- Dial 999 **BEFORE** going to collect the device
- The caller will ask questions and advise if you need to get the device
- Other advice and information will be ongoing whilst resources are on their way to you
- If the caller thinks you need the device they will tell you the exact location and the cabinet access code
- The caller will NOT hang up until an ambulance or Rapid Response Unit are at your side

**E-Consult** - We appreciate that it is not always easy to find the time to come to see your GP or practice nurse; therefore we are now working with E-Consult an online GP consultation tool. You access the online system via our website ([www.withernseadoctors.co.uk](http://www.withernseadoctors.co.uk)) and you will be asked to answer a series of questions. Your responses to the questions will then be sent through to the GP's at South Holderness Medical Practice. You can use the service to request follow on Med3 Certificates (Sick Notes), make enquiries regarding a new or existing condition or update your details. All enquiries are dealt with at South Holderness Medical Practice and if you need to see a clinician following your online consultation someone from the surgery will be in touch with you.

### Tree and Hedgerow Planting Opportunity.

As part of the formal planning agreements for the Tedder Hill wind farm £10,000 was awarded to Heywoods for tree and hedgerow planting within 5km of Roos Post Office. Although the wind farm became operational in late 2013, applications so far have been low in number and to date, **ONLY** about £2000 has been awarded. Heywoods are now welcoming formal applications from private and public landowners for new tree, woodland and hedgerow planting initiatives. The deadline for the submission of applications will be 31st July 2018 and the Grant Awarding Panel will convene in September / October 2018 to consider applications. Roos Parish Council is represented on the awarding panel. ## All Saints Church Roos

As we come to Easter we recognise that profound moment when Jesus bursts from the tomb. In the Gospel of John it said that Mary Magdalene was the first to greet the risen Jesus. She had gone to anoint his body following the crucifixion and was shocked to find the tombstone rolled back and his body gone. In the silence she enters the tomb to find two angels folding the grave clothes up, when she leaves she runs directly into the gardener who asks her why she is crying. Mary explains her great sadness for her friend Jesus who was killed by crucifixion and now his body has been taken. The gardener said, 'Mary!'

In that moment everything changes as Mary recognises that the gardener is none other than Jesus himself. In that moment desolation turns to joy, sadness turns to happiness, despair turns to hope and the world recognises that no matter what happens things will always turn out all right in the end.

This is the resurrection moment and undoubtedly all of us have had little instants of experiencing it.

It may be through a friendship renewed when we ask for forgiveness.

It may be in that new relationship and second marriage when, despite our best efforts and intentions, the previous relationship falters and fails. It may be through a new job and an opportunity to succeed where perhaps a previous job, for whatever reasons, may not have worked out the way we wished.

It may be through a new home and a chance to start afresh or perhaps the opportunities created when we come through a serious illness where we can reach out to others and make a difference into their lives.

It may be through the rediscovery of a faith lost and a God who never stopped believing in us.

The greatest resurrection moment, though, was Jesus and the hope that he gives each one of us that resurrection in our lives is considerably more than just a possibility..... it is a certain hope when we take that moment to believe.

This Easter I pray that the people of Roos find resurrection in their own lives.

## **Roos Parish Council Report: February 2018**

*Parish Council Minutes are published in full on Parish Notice Boards and on the parish website – [roosparish.info](http://roosparish.info) The following is a condensed version of the recently confirmed Minutes for February 2018*

### **Matters Arising**

#### **Tunstall Drain re-alignment scheme**

ERYC report that a ground level survey had been undertaken and a design would be prepared. The Council would be invited to a project board meeting at the appropriate time

#### **Overgrown hedge on local path no. 5**

The Chair reported that considerable work had been undertaken by the Woodland Group on the hedge. A chipper would be on site shortly for which ERYC had agreed to make a grant to the Council to enable payment to be made.

#### **Eastfield Estate**

ERYC confirmed that it was hoped to amend the parking arrangements outside 15-19 to provide bays at right angles to the kerb to create additional spaces. The work would be ordered in the new financial year. It was also noted that one existing garage had been used for storage with another one empty. ERYC was looking to allocate the empty units. In relation to the old oil store, ERYC was investigating its ownership. The Council would be kept informed.

#### **Member name badges**

Designs were approved for production. These were for the use of members when on official Council business.

### **Correspondence**

#### **Housing seminar**

An invitation was received from ERYC to attend a seminar entitled Meeting Rural Housing Challenges at Bishop Burton College on the 1st March. The Chair confirmed that he would attend on behalf of the Council.

### **Planning**

- Variation of condition 11 (approved plans of permission 11/05696/STPLF (change of use of land to form an extension to existing caravan park) to increase the number of static caravans from 19 to 26 and provide a circular access road layout instead of previously approved cul-de-sacs at Holderness Country Park Southfield Lane Tunstall. A reply from ERYC confirmed that should approval be granted it would be stipulated that the units would be solely for holiday purposes only and not for permanent residential occupation.
- Erection of single storey extension to rear following demolition of conservatory and outbuildings and re-location of a window at first floor to side at Westside Main Street, Roos. It was reported that ERYC had approved the above application.
- Tree works including pruning, felling and replacement of various trees at Ashdown House Rectory Road Roos - 17/04335/TPO. It was reported that ERYC had approved the above application.

### **Community needs assessment**

Five quotes for delivery of the proposed assessment were considered and it was agreed to invite Chameleon Consultancy and Groundwork to meet the Council to discuss their respective quotes and proposals in more detail.

### **Treasurer's report**

The Treasurer sought and received approval for payment of the following account:-  
Zurich - renewal of insurance policy - £257.60

### **Any other business**

**Former Pearsons bus service.** Cllr Delaney commented on the loss of the service around the surrounding area which had been discussed extensively in Withernsea. He would try to obtain more facts and figures for the Council's information.

**Greenacre Park.** Cllr Pearcey enquired if the estate had been fully adopted as she understood that Yorkshire Water was not fulfilling its obligations in certain areas. It was agreed to ask ERYC of the position.

**Hilston Road – standing water.** Cllr Maltas referred to standing water issues on the highway and he agreed to e-mail photographic evidence of the exact location of the issue to the Clerk for him to forward to ERYC for attention.
