The Rooster started in August 1985 and usually appeared monthly from then onwards. There were some lapses (e.g. when there were printing problems). In the 1990s it was for a time published only when there were special events to record but eventually monthly publication resumed. The current issue is No.152.

The Rooster Association

The Association was formed in July 2006 with a Committee of eight with power to co-opt up to three further members. An immediate benefit was the election of a Treasurer and the opening of the newsletter's own bank account.

The Committee

The Committee shared out some of the tasks formerly undertaken solely by the Editor, Leslie Helliwell. In January 2007 he informed colleagues that he would shortly be in hospital and therefore unable to edit the February issue. A sub-committee was set up (the Editorial Group) to prepare and publish the newsletter. Its current members are Ann Coupe, Alec Dodson and Rob Feetom

All three were diffident since they did not feel equipped for the task. They are all the more to be congratulated on keeping *The Rooster* going so well in subsequent months. Her two fellow members would agree that the greatest burden has fallen on Ann Coupe, who has in addition acted as Distribution Manager.

Layout and printing

When we lost the services of our local designer Lawson Lewis offered to do the job and was warmly welcomed as a co-opted member of the Committee.

His dissatisfaction with the quality of the photographs reproduced coincided with the retirement of our Hull printer. Lawson reckoned that the purchase of a laser printer would bring economies, not least because there would be no petrol expenses incurred in taking the master copy to a professional printer.

He researched laser printers on the internet and worked out a likely budget. Our Treasurer warmly supported the proposal and a laser printer was bought. It has already paid for itself in savings.

The home of Ann Coupe and Lawson Lewis has become the focus of *Rooster* production. The printer and its materials are housed there. Ann convenes the Editorial Group and organises the distribution of printed copies. Lawson types and lays out the material on each page and prints the copies. We owe them a great debt.

Support and feedback from readers

Donations and occasional appreciative comments show that *The Rooster* is well supported but more opinions and recommendations would be appreciated.

The Annual General Meeting of The Rooster Association will provide an opportunity to express them. It will be held in The Black Horse on 21st February 2008 at 7.30pm. Light refreshments will be provided.

The Committee intend to include, as well as the normal business agenda, an informal session for general comment and discussion.

The newsletter belongs to its donors. All are members of the Association. Please note the AGM date now and resolve to come along to give the small but hardworking Committee the benefit of your suggestions. Our voluntary deliverers are especially invited.

Alec's Patch By Alec Dodson

Christmas is a peak time for house plants to be given attention. Some need special care.

Azalea, Citrus (Calamondin Orange) and Solanum winter cherry, all need extra humidity. Spray them with tepid water. Cyclamen keep better in a cool room and always water from the bottom.

Hyacinths, Narcissus and Tulips also appear as Christmas gifts. These will last well if the compost is kept moist and the room is not too hot. They can be planted into the garden later and will last for years to come

Finally cut holly and bring indoors now to prevent the birds eating the berries. Keep in a cool place, in water, until using for decoration.

Six Months On

This photograph was taken at Sand-le-Mere following the recent high tides. It demonstrate the vulnerability of our coastline. The cliffs were overtopped and seawater flooded onto agricultural land leaving a tidemark of pebbles and plastic rubbish as it flowed towards Tunstall Drain. The protective earth bank was almost breached.

Counties further down the east coast were on stand-by and emergency planning arrangements were put in place. Residents with homes at risk were moved into schools and village halls until the threat had passed. In the event the tidal surge caused by a low-pressure weather system and seasonal high tides combined with a strong northerly wind fell just 20cm short of its predicted height.



One can only speculate about the extent of flooding along Tunstall Drain should this height have been reached.

A report recently commissioned by the ERYC, comments upon the effects that climate change will have upon the region. It indicates an increase of extreme weather events and rising sea levels.

The findings of the report, linked to the extensive damage and disruption caused by the unusually heavy rainfall of June 2007 indicates why the ERYC is encouraging local parish councils and communities to develop their own Community Emergency Preparedness Plan ready for implementation when similar events occur in the future.

The majority of skips containing flood-damaged house contents have now been removed from Roos and some residents are now beginning to return to their homes and rebuild their life.

