Defibrillator in Roos

If you think you need to access the defibrillator:



- Dial 999 **BEFORE** going to collect the device
- The caller will ask questions and advise if you need to get the device
- Other advice and information will be ongoing whilst resources are on their way to you
- If the caller thinks you need the device they will tell you the exact location and the cabinet access code
- The caller will NOT hang up until an ambulance or Rapid Response Unit are at your side

All Saints' Church Roos Giving it up for Lent?


As we enter into March we start the period of Lent. Shrove Tuesday is a time when we make pancakes, but in reality we are clearing our house of sweetmeats and titbits ready to begin Lent which starts the following day on Ash Wednesday. Most people will say to themselves at the beginning of Lent, 'I am going to give up...... for Lent.'. Into the space you can place whatever vice it is that you wish to give up, be it alcohol, or cigarettes or chocolate or rollerskating or whatever. For the following 40 days and 40 nights I meet lots of edgy people suffering from withdrawal symptoms from not being able to eat chocolate or go rollerskating etc. The whole idea of giving something up in Lent is to create a space in your life so that you can spend it with God instead. However I often meet people who have created this space in their life, but instead of filling it with God, they spend their time filling it with, 'I can't wait to eat a chocolate bar, I am really looking forward to biting through that delightful mix of biscuit, caramel and chocolate in a Twix'. Or perhaps instead people are thinking, 'Only 20 more days to go before I can feel the rush of wind in my hair as I shoot down the hill on my favourite skateboard.' If you find that this is happening to you then Lent is not really fulfilling the purpose it is there for. To me the Christian faith is one of joy and happiness, it is a feeling of wonder and delight in being in God's presence. I would therefore say to people don't give something up for Lent, take God on. I think it is perfectly possible, plausible and acceptable this Lent to eniov a good chocolate bar, a fantastic ride down the hill on a skateboard and also spend time in the presence of God. So for this Lent I pray that all of you may be able to find some special moments to come into the presence of God, and that as you do so you will recognise how joyous and happy that moment is. **Rev Martin**

Woodland Group Roos

Old for New

For those of you who walk through Roos Churchyard you may be familiar with the large Sweet Chestnut tree near the main gates. Sadly, having reached maturity, the tree is now dying and is posing a danger to walkers and traffic on Rectory Road. The tree sits within land owned by Elm Farm and it is proposed, having obtained the necessary permissions, to have the tree taken down by a qualified arborist in the near future.

The Sweet Chestnut tree is just one of a whole range of trees around the village reaching maturity that will, in a few years to come, need to be taken down either because they have become dangerous or, in the case of the Ash trees, (which make up a large proportion of the village's mature trees), have succumbed to Ash Die Back disease.

The Roos Woodland Group was established several years ago with the aim of conserving and enhancing the natural environment within the village and around the parish with a particular focus on new tree planting to replace those that are reaching maturity.

We are therefore working with Elm Farm to not only look at how best to replace the Sweet Chestnut but also how to develop a more comprehensive plan to improve the tree plantings around the Roos Churchyard. One area of concern are the trees to the north of the church path. These trees, made up of a few alder and lime and a large number of seedling ash and sycamore were planted by the local council several years ago. Having had little management these are densely packed and spindly as well as shallow rooted and are shading the Yew avenue thus affecting its growth. As this area falls within a conservation zone, it is proposed to develop a management plan, with an appropriate consultation process involving the East Riding of Yorkshire Tree Officer and the Parochial Church Council alongside the necessary permissions from the East Riding Council. This plan, which will not happen immediately because of the protracted planning process, is likely to involve removal of the majority of these spindly, shallow rooted trees to be replaced by more interesting, larger specimen trees that will improve the overall appearance of this part of the village making a focal point for the future. Roos Parish Council Report: February 2017

Parish Council Minutes are published in full on Parish Notice Boards and on the Parish website – roosparish.info Correspondence

A letter was received from Cllr. John Ward tendering his resignation due to work commitments. Councillors expressed their thanks for his valuable contribution to the community, notably the work involved in ensuring the success of the Queen's Jubilee Street Party.

The formal arrangements for the election process would be put in place by the ERYC.

Emergency Plan

Copies had been circulated to members prior to the meeting. Following discussion it was agreed that some further detailed amendments should be made with reference to the Electoral Roll.

Planning

 Conversion and part demolition of agricultural building to dwelling at land north of The Elms, Quaker Road, Owstwick – Ref. 16/03616/PLF

The location of this application is classed in the Local Development Plan as being in the open countryside. However, it is also on a 'brown field' site. In these circumstances particular considerations have to be taken into account by the Planning Committee in determining their decision. Should the application be approved it was thought likely that Conditions would be attached.

- Fell eucalyptus tree as outgrown location at The Bungalow, Main Street, Roos Ref. 17/00297/TCA
- Fell sweet chestnut tree as bark reduced at ground level and concerns of failure over the road and fell 2 ash trees as large amount of dead in crown at Ivy House, Rectory Road, Roos Ref. 17/00282/TCA

Members expressed regret at the potential loss of mature trees within the Parish. The ERYC Tree Officer would undertake a survey and determine the appropriate course of action as both applications fall within a designated Conservation Area to which particular conditions apply. It was requested that should approval be granted, suitable replacement trees be planted.

Police report

The report for January received from Humberside Police noted the following:

Any other business

Traffic Matters: A number of issues were reported.

- An e-mail had been received expressing concern about speeding in Hodgson Lane together with another report about speeding on Pilmar Lane (B1242).
- Cars parking in Lamb Lane causing heavy vehicles to mount and damage grass verges.

It was noted that speed camera checks had previously been made, however, requests would be made for further checks to be undertaken.

An enquiry had been received asking about responsibilities for maintaining the road surface along the un-adopted section at Dents Garth. It was agreed to try to establish via the ERYC and the Land Registry the ownership and responsibility for its maintenance.

A proposal from the Coastal Gateways Scheme to install a plaque recording the history of the Pinfold was welcomed. It was agreed that extracts from previous research and publications be provided to help establish suitable text for the plaque.
