Memories from Tunstall & Roos by Sylvia Roberts

Just at the top of Seaside Lane in Tunstall lies two modernised cottages. They were not always like this, they used to be four cottages. They belonged to my Fathers' F family, he was born in one of them, his Grandmother lived in another and his Auntie and Uncle lived in the end one. They were the Martins & the Daltons. John Martin, my Dad, was the youngest of three brothers & one sister, he ran off to join the Navy when he was nearly old enough. His Dad Charlie Martin was a Farm Labourer and got work wherever he could, He would cycle to Hull to the Market Place to be hired to do whatever job was going, at one time he was the Gravedigger and the Ditcher, he would clear all the ditches to stop flooding. At another time he was a groom for some beautiful Shire Horses and used to take them to shows and won medals for the Owner. My Dad knew all the names of the fields in the area, I remember him showing me a field called 'Paradise' just outside of Tunstall. I was mesmerised.

My Grandad Charlie, when not working was found in the Local Pub, The Kings Arms and always smelt of Guinness. My Dad attended Roos School in the 1920's. One of his jobs as a lad was to bring water from the village pump, it is still standing, although in a sorry state now. He died 21 years ago, but before he died we visited the pump and he was very emotional to see it still there. His Auntie and Uncle, Hannah & Frank Dalton lived in the end Cottage, I remember she had lots of cats. If anyone remembers The Martins or Athens Daltons, I would love to hear from them. I have a host of memories, Tunstall holds a special place in my heart. Thank you

These sentences actually appeared in church bulletins or were announced in church services!!!! -

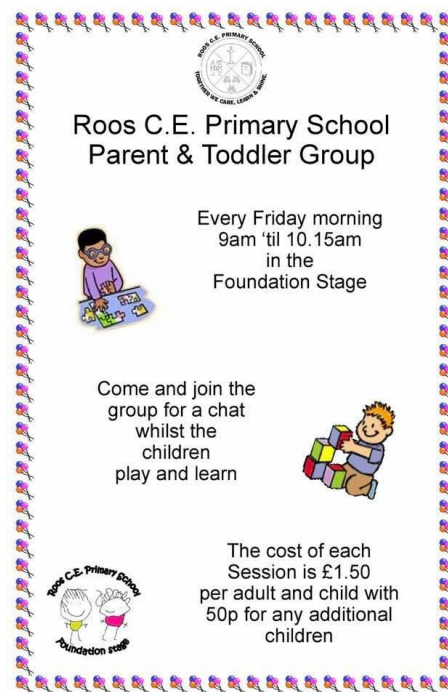
- * The Fasting & Prayer onference.....includes meals.

Roos Parish Council Meeting: May 2018

Tunstall Drain re-alignment scheme

An invitation was received from ERYC to attend a project board meeting in Beverley with the Chair, Cllrs Ainley and Tyson agreeing to attend. It was noted that the compulsory purchase order for land acquisition would not now be proceeding.

Greenacre Park

It was reported that Graham Stuart MP and ERYC Director of Planning had become involved in trying to ensure that a satisfactory outcome could be achieved for the residents of the estate in terms of its formal adoption by ERYC. The Clerk also confirmed that ERYC Land Drainage Officers were also now involved in the matter, and, that ERYC Street Lighting had not yet received a request from the developer to repair the out of commission street lights on the estate.

Housing development in Roos

Confirmation was received from ERYC that the Local Plan identified a figure of 40 dwellings over the Planning period and that policy S5 confirmed that these were minimum numbers. As such, it was unlikely that small scale proposals that are in accordance with the Plan would be refused. It would not be the case of taking away units from the two allocated development sites.

Fly tipping Rostun Road

Cllr. Pearcey referred to items dumped at the location and agreed to forward photographic images to the Clerk for onward transmission to ERYC for attention.

Highway issue – Hodgson Lane

Cllr. Dodson referred to long vehicles regularly using the lane. He was advised to ascertain whether the vehicles belonged to the same company in order that a request could be made for them to use a more satisfactory route in future.
