Please ensure you take up the offer of your flu vaccination if you are in one of the following categories

- Those aged 65 years and over
- Those aged six months to under 65 in clinical risk groups
- Pregnant women
- All two-, three- and four-year –olds (but not five years or older) on 31 August 2015
- All children of school years 1 and 2 age
- Those in long-stay residential care homes
- any carers please note carers can inadvertently pass on flu to those they care for so this is very important

We will be running clinics in Roos. In addition you are welcome to book a time at our other sites. As last year we will have Saturday and later evening clinics on offer at Withernsea. We also this year expect to be able to offer appointments on demand at Withernsea. Evie, our healthcare assistant, will be giving vaccinations this year alongside our Practice Nurse team



Parish Council Meeting September 2015

Parish Council Minutes are published in full on Parish Notice Boards and on the parish website – roosparish.info
The Chairman welcomed Cllr Bob Smales and Cllr. Ann Wall as newly co-opted members. Apologies were received from Cll. J.
Ward. The Minutes of the 10th August were approved.

Matters Arising. It was noted that:

Local Community Transport – Survey. Councillors who had been delegated to prepare a draft questionnaire had met with Colin Walker at the ERYC, to discuss their draft and to arrange for its printing. It was agreed to approach the editor of the Rooster about its distribution. An invitation was received to attend a meeting at The Shores Centre, Withernsea on October 7th at 6.30 pm. To discuss rural transport issues.

Commemorative Medal

There had been a high level of interest and a further order had been placed to meet the demand. Pupils of Roos Primary School had been presented their commemorative medal by Cllr. J. Cracknell.

Telemetry systems at Roos Beck. ERYC would cease its funding from April 2016. They provided estimates to maintain the system should the Council take over. The estimates were prohibitively high and taking into account there had been only one early warning since its installation and recent jetting by both Yorkshire Water and the ERYC it was agreed not to proceed.

Memorial Institute

Mr/Mrs Cheeseman welcomed the suggestion of installing Wifi provision and further investigation was underway. ERYC Planning – Applications

Installation of ground mounted solar panels at land north of Glebe Farm Hilston Road Roos – Ref. 15/02121/PLF Erection of detached dwelling with car port at land west of The Paddock South End Roos – Ref. 15/01383/PLF Erection of single storey extension to rear following demolition of outbuildings erection of single storey extension to front of outbuilding to form gymnasium and erection of detached garage at Roseneath South End Roos – Ref 15/02549/PLF

Following discussion there were no objections to the above applications.

Decision –It was reported that the following application had been approved

Fell scots pine growing through horse chestnut and crown lift horse chestnut by approx. 15 feet at The Willows South End Roos

The Chair reported that extreme concern was expressed by local residents at a 'drop in session' hosted by Dong Energy at Tunstall Village Hall. The meeting was to discuss the proposed Doppler weather radar station for taking measurements for the Westermost Rough Offshore Windfarm –Ref 15/01772/PLF. The installation would be in place for a period of eighteen months. He reported that additional hedgerow planting to provide screening was being planned

Any Other Business

Chair reported that following complaints from residents about speeding in Roos, Police Community Support Officers had conducted radar speed gun surveys on Rectory Road and elsewhere. Other surveys would take place without prior announcement.

Council refuse operatives had reported that the waste- bin located at the Pinfold was not being utilised and that the consideration should be given to its relocation. Council agreed to consider this suggestion.

In response to an enquiry from a LifeStyler Group it had been suggested that they might consider making a contribution towards the replacement of a bench seat on the Withernsea Road.

Cllr. Tyson, Chair of the RES Roos Wind Farm Community Fund, commented upon the need for publicity drawing attention of local groups and eligible organisation to the next round of funding.

Public Session

Residents adjacent to the planning application for a dwelling west of The Padddock, had expressed their concern to ERYC about the method of surface water disposal with its location being at a higher level than their property. They also reported straw following harvesting was gathering in roadside gullies.

Date of next meeting Monday 14th October 2015 at 7.30pm in the Memorial Institute.

Woodland Group Roos

The autumn seems to have arrived suddenly and many of the large trees in the village are already turning into their autumn colours. As daylength decreases and the nights get colder, woody plants pull back valuable chemicals from their leaves - especially the pigment that in the summer colour the leaves green.

This is chlorophyl, the compound that traps energy from sunlight, allowing the plant to grow. It's a complex chemical that 'costs' plants a lot of resources to make. It makes sense, then for the trees to pull it back into their woody stems, all ready for the next year. Scratch the bark of a woody plant in the winter, and you will see a green layer just beneath the outer layer - a sure sign that the tree or plant is indeed alive - and just biding its time for the coming season. Roll on Spring!

The beautiful colours that are left in the leaf are those that the tree or shrub either doesn't need or can't reuse. Lucky us that the Acers, Beech and Birches are particularly rich in fabulous autumn shades.

On a happy note, the Roos Woodland Group raised over £800 at a recent Moroccan evening, which was a lovely community event with many friends from near and far. Thanks to all who attended and offered help. Gerard Baker, Chair.
