We Did It!

That's right, we completed our challenge. 370km from Salvador to Ilhues, on road, off road, uphill, downhill, through villages, towns and rubber plantations, jungle and beach. Brazil was full of brightly coloured houses and loud music where boys are constantly playing barefoot football, the Churches are rocking daily and the locals still drink Skol. Cycling through Brazil was a great way to see it, it really is very beautiful. The challenge itself was much harder than we had anticipated. It was so tough, the distance, the heat and the HILLS. The hills were terrifying, particularly given the distinct lack of hill training we managed to do in the Holderness area, but with the help and support of each other and 67 other women, along with the little song we'd sing to ourselves to help us get up them (it's only a hill and we're riding brazil) WE DID IT!! We raised over £10k for female cancer charities which is helping to develop a blood test to use as a screening tool for ovarian cancer and the money will continue to fund an online support service for women, which sadly is at its busiest at 3am in the morning.


The experience of undertaking such a challenge with so many strong and determined women was a life changing experience.

We met a living legend that goes by the name of Margaret, at 76 years of age, she completed the challenge (her fourth) all the time constantly smiling and giving it some welly! We would like to extend a massive thank you to all of you, for all your help, encouragement and donations. Roos is a very special place - thank you! Much love Nicky and Sally x

Roos Parish Council Report: September / October 2017

Parish Council Minutes are published in full on Parish Notice Boards and on the parish website – roosparish.info

Environmental Matters

- **Overgrown hedge on local path no. 5** ERYC has written to occupiers of properties in Beechwood Views and Hinch Garth asking if they would take ownership and maintenance of the hedge. If there was a poor response then the ERYC would consider removing it.
- **Dog fouling** - It was reported that the Chair, Cllrs Cracknell and Pearcey and others had met with the ERYC Dog Warden to discuss dog fouling issues. It was agreed that to help raise community awareness about this anti-social behaviour, the ERYC would give a presentation to school children as part of their early learning experience. They would also initiate a poster design competition for which Roos Parish Council would donate a prize to the winner
- **Litter/fly tipping – Roston Road** - ERYC confirmed that its street cleaning operatives would inspect and remove any waste discarded near the wayside seat.
- **Vehicle parking – Hilston Road** -An ERYC Area Engineer confirmed that highway enforcement officers would be asked to investigate whether the vehicles parked on or near the highway would be likely to be a potential cause of an obstruction.

Tunstall Coastal Defence Scheme

A report from ERYC indicated that progress was being made towards concluding the legal and financial agreements necessary for its construction to proceed. It was agreed that representatives of the Internal Drainage Board and the ERYC be invited to attend the Council's December meeting to provide feedback about this and other potential flood management issues along the drain to its outfall into the Humber.

Planning Applications

- Erection of free range egg unit with associated feed bins and hard standing areas at land east of Roos Road Halsham - 17/02637/PLF The Council agreed to register their objections to this second application with the ERYC. It was agreed that "the proposed development is located in an area of open countryside which was undeveloped until permission was recently granted for a similar type of development. The size of the buildings together with those already erected would constitute industrial development which is not linked to a nearby farm. There would be further loss of visual amenity with concerns also of obnoxious odours and waste disposal. Further, the Council see this application as a cynical way of seeking permission by stealth and exploiting the planning system".

Council agreed that no objections be made to the following applications.

- Fell row of conifers along drive blocking light from garden, fell conifer as outgrown location, fell ash as too close to property, ash x 2 crown reduce by 30% and reduce by 10 feet two rows of conifer to north and south of garden at Roseneath South End Roos - 17/03154/PLF
- Certificate of lawfulness for continued use of building in connection with livery business at WillowToft Farm Owstwick Rd Danthorpe - 17/03076/CLE
- Continued use of former function room as two flats at Black Horse Inn Main Street Roos - 17/03104/PLF
- Erection of single storey extension to create additional garage/store at The Folly, 2 Orchard Close Roos - 17/02396/PLF
- Continued use of the Dual Doppler weather station at Pastures Lane, Tunstall until February 2019., Dong Energy (15/01772/PLF)

Decisions - It was reported that ERYC had approved the following applications.

- Display of 1 externally illuminated fascia sign and 1 non-illuminated hanging sign at, 1 Main Street Roos Ref.No 17/02219/PAD
- Butterfly Cottage 1 North End Road Roos Ref. No: 17/02426/PLF
- 12 Elm Garth Roos. Ref. No: 17/02710/PLF

Any other business

Roos Village Amenities Association - It was agreed that Cllr Pearcey replace Cllr. Devanney as the Council's representative member with Cllr Maltas as substitute.

Roos Horticultural Society

Following comments made in public places and to Committee members regarding the equipment Roos Show have gained over the last few years we would like to make the following statement to the village / people who are concerned. Roos & District Horticultural Society have been successful in obtaining wind farm money over the last few years for the equipment they need to hold the annual shows each year.

We have clarified with all the wind farms where the money has come from and they have confirmed the equipment belongs to Roos & District Horticultural Society not the whole village.

The society has agreed to let other organisations and people use the equipment and hire charges and agreements have been agreed at their committee meetings.
