Magna Carta 800



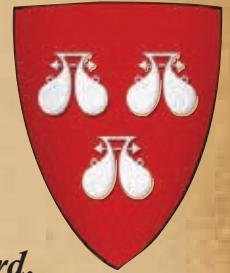
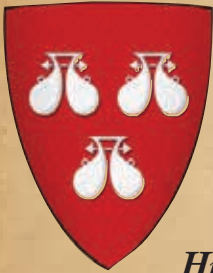

What's your favourite tree in Roos?

Over the next year or two, the RWG will map the special trees in our village – so let us know which trees you really love – be they the Yews in the churchyard, The Black Poplars on Halsham Road or the huge Ash tree near to the Church – the tallest tree in Roos.

The reason we are putting a map together is that we need to identify special and vulnerable trees so that we can protect them against disease – in particular Ash Die Back which is already killing young trees in the village.

Ash Trees make up 20-25% of all the trees in Roos, losing them to disease would mean a terrible loss to our landscape. If we can effectively map what trees we have, we can begin to make plans to replant well in advance of any losses. We hope that by removing young diseased trees, we can reduce the risk of losing our wonderful old ones.

The Bells at All Saints' Roos

If anyone has been wondering why the bells at All Saints' Roos have been ringing more than usual lately, there have been some very good reasons.



Victory in Europe (VE Day) was marked by a quarter peal in Roos on Friday May 8th. Bells across the nation rang out over that weekend. The following day, we were joined by members of the Beverley and District Ringing Society for more ringing. We

provided refreshments in the church and it was good that so many members of the community came to join us while the church was open.

Sunday May 10th, Liam Ledger age 12 rang his first quarter peal. It was arranged at short notice to celebrate the birth of Princess Charlotte as it is traditional for bells to mark Royal events.

Not to be outdone, Lloyd Ainley has also rung a quarter peal recently. At 11 years old he is our youngest ringer to achieve this milestone.

Over the bank holiday weekend, the Beverley and District Ringing Society hosted the annual conference for Church bellringers. 200 delegates from all over the world descended on Hull, the Royal Mercure Hotel being their base. The Mayor of Hull hosted a civic reception in the Guildhall which was also the venue for the conference dinner. Our bells at Roos were of

particular interest because we have gone from 5 to 8 bells in a short space of time. A group from America came to ring on the Friday. A full peal was rung by council members on the Saturday and more visitors came to ring on the Sunday morning. Ringers from Roos were kept busy welcoming visitors both here in Roos, and also at the hotel and other towers.

The early morning BBC Radio 4 programme 'Bells on Sunday' was broadcast from Holy Trinity Church Hull. A member of the Roos band took part in the ringing which was recorded for that.

The bells are proving to be a wonderful way of increasing the footfall to and interest in our beautiful Grade 1 listed church and we anticipate that the forthcoming restoration of the pipe organ which commences on July 13th will attract further visitors.

Parish Council Comment

A review of Parish Council matters concludes with an update on:

Wind Farm Community Funds.

Roos Parish, (Roos, Tunstall, Hilston and Owstwick, now benefits from three wind farm community funds:

- Roos Wind Farm (operated by RES (Renewable Energy Systems)
- Tedder Hill Wind Farm (operated by INFINIS)
- Burton Pidsea Wind Farm (operated by Energiekontor)

Roos Parish Council is represented on each of the awarding panels. The area of benefit and arrangements for the management of each fund is different. Community groups and others should evaluate which fund is most likely to suit their needs.

Roos Wind Farm Community Fund

Donation Value: £36,000

Area of benefit - 5km of Roos Post Office

The allocations of funds are for:-

Projects which can demonstrate benefit for the community

The fund is managed by a Community Interest Company (CIC) with local and community based directors, administration being provided by the East Riding Voluntary Action Services (ERVAS).

The fund awarding panel has already awarded grants to local groups and organisations, with a further round of applications currently under consideration.

Tedder Hill Wind Farm Community Fund

Donation value: A single donation of £100,000 followed by an annual payment of £5000.

Area of benefit - The East Riding of Yorkshire with a preference for appropriate schemes within 5 km of Roos Post Office

The allocations of funds are for:-

- Advancement of education
- Advancement of citizenship or community development (including rural or urban regeneration and the promotion of civic responsibility, volunteering, the voluntary sector or the effectiveness or efficiency of charities)

- Advancement of environmental protection or improvement
 - The promotion of sustainable development or improvement which meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.
- Including, (but without limitation) the promotion of energy efficiency measures and sustainable transport options.

