

## Roos Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund opens for applications

The Fund is open for applications from Tuesday 1st December 2015 until Thursday 31st March 2016. A panel made up of representatives from the area of benefit will then meet the week commencing 23rd May 2016 to consider applications.

Charitable and community organisations have a source of funding thanks to the successful completion of the Roos Wind Farm in East Holderness. Applications are now invited for the 2016 fund, which is the 3<sup>rd</sup> year of the funds.

RES, the British independent renewable energy company that developed the nine turbine wind farm, has established a Community Fund to provide £36,000 per year (index linked) to support local community projects during the lifetime of the wind farm.

Applications to the Fund are invited from groups and projects who can demonstrate that their activities benefit the communities living and working within 5km of Roos Post Office. This area includes the parishes of Burton Pidsea, Rimswell, Halsham and Roos.

## All Saints' Church Roos Churchyard.

The Clergy and congregation of All Saints Church in Roos have been caring for the local community for hundreds of years, and this care is never more needed than at the sad time when a loved one passes on. The clergy spend time walking with the bereaved, looking after their needs and preparing for their loved ones funeral and burial in the churchyard. Because of the beauty of the church, the avenue of yew trees and the rural idyll of the graveyard, many families want to have their baptisms, weddings as well as their funerals with burials at All Saints Church. Many of these families will then use the church's grounds for their photographs following a baptism or a wedding.

Recently however the church has had several incidents of people scattering ashes of a loved one in the churchyard, and whilst we desire to be pastorally sensitive to people who are bereaved, we also need to be sensitive to the many other people who use the churchyard every day. The Church of England currently does not authorise anything but the burial of ashes in its churchyards and I, as vicar, am more than happy to talk to any bereaved families who would like to bury their loved one's ashes in the churchyard and provide a remembrance plaque or small stone over the place of the burial.

For those families who would like to scatter ashes I am more than happy to be in attendance and to say some prayers as you come to scatter those ashes in a place outside of the churchyard that hold special memories for the family. I would, however, humbly request that families do not scatter ashes within the churchyard as this can cause some upset to other users of the church and the churchyard. #### **February Thought**

The start of Lent is almost upon us, and we spend a lot of time thinking about what we shall give up for Lent. Spend a joyful moment in the presence of God, say a prayer for someone you know that needs one, come and join a friend in worship at All Saints Church, take a walk in God's creation, be it in the countryside or by the beach, and feel his presence in your life. This Lent don't give up, take God on...... know that he is with you always!

#### **Pipe Organ Update Roos**

A second group visit to Harrogate to the workshop of Peter Wood & Son took place on November 10<sup>th</sup>. We were able to admire the truly amazing craftsmanship and skill of those working on the Roos pipe organ. Mark Wood pumped up the newly restored main bellows so that we could see for ourselves that they no longer leak!

Later that same week, the bellows and several other major components were transported back



to the church where they can be viewed in the newly restored organ chamber.

Our case worker at The Heritage Lottery Fund is pleased with the management of the project thus far and has paid us the second instalment of our grant which will enable work to continue unabated. Meanwhile, our skilled Churchwarden John McWilliams has begun the pains-taking task of reinstating the original high Victorian decoration to the front pipes under the supervision of the organ builders. These pipes had been oversprayed in gold paint sometime in the past, but when they were rubbed down by the organ builder; traces of a highly ornate design were revealed. Examinations of early postcards of the church show this decoration quite clearly. The paint fragments have been accurately colour matched and the result is very striking.

The rebuild of the organ will commence on April 4<sup>th</sup>. It will take approximately three weeks and during this time the church will be open to give visitors the opportunity to see exactly what this remarkable project has entailed. We will be asking for volunteers to help steward the church during this period, so do get in touch if you have a couple of hours (or more) to spare and would like to be involved.

#### **Local Community Transport – Survey**

A Questionnaire printed by the ERYC was now in the process of being distributed to households for completion. It has also been uploaded to the parish website roosparish.info

#### **Speeding Vehicles**

The outcome of the ERYC survey into speeding on Rectory Road and on Main Street adjacent to the School has been published. The relevant extracts are quoted below

Rectory Road, Roos - The analysis provided by the ERYC Traffic Engineer states, "The rating awarded to Rectory Road is 2 which does not qualify for speed enforcement or involvement by our Road Safety Section.

Main Street Roos - "The rating awarded to Main Street is 16 which means it qualifies for speed enforcement by the Police.

It was agreed to invite the Police Officer responsible for Community Policing to a future meeting to comment upon and explain current policing policy.

#### **ERYC Planning Applications**

- Erection of general purpose agricultural building following demolition of existing piggeries at Town Farm,
   Main Street, Tunstall 15/03241/PLF. A letter expressing objection on behalf of Tunstall residents was read.
   It was noted that the applicant has entered into pre application discussions with the Conservation Officer.
   Councillors expressed concerns about the proposed height of the building and its potential impact upon the
   Conservation Area. Subsequently, amended plans were submitted and at its January meeting, the Council
   was pleased to note that many of their earlier concerns had been addressed. However, the height of the
   building had not been reduced as recommended by the Conservation Officer. It was agreed to write to the
   ERYC accordingly.
- Construction of menage for private use at Glebe Farm Hilston Road Roos 15/03782/PLF Councillors
  expressed some concern about light pollution from the proposed lighting scheme, and agreed to write to the
  ERYC.
- Erection of single storey extension to rear and alterations to existing window at front at 8 South Park Roos 15/03913/PLF. No objection. Alterations and extensions including erection of an orangery at rear, installation of and alterations to windows and Juliet balcony at 25 Elm Garth Roos 15/03822/PLF

#### **ERYC Planning Decisions** The following have been approved:

- Erection of single storey extension to rear following demolition of existing at Field Cottage Rectory Road Roos.
- Erection of single storey extension to rear following demolition of outbuildings, erection of single storey
  extension to front of outbuilding to form gymnasium and erection of detached garage at Roseneath South
  End Roos.
- Siting of log cabin to use as replacement dwelling to allow for roll back due to coastal erosion at land west of Parkfield Seaside Lane Tunstall.
- Erection of a single storey extension to the rear of Elm Cottage, Elm Garth, Roos -15/02832/PLF
- Erection of detached dwelling with car port land west of The Paddock South End Roos 15/01/1383/PLF

#### **NEW BUS SERVICE**

Thank you for returning your Transport Questionnaires which will be most helpful to the Roos Parish Council. A new bus service begins on Tuesday March 1<sup>st</sup>. A Transport Group in Burton Pidsea have raised funds from Tedder Hill and Burton Pidsea Wind farms to run a Pilot service initially for 8 months. The service will run on a Tuesday and Wednesday each week taking people from Burton Pidsea and Roos to Hedon. The service is called CB3 (Community Bus 3). It will do two trips to Hedon and two returns through the day. It is timed to allow passengers to link with EYMS no76 buses to and from Hull. If you want to learn more you are invited to an open meeting at 10.30 on Saturday 20th February in The Memorial Hall at Burton Pidsea. Passengers with concessionary passes will travel free. For more information, timetables etc watch the noticeboards and shops in the village.
