Woodland Group Roos

The work that the Roos Woodland Group has achieved in the past four years is gradually coming to fruition. The hedgerows, copses and orchard trees, that have been funded to plant through the wind farm grants, are settling into maturity. We continue to work with a number of landowners around the village to gap up hedges, providing wildlife and humans alike with an enriched environment. Perhaps our most obvious planting is on the village green - a new hedge augmented with Rowan and Mulberry trees. Further afield, a few dozen orchard trees on the road towards Hilston now top two metres and our most local apple, the Hornsea Herring, has cropped well. This year, group members Madge Moore, Louise and Sandra Baker have produced dozens of herbaceous plants that we have sold both here in Roos and at the Withernsea Light House that has brought in over £300. We are a small group and are always happy to welcome new members - we meet rarely but enjoy trips out to look after our plants, and enjoy a pint or two of home made cider. Roos Village Store


We are changing our opening hours slightly. The shop will be closing at 2pm on Mondays. Monday afternoon has always been very quiet, so we are

Carol Singing Pepper Cake

In Yorkshire, these spicy cakes were traditionally given to carol singers. Cakes such as these were known as "pepper cakes"; not because they contained pepper, but because the spices were imported from the Far East, where lands were known collectively as the 'pepper countries': (I'm still in lbs and ozs not gms)

- 1 1/2 lbs of flour
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- 8 oz butter
- 1 1/2 lbs black treacle
- 8 oz dark soft brown sugar4 eggs, beaten
- 1 tsp ground cloves
- 1 tsp bicarb soda
- ½ tsp ground ginger
- 4 tbsp milk

Set oven to gas mark 3, 325f or 160c fan. In a bowl, rub the butter into the flour to resemble fine breadcrumbs. Add the sugar and spices. Put the treacle in a small pan and heat gently until melted, but not **hot,** or the eggs will curdle. Mix into the dry ingredients with the beaten eggs. Mix the bicarb with the milk until dissolved and stir into the mixture, beating well. Pour the mixture into a greased and lined roasting tin about 10" x 14", spread out evenly and bake for approx. 1 \% hours. Cool in the tin for 15 mins then turn out onto a cooling rack. Cut into slices when serving. Store in an air tight tin for a few days before eating to allow the flavours to develop.

Turkey Leftover Ideas

Mac cheese with Turkey

330 ml half fat crème fraiche 250 gm grated cheddar 350 gm cooked macaroni 200 gm cooked turkey diced 50 gm fresh breadcrumbs



Mix all the above together apart from the breadcrumbs
Place in an ovenproof dish
Sprinkle on the breadcrumbs
Bake in a hot oven (180c)for about 20 minutes

Serve with a nice fresh salad

Turkey Leftovers

I am always asked at this time of year what to do with leftover Turkey and once I have said just buy the right size and make sandwiches I start to think of some uses for my least favourite meat!

First point though is food safety, don't leave the cooked bird on the sideboard all afternoon, keep it in a cool place and remove all the meat as soon as possible and once it is cold, place in a covered dish in the fridge. Leftover meat should be eaten within 2 days. Instead of coronation chicken substitute turkey. Make or buy a curry sauce and stir the meat in at the last minute once the sauce is hot and don't overcook, just enough to warm the meat.

Turkey tortillas

flour tortillas a good tomato pasta sauce cooked turkey grated cheese



Spread some pasta sauce on a tortilla (not too much) Add the turkey and cover with some grated cheese (try different varieties rather than just a simple cheddar). Bake or grill till cheese is golden brown.

You can add other items such as peppers, mushrooms and onions as well

a person suffering from a heart attack. He stressed that we must always ring 999 in a life threatening situation to ensure help is on its way, ringing also activates the first responder. He informed us that the community defibrillator is at Roos school. The code to access the defibrillator is given by Yorkshire Ambulance service. Dot Walker gave the vote of thanks and invited Harry to be the judge of the monthly competitions.

After refreshments, the AGM took place, a review of finance as well as the committee and president's report was heard. The members voted Dot Walker in as President for 2017, this is Dot's sixth year.

