# Cookery Corner ..... by Ann Coupe

# Marrow Moussaka

#### Serves 4

#### **Ingredients**

25g/1oz butter 1 onion (chopped) 450g/11b minced beef 40g/ 1½oz flour 150ml/ ¼pint beef stock 1 teaspoon tomato purée Salt and pepper Pinch of oregano 1 medium sized marrow 225g/8oz tomatoes (skinned and sliced) 300ml/ ½pint milk 175g/6oz Cheddar cheese (grated) Grated nutmeg Watercress for garnish

### Method

- 1. Melt 15g/1/20z of butter in a saucepan, add the onion, fry for a few minutes without browning.
- **2.** Add the minced beef, fry, stirring until brown.
- **3.** Stir in 25g/loz of flour, then the stock, tomato purée, seasoning and oregano. Simmer gently for fifteen minutes.
- **4.** Skin the marrow, remove the seeds, and cut the flesh into cubes. Boil in salted water for about ten minutes or until just tender. Drain well.
- **5.** Layer up the meat mixture, tomato slices, and morrow in 1.4 litre/2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> pint ovenproof dish, finishing with a marrow layer.
- **6.** Put the remaining butter and flour into a saucepan with the milk. Heat, stirring continuously, until the mixture boils and thickens.
- **7.** Add 100g/4oz of the cheese, and salt, pepper and nutmeg to taste. Pour over the marrow, sprinkle remaining cheese over the top.
- **8.** Bake gas mark 6, 200°C/400°F, Fan 180°C for 30-40 minutes, or until bubbling and golden brown.
- 9. Garnish with watercress and tomato.



# Alec's Patch ... By Alec Dodson

September is the first of the autumn months. Therefore gardeners should check stakes and ties are secure. Wall shrubs and climbers are particularly at risk from gales especially if there is rain as well creating additional weight on the branches and leaves. If frost is forecast be prepared to move plants indoors or to the greenhouse.

A final trim of hedges will improve the appearance of the garden. Mid-September onwards is a good time to plant evergreen hedges as the soil is still warm and there is less risk of them drying out.

Remove summer bedding from baskets, tubs and borders, and replace with bulbs and winter subjects such as primulas and pansies, ericas and ornamental kale. Small evergreen shrubs can be planted to give height to the display.

### **Roos Parish Council Meeting 13th September 2010**

Six Councillors were present together with ERYC's Karen Good and Ward Councillors Stead and Parsons also three

#### **res** representatives. Apologies from A Dodson & D Craggs The August minutes were approved. Summary below. **Proposed allotments in the parish**

Mr Grantham had indicated that he did not wish to release land in his ownership on Kiln House Lane, Tunstall, near to its junction with Seaside Lane. The Clerk together with the Chairman had identified land which may be suitable for which ownership had not been established and advised the Council to consider an approach to the Land Registry to confirm ownership details for which there would be a fee. The Council gave approval.

#### Car parking on Main Street near the school

A reply was received from the Headteacher of the school which stated that she had met with an engineer from ERYC to discuss congestion caused by vehicles parking outside the school but had misplaced her notes of the meeting and would respond further when she had located them.

#### **Eastfield Estate**

The Clerk produced a policy document he had obtained from ERYC which gave details of allocation of council housing throughout the East Riding and it was agreed to circulate the document amongst members.

#### Litter bins

The Chairman reported that the two new receptacles were now in place and that there would be an installation charge from ERYC of £91.30.

#### Parish path no. 5

Cllr Dodson confirmed that he had attended to the above path alongside the post office and the Clerk confirmed that ERYC had now approved grant funding for maintenance of the parish paths for the current financial year in the sum of £931.20. **Speeding vehicles in Main Street** Concern was still expressed that vehicles were ignoring the 30mph speed limit highlighted by the recently installed signage and the Chairman confirmed that he would contact Terry Weaver of ERYC to explore further options to address the issue. **Flooding and related matters** It was agreed that Cllrs Cracknell and Ward review the camera survey footage of the niped section of the beck through Mr Beal's land in Dove Lane to determine

whether there were any defects in the system and report back their findings to the next meeting

The Clerk produced copies of proposed ERYC schemes to the north of Roos to help alleviate future flooding. Details were circulated amongst members.

It was reported that ERYC's contractors had now erected the new gates in Lamb Lane at the entrance to the piped section of the beck and it was agreed that the Chairman and Cllr Ward each hold a key for access to the area should the need arise.

Cllr Ward confirmed that he together with Mr Wray would attempt to remove the tree trunk alongside the beck in the near future.

#### Correspondence

#### The late Cllr K Grant

The Clerk read a letter from Mrs Grant thanking the Council for expressing its sincere condolence in the sad loss of her husband and the Chairman paid tribute for all the unstinting work that Cllr Grant had undertaken on behalf of the Council and the community over many years.

#### Tunstall coastal defence scheme

The Clerk reported receipt of an invitation from the Environment Agency for members to attend a briefing on 16th August at 6.00pm in Roos Memorial Institute and the Chairman asked that as many members as possible attend the session.

#### Holderness streetscene pilot scheme

The Chairman referred to the above scheme, details of which had been circulated with the agenda papers. He hoped the proposed action would further improve the general appearance of the parish.

#### **Council vacancy**

The Clerk confirmed that appropriate notices had been placed in the notice boards announcing the casual vacancy and that ERYC had advised that an election had not been called and that the Council may now fill the vacancy by co-option.

#### Erection of detached dwelling at land north of The Willows, South End, Roos

It was agreed to recommend refusal of the above application on Conservation Area status and access grounds, impact on neighbouring properties and possible future flooding issues with the site's location near to Roos Beck.

*Erection of single-storey extension at rear at The Old School Cottage, Pilmar Lane* It was agreed that no objections be made to the above proposal.

#### Decisions

*Conversion of outbuildings to additional living space at The Laurels, Main Street, Roos* It was reported that ERYC had approved the above application.

*Erection of entrance gates steel boundary fence alterations to existing vehicular access at Hilston Cottage, Tower Road, Hilston* 

It was reported that ERYC had approved the above application.

#### Appeal decision

Owstwick Grange Cottage, Fitling Road, Owstwick

Notification was received from ERYC that the Planning Inspectorate had allowed the appeal into ERYC's refusal to discharge a planning obligation.

#### Application withdrawal

*Variation of condition 2 at Church Farm Riding School Tower Road Hilston* It was reported that the above application had been withdrawn.

#### ERYC Taskforce visit

Members were reminded that the "walkabout" to highlight areas requiring attention by ERYC was taking place on the 17<sup>th</sup> August meeting up initially at the Memorial Institute at 10.30am with the actual works due to commence on 20<sup>th</sup> September.

#### **Roos playing field**

It was reported that two children had sustained injuries in the toddlers' play area and it was further reported that the incident would be discussed at the next Playing Field Association meeting.

#### Fly tipping at Tunstall Cliff top

It was reported that rubbish had been dumped at the above location and it was agreed to make ERYC aware of the situation.

#### Parish paths issue

It was agreed to enquire of Burton Pidsea Parish Council if that authority had agreed to support the application for the reinstatement of a parish path leading towards and linking up with Burton Pidsea footpath no. 8.

#### Wind Farm development - land west of Ivy House Rectory Road Roos

The Chairman reported that the developers of the above project which had recently been granted planning permission on appeal had expressed an interest in attending the next meeting to discuss their proposals for the site in more detail and it was agreed to accede to the request.

#### Public session

A member of the public enquired of the present situation with regard to proposed affordable housing in Roos and was advised that the Humber & Wolds Community Association had not pursued the matter further following the 2007 flooding of the village.