Burton Pidsea Community Wind Farm Fund

Donation value - £20,400 annually

Area of Benefit: The Electoral Wards of North Holderness, Mid Holderness, South East Holderness and South West Holderness with a preference for initiatives within the proximity of the wind farm.

The criteria for the allocation of funds are not specified.

Roos Parish Council Annual General Meeting.

Roos Parish Council Meeting May 2015

ERYC Development Plan: Proposed Submission Allocations Document January 2014

It may be recalled that the draft strategy document identified Roos as a Primary Village, with 40 new dwellings proposed over the period to 2028/29.

The document allocates two sites for future residential development. A site adjacent to Beechwood Views for which a Planning Application has been submitted (Planning ref. 13/03138/PLF) and a site east of Eastfield Estate.

The strategy document was later revised (2015) following Public Inspection. It now proposes an increase of six for the Beechwood Views site, making a total of 17 dwellings in all.

Consequently, 13 dwellings for the site east of Eastfield Estate, taking the total to 40.

Elections.

The outcome of the national and local elections established that:

Graham Stuart (Conservative) will serve as MP.

Jackie Cracknell, Lynn Healing and Arthur Hodgson will serve the South East Holderness Ward of the ERYC:

Willis Ainley, Ann Coupe, Jackie Cracknell, Alec Dodson, Keith Tyson, John Ward, and David Winter were elected without contest to serve on Roos Parish Council resulting in two vacancies to be filled.

The Parish Council has resolved to follow due electoral procedures, namely, that the vacancies will be advertised, the outcome of which will determine

whether an election is necessary, or, that co-options may be made.

Dog Fouling

Following receipt of further complaints it was agreed to request the ERYC to write to each individual household in the immediate locality of complaint, and, to seek further information to enable statutory action to be taken against offending dog owners.

Speeding Traffic

A letter was received expressing concern about traffic speeding through the village particularly on Rectory Road. It was agreed to contact the appropriate authorities for traffic law enforcement.

Planning

Applications:

- Extension to the rear of at Cairn Cottage, Hilston Road, Roos. Ref 15/01177/PLF - No objection.
- Erection of garage to side and rear, alterations to windows, doors and existing balcony to front following demolition of existing garage at The Paddocks, South End, Roos. Ref.

No: 15/01384/PLF. No objection, however further information is being sought about any conditions that may be attached.

Distribution and consultation on planning applications by electronic means.

ERYC are seeking to move to the distribution of planning documents and drawings by electronic means. In discussion members commented upon the presumption that all members and councils had the appropriate IT resources, and, additionally that it transferred additional work and expense from the ERYC to the Council. It was agreed that the council explore the possibility of purchasing an IT resource through wind farm community funding. The resource would be available for community use.

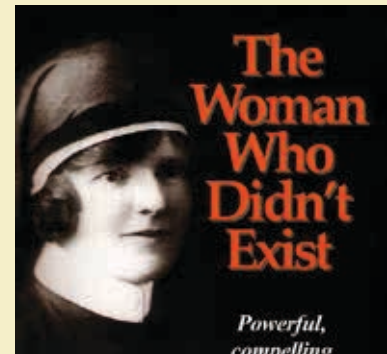
The Pinfold

Old English Sheepdogs



We are a small hobby breeding kennel based in Roos, East Yorkshire and a member of the Kennel Club Accredited Breeder Scheme.

Established in 2007 we currently have 4 dogs here at home (Max, Phoebe, Bramley & Priya) and one that we co-own (Piper) who lives near Newark.

We began showing our dogs in 2008 and have been relatively successful at this with Phoebe becoming an Irish Champion in 2011, Bramley becoming an Irish Junior Champion in 2012 and is also well on his way to becoming a UK Champion.

Phoebe had one litter before being neutered in 2013 and is now enjoying a well deserved retirement with her best buddy Max.

The two current Show dogs are both in full coat which is plenty to keep me occupied, especially when it takes approximately 8 hours per dog to get them prepared for a show.



The breed in general is very placid and despite their size do not actually require a lot of room, neither do they eat huge amounts of food. They are great with children but like any breed of dog care should be taken at all times. They are faithful, loyal to the core, intelligent (sometimes), but can also be very stubborn.
