IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR CHURCH IN ROOS

All Saints' Church, Roos - your village church, as with many other churches throughout Yorkshire is going to be a little different soon. At present Roos is without a priest. We rely on the services of our Rural Dean who looks after all the churches in South Holderness

Salaries for clergy are administered from York but rely upon funding from the parishes (collections and gifts). South Holderness including Roos, has for a long time relied on financial support to "pay its way" from York Diocese.

The Church of England has very minimal reserves which will be exhausted within a few years. As a consequence, a major reorganisation is under way. Basically, there is insufficient funding available to cover the employment of clergy. It is expected that in the very near future, Benefices (groups of parish churches), will have to find their own funding to pay for clergy as well as to maintain their churches and graveyards. In an attempt to devise a way forward, our South Holderness Deanery Team has proposed three options.

- Two benefices Withernsea 1 full time clergy. All the other 22 churches (including Roos) - 2 full time clergy plus 2 part-time clergy
- 2. Three benefices Withernsea, 1 full time clergy. Hedon with possibly Preston, 1 full time clergy. All other churches (including Roos), 1 full time clergy with 2 part-time clergy
- 3. Three benefices As with option 2 but dividing the rural churches into distinct groups and assigning clergy to them. This is the least favoured option owing to decreased flexibility.

As a matter of urgency, Roos Parochial Church Council (PCC) need to feed back our views for a review in July.

It must be emphasised that the future of our church does depend upon financial and practical support from within our community. Many churches are being closed at the moment and we do not wish this to happen to Roos. The current situation is not an option.

Comments or suggestions are needed before 7th July to be fed back to

This map simply illustrates possibilities, others could be drawn, but hopefully it is some help in picturing our situation.

'PT' = 'part-time' – includes any clergy post that is not full-time paid.




CELEBRATIONS IN AND AROUND THE CHURCH AND VILLAGE

JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS ON THE PLAYING FIELD

Around 400 people turned out with fantastic community spirit for the Roos Beer Festival on Saturday and consumed most of the 11 beers and 4 ciders on offer as well as a delicious BBQ.

Entertainment was provided by James Wood, the B B Babes and Stealer. The latter did a full two hour stint between 8 & 10pm and only stopped when the lead guitarist couldn't play any more because his fingers were too cold.

Friends of Roos School (FORS) were kept busy all day with the BBQ which should have significantly boosted their funds to help the school.

Although the Beer Festival was set up as a non profit making event there was a profit of a few hundred pounds and this will be put towards repairing and refurbishing the playground area as well as looking into installing a CCTV system.

Sunday saw the Picnic in the Park with an indoor bouncy castle, face painting and entertainment by the Pub Lads and Coleen's Fancy. There was a busy free BBQ, manned by the FORS team and most of the drinks left from the Beer Festival were sold.

The children paraded with their crowns and all who took part received a gift, this will be a lovely memory they will have for a very long time.















DOVE HOUSE HOSPICE CHARITY CYCLE RIDE

Three local ladies Angie Maltas, Tina Danby and Rosie Rowbottom were part of a group of 10 who completed the cycle ride from Hull to Paris. Seriously impressive stats of 314 miles ridden, 7,900 feet climbed and sitting in the saddle for over 30 hours.

As a group they raised an incredible £37,000 for Dove House Hospice and are immensely proud of what they have achieved.

It was a significant adventure, travelling with people who hardly knew each other, getting to know, respect, be humbled by their stories, growing to love and call them friends. Their experiences ranged from those who work, have worked at Dove House or have been touched by the care given

by Dove House. They shared days where the effort required caused pain and tears, falls that drew blood or pain but none gave in, everyone reached Paris.

Day 1 Rotterdam to Bruges - wonderful, warm with beautiful views, smooth roads and lots of fun.

Day 2 Bruges to Arras – was hard! Strong head winds, long, straight boring roads and alongside railway lines with little to see.

Day 3 Arras to Beauvais – the hardest, longest and hilliest but the most beautiful countryside.

Day 4 Beauvais to Paris – euphoric, scary and chaotic.

DEFIBRILLATOR TRAINING

A huge thank you to Tony Megson who outlined how to operate a defibrillator, including basic life support training. Roos Parish are lucky to have 5 defibrillators within the community and it was important that we know how to use them

in the event of an emergency. The course was designed to give attendees the confidence to act quickly and effectively if someone has a cardiac arrest and how to perform effective CPR. The training was well received.

ROOS WOODLAND GROUP

Thanks to some funding being made available from the Platinum Jubilee Fund the Roos Woodland Group have ordered six trees for the parish to be planted this Autumn to commemorate the Jubilee in Owstwick, Roos, Hilston & Tunstall. These include Acer Rubrum, October Glory, Arbutus Unedo, Betula Jacquemontii, Crataegus x Prunifolia, Liriodendron Tulipifera and Quercus Palustris.

These have been chosen for their ornamental value and also their ability to withstand cold easterly winds and salty air! We will also be purchasing some commemoration roses. Look out for these being planted in October/November. It will soon be time to cut back the Footpath 5 hedge so if you have a few spare hours, do come and join us.