Both the craft and book club gave their monthly reports, next month's book is the Woolworths Girls by Elaine Everest and the next Craft Club will be taking place at Sunken treasures in Ottringham.

This has been a very busy year for the Roos WI, including celebrating their 95th Year, to finish the year off in style we will be hosting the **South Holderness WI Group Christmas Carol Service on the 12th December at Roos Church at 7pm,** after the service everyone is welcome to join us for mulled wine and mince pies

Emergency Planning

It was reported that revisions to the Emergency Plan were now almost complete. The revised plan will replace that currently lodged with the ERYC, and placed in various locations throughout the parish. An Emergency Plan Box is located in the Memorial Institute and elsewhere.

It was reported that salt/grit bins have, or soon will be, stocked up in readiness with supplies in place to enable gritting of pavements as required.

Grass cutting. A vacancy has recently arisen and applications are invited from interested parties. It was agreed to place an advertisement in the Rooster.

Correspondence. A letter from the Rooster Association requesting the Council to sponsor an issue of the Rooster at a cost of £55 was considered and approved. Several members who were, or had been, associated with the Rooster Association declared an interest.

Planning

Erection of a two storey domestic outbuilding following demolition of existing at 'The Chestnuts', Rectory Road, Roos (retrospective application) -16/03043/PLF. Council raised no objection to this application.

Plans and details were received of the ERYC Compulsory Purchase Order for land near Tunstall. This is to enable access and build earthworks for the Coastal Defence Scheme to proceed. This is to prevent seawater flooding of Tunstall/Roos Drain. The required legal notices were recently published in the local press.

Treasurers Report. Routine payments were approved, including £100 for the 'Poppy Appeal'.

Any Other Business

It was reported that:

- The ERYC were consolidating their management of wind farm community funds across the county. Consequently it is likely that ERYC representation on the Tedder Hill funding panel will change with a further Ward Councillor replacing the existing ERYC Officer member.
- Following enquiries it was noted that a lap-top computer, projector and screen will be required to view material, such as Planning Applications, which are no longer supplied in 'hard copy' by the ERYC. It was noted that WI-FI access would be a useful addition to services in the village.
- Christmas Tree. It was agreed to progress installation of a tree at the customary location.

Public Session.

Dog fouling. Attention was drawn to the ongoing problem of dog owners not clearing up. However, it was noted that without evidence it was difficult to take the matter further.


"What is the 'Emergency Plan?" A brief explanation was given, but the query highlighted the need to make information about the plan more readily available across the parish.

XMAS TRIVIA

- **1. Speedy Santa** US scientists calculated that <u>Santa</u> would have to visit 822 homes a second to deliver all the world's presents on Christmas Eve, travelling at 650 miles a second.
- **2. Robins** Robins on cards were a joke 150 years ago when postmen wore red tunics and were named after them.
- **3. Mince Pies** Although now mostly vegetarian, in Victorian times, mince pies were made with beef and spices.
- **4. Tangerines** The tradition of putting tangerines in stockings comes from 12th-century French nuns who left socks full of fruit, nuts and tangerines at the houses of the poor.
- **5. Turkey** Before turkey, the traditional Christmas meal in England was a pig's head and mustard.
- **6. Carols** Carols weren't sung in churches until they were introduced by St Francis of Assisi in the 13th century.
- **7. Stockings** Hanging stockings out comes from the Dutch custom of leaving shoes packed with food for St Nicholas's donkeys. He would leave small gifts in return.
- **8. Holly** THE holly in a wreath symbolises Christ's crown of thorns while the red berries are drops of his blood.
- **9. Christmas Trees** Nearly 60 million Christmas trees are grown each year in Europe.
- **10. Boxing Day -** BOXING Day gets its name from all the money collected in church almsboxes for the poor.
- **11. Oslo** Since 1947 Oslo has sent an Xmas tree to London to thank us for our help in the Second World War.
- **12.** Chocolate coins Gold-wrapped chocolate coins commemorate St Nicholas who gave bags of gold coins to the poor.
