


Reassuringly Roos suffers from few crimes. We increasingly discover that victims are a result of opportunistic criminals who have found insecurities such as open windows or property left on display. Recent trends include Burglaries where car keys are taken from porches or door locks, resulting in the loss of the car. Fraud involving cold callers (telephone), stating they are from the Police or bank asking to confirm details or to ring back. The Police or Banks will not do this and you should terminate the call. If you wish reassurance ring the numbers provided on the reverse of your bank card ensuring you have a dial tone first. The scam involves the line remaining open to the fraudsters.

Your local officers still provide crime prevention advice and home visits can be made. We recommend registering with www.immobilise.com a free secure web site that allows you to record property details. Items include mobile phones, ipads, Xboxes etc etc. Should you be a victim of crime or loss, you update the web site. It is searchable by all UK police forces / second hand dealers and insurers. You stand a better chance to have your property returned and bring offenders to justice. Ask any officer for more information.

Woodlands Group

As the fields surrounding the village are emptied of the harvest, Autumn hovers on the horizon – it seems to get earlier every year. Some of our trees also appear to be joining the race to senesce. Look at the crown of the large Elm tree on lamb lane – it has been fading now for a month and will soon die. Its siblings opposite Dents Garth are already dead. Dutch Elm disease is still prevalent in our parish – thirty five or more years since it arrived. There are few skeletons of old Elms left now – beautiful trees that were once populous across the UK. Nothing was done to replant the Elms, leaving huge gaps in our landscape. They occasionally reappear as thin whips, only to be re infected in a process that seems to cycle every 15 years or so.



More worrying for our generation is the threat of Ash Tree die back and Horse Chestnut Canker—which will kill nearly half the trees in our village in the coming decade. It is inevitable. The Roos Woodland Group is working, now, with landowners to plant a mixed diversity of trees in the parish so that we can avoid a repeat of the terrible loss of the Elms. It's not a cheap job, and we are busy fundraising through various events. Check out our facebook page Roos Woodland Group for more info. We'd love to have more supporters and group members. South Holderness Medical Practice

We are delighted to have increased our Practice Nurse Team this month. Nurse Jenni has recently joined us from the District Nurse team. Evie, our Healthcare Assistant, who works full time across our sites and now runs regular clinics at Roos too. She carries out procedures such as Blood Pressure tests, ECG fitting, B12 injections and lifestyle advice amongst other things. Please make an appointment to see her. If you are unsure which of our nursing team you should book in with please speak to one of our receptionists who will be able to clarify for you.

We have also just recruited an Apprentice Dispenser who will be based mostly at our Roos practice. Dispensing patients can now benefit from our managed repeats service. You are now able to simply collect your medication without the need to telephone first. You will be asked by the dispenser if you require <u>all</u> your items when you collect your medication. Our dispenser will then tell you when it will be available for collection next month. Please make sure when collecting your medication to tell the Dispenser if your needs have changed so you do not receive any surplus and we avoid wastage to the NHS.

With the introduction of the managed repeat system the telephone ordering of prescriptions service will soon be phased out. If you are not signed up to our managed repeat service you

will still be able to request medication via our on-line service, in person or by post.

The Annual Parish and Roos Parish Council Meeting August 2015

Parish Council Minutes are published in full on Parish Notice Boards and on the parish website – roosparish.info All current parish councillors were present together with five members of the public.

The Chair opened proceedings explaining that this was a meeting for members of the public to raise issues and to bring them to the attention of the Council.

The Rooster Association :- Members of the Rooster Association confirmed that the revisions to the Constitution had been approved and adopted at their recent Extra-Ordinary General Meeting. Notice of the meeting had been widely publicised throughout the parish and advertised in the Gazette. Officers now requested that funds held by the Council for safekeeping be released to the Association. This was agreed. There was no other public business.

Parish Council Meeting August 2015 The Minutes of the meeting held on 14th July were approved.

Matters Arising. It was noted that:

Very little further progress had been made on the Tunstall Coastal Scheme.

The parish notice board had now been relocated and would be completed with a suitable heading panel including the Roos Coat of Arms.

Cllr. Cracknell had presented the Council's observations about the proposed extension of residential development of Roo-A Beechwood Views to the Planning Inspector on 15th August.

The recently appointed Councillors Ann Wall and Bob Smales would attend the September meeting.

Correspondence.

Commemorative Medal

In collaboration with Roos School, it was agreed that sufficient Commemorative medals be provided to celebrate Queen Elizabeth II becoming the longest serving monarch in British history on September 9th.

Local Community Transport

It was agreed to conduct a survey across the parish to establish local transport needs following the decision of EYMS to withdraw their public bus services 174/175 - Withernsea/Hull. The survey has been prompted by representations from the Burton Pidsea Community Transport Group who are working in collaboration with the ERYC. A questionnaire is being prepared for distribution.

ERYC Planning – Decisions It was reported that the following two applications had been approved: 15/01457/PLF -Erection of detached garage at Mayfield Farm, Tower Road, Hilston, and, 15/04/1412/PLF - Erection of two storey extension to existing outbuildings at The Chestnuts, Rectory Road. Roos.

Playing Fields Roos

I am writing this to update you on recent grant awards and to correct a few misconceptions of how the Playing Field is funded and operated. Roos Playing Field Association was founded in 1979 with the objectives to be "to assist in the provision of facilities for the recreation and other leisure time occupation of the inhabitants of the Parish of Roos, these facilities being provided in the interests of social welfare and with the aim of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants." A lease was acquired on the field behind the school and after years of intensive fund raising the hall and changing rooms were erected in 1989. The Association is run by a committee of volunteers and any recreational body in the village is entitled to a representative on it. There are considerable overheads with insurance at £1600+ and grass cutting at £1055 as well as field rent, rates, electric, water and maintenance. We do not receive any Council funding and the income from sports teams and other users of the field and hall covers less than half of these costs. We receive donations from Farmyard Bingo and the Black Horse Auction but this still leaves us with a considerable shortfall which has to be covered by various fund raising activities.

With a view to cutting the need for this constant fund raising we shopped around for cheaper insurance and applied to the various wind farm community funds for grants. We managed to get £400 off the insurance bill and the following awards. In March we got £2855 towards replacement windows and guttering, from Roos WFCF, which should help with our energy and maintenance costs. In June we were awarded £5000, again from Roos WFCF, towards the cost of a Ransomes mower which, after fuel costs, should save us £1000 per year. Also in June we were awarded £5250 from Tedder Hill WFCF for the installation of solar panels on the pavilion roof. These have been installed but as yet we have not received the money to pay for them, but I have been informed that this will arrive this week. From these we should get a combined income and savings of about £700 per year. We also applied to the Burton Pidsea fund for new doors but were not successful .

This week there is some painting and decorating being done to the changing rooms, men's showers and outside containers. This is costing us nothing as the labour and materials are supplied by East Riding Voluntary Action Services Ltd young volunteers.

All the above should enable us to continue to provide recreational facilities for the community for the future. We would like to see a greater useage of the hall, so if there is anything that puts you in mind of using it please let us know as there will be more opportunities to improve, or provide new, facilities with wind farm community funding.
