed deadline to provide any comments on the draft to ERYC for consideration. It was agreed that in future material with a deadline should commence with the Chairman followed by the Vice Chairman followed by members who are requested to pass on the material as quickly as possible in order that deadlines are met.

Owstwick Grange Cottage

A further letter from Mrs Thompson was read out in relation to the recent planning application and it was agreed that a dangerous precedent would be set if the Council retrospectively reversed its previous decision not to support the application to ERYC to relax the section 106 legal agreement. It was pointed out that the matter had now gone to appeal on ERYC's refusal to grant planning permission and that the Planning Inspectorate would now determine the appeal in due course.

Wind turbine development at Tedder Hill

The Clerk reported that he had been advised by Paul Hunt of E.on that construction on site would not take place in 2010 with 2011 the earliest for site development. Mr Hunt had advised that no section 106 agreement had been incorporated in the planning approval conditions by ERYC and it was agreed to clarify this.

Flooding and related matters

It was agreed that footage of the ERYC camera survey of the piped section of the beck through Mr Beal's land in Dove Lane be reviewed again in the near future.

It was reported that the Council had been successful in obtaining £100,000.00 of funding from Defra to carry out flood relief works in the form of a possible water-storage area off Rectory Road. A project engineer had been appointed by ERYC to oversee the proposed works and the Council will be consulted prior to any works being undertaken.

A letter was received from Simon Taylor congratulating the Council on all the brilliant flood work undertaken in Roos and on the award of government funding to alleviate outstanding issues and for the Council's kind reference to his assistance following the 2007 floods in the recent article published in the Gazette. It was agreed that a suitable reply be forwarded to Mr Taylor.

Confirmation was received from ERYC that the gate in Lamb Lane near the entrance to the piped section of the beck was in hand, but due to new procurement rules three written quotes are required which slows the process down.

Southfield Lane

A letter was received from a resident of Tunstall about the condition of the lane. The Clerk reported that ERYC confirmed that soiling and seeding works would be undertaken together with patching repairs to the highway.

Highway matters

Confirmation was received from ERYC that the footways along Pilmar Lane leading to Beechwood Views and South End are included in this summers slurry-seal programme and that it was hoped to resurface the footway along Main Street opposite the school up to the crossroads in the autumn.

2010 Village Taskforce Programme

Initial correspondence was received from ERYC confirming that the parish would be visited to undertake minor improvements later in the year. Scheduled for September.

Planning

Applications

Erection of dwelling in connection with vehicle repair workshop (re-submission) at Peart Auto Services Quaker Road Owstwick for Mr and Mrs C Peart Roos

It was agreed to raise no objections to the above proposal.

Erection of building for a leisure centre alteration and extension of former agricultural buildings for purposes ancillary to holiday caravan site construction of outdoor swimming pool and further ancillary works for Sand Le Mere Caravan Park Ltd

It was agreed to ask ERYC for an extension for comments until the end of April on the application and Councillors Cheeseman and Craggs declared interests and would not participate in deliberations in the matter.

Decision

Erection of car port at 8 Hinch Garth for Mr A Burns

It was reported that ERYC had refused the above application.

Emergency plan

Councillor Cracknell reported that the plan was up to date and that it was hoped to run a

further table-top exercise on similar lines to the previous one within the next three months.

Treasurer's report

The Treasurer sought and received approval for payment of the following accounts: Zurich Insurance – renewal of insurance cover - £205.00

B Lee – Clerk's salary for three months - £775.00

Parish paths issue

The Chairman welcomed Mr Alan Bowden to the meeting who explained that a group was seeking approval for the reinstatement of a parish path leading towards and linking up with Burton Pidsea footpath no. 8. It was agreed to support the measures in principle and that on receipt of full details from Mr Bowden a letter of support be sent to the appropriate Authority.

Any other business

Car parking on Main Street near the school

It was reported that cars were being parked virtually all day near the school causing congestion problems for other road users and it was agreed to refer the matter to the head of school.

Hodgson Lane

It was reported that confirmation had finally been received from ERYC that the long awaited road improvements had now been scheduled to commence in July/August.

Public session

Mr Jackson of North End reported a problem of standing water on the highway at that location and it was agreed to refer the matter to ERYC for attention.

He also referred to an issue of the contract for the 10S school bus service no longer operating from Roos after July and he was advised to seek ERYC granting child transport if there were special and exceptional circumstances in the case of his child.