It is almost six months since the flooding of June 2007 and as the festive season approaches it is easy to forget the level of distress and damage experienced at the time and for complacency to set in. It is easy to say that it was a one off or it will never happen again. But can one be absolutely sure?

The findings of a report entitled Knee Deep in Paull commissioned by Paull Parish Council from construction engineer Simon Taylor, reported in The Gazette on 15th November 2007 serve as a timely reminder of what needs to be done to prevent such events occurring again.

The report states, "The flooding was the result of a long series of failures. Leave any one unresolved and the potential for it all to happen again is very real. We have forgotten the important role the land drains played in protecting the village, while putting more faith on modern hard drainage systems. Level drainage is a well thought out and executed system demonstrating a high level of expertise and understanding of drainage by the original builders. Had the level drainage been in good condition and effective then the volume of standing water caused by the hard drains backing up would have been considerably reduced" It continues: "The statutory bodies and others are guilty of neglecting the drainage system, downgrading its priority and failing to maintain these vital assets. Let the lessons be learned."

One of the main recommendations is that Paull Parish Council develop its own independent flood plan and strategy and establish a village store of sandbags. The Clerk to Paull Parish Council is reported as saying, "We're taking a pro-active role. We can't undo past flooding, but we don't want it to happen again."

As reported in *The Rooster*, Roos Parish Council has decided to develop its own plan and strategy covering <u>all types</u> of <u>emergency</u>. The ERYC provide guidance and a template to assist communities develop their own Community Preparedness Plan.

It is essential that this plan be completed, but it is even more imperative that all possible precautions should be taken to prevent the flooding in Roos happening again. This was nothing to do with the sea. It was the drains and dykes.

The grant of £5000 made available by ERYC to Roos Parish Council to alleviate damage, which has now been approved, could be used towards this end.

Cookery Corner

Hot Cheese Stuffed Eggs

Ingredients

Serves 4

4 size 3 eggs (hard boiled & shelled)

50g/2oz butter (softened)

50g/2oz Cheddar cheese (grated)

1 clove garlic crushed with a little salt, optional

Pinch of salt and cayenne pepper to taste

1 tablespoon cream or top of milk

300ml/½ pint cheese sauce:-

25g/1oz butter

25g/1oz plain flour

300ml/½ pint milk

50g/2oz Cheddar cheese (grated)

Salt and cayenne pepper

Garnish:-

8 cooked mushroom caps

Watercress

25g/1oz Cheddar cheese (finely grated)

Method

- Cut the hard-boiled eggs in half lengthways, remove volks and mash with a fork.
- 2. Add the softened butter, grated cheese, garlic, seasoning and cream or top of milk and mix well together.
- **3.** Divide the mixture equally between the halved egg whites piling smoothly, and place in a buttered fireproof
- **4.** Make the cheese sauce and coat eggs. Sprinkle with extra grated cheese and brown quickly under a hot grill.
- **5.** Garnish with cooked mushroom caps and watercress. Serve hot.

Roos Parish Council Meeting 10th December 2007

All Councillors were present.

The November minutes were approved. Extracts below.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

Proposed conservation areas within the parish It was reported that ERYC had been informed of the outcome of the Council's deliberations in connection with the proposed conservation areas within the parish and that the decision of ERYC was now awaited as to designation of the areas under review. Copies of sixteen further letters of support for conservation areas within the parish which had now been forwarded to ERYC were received and noted.

Proposed sale of land at Manor Farm Tunstall

The Clerk reported that the minor amendments to the draft Statutory Declaration had now been made together with proof of identification and that proving title to the land with the Land Registry would now be undertaken.

Kerb on Hodgson Lane

It was reported that the Chairman and Clerk had met with the Area Engineer of ERYC who had agreed to remedy the problem.

Highway matters

The Chairman and Clerk reported on their meeting with the Area Engineer of ERYC who had agreed to the resurfacing of the highway at Owstwick at the junction near the post box and kerb slippage at North End Roos. The Area Engineer had also confirmed that the sign fingerpost at North End would be reviewed at the Streetscene 2008 visit and that poor visibility at the road junction from the hamlet with the B1242 could not be addressed at present as there was no accident record at the site.

Fly Tipping

It was reported that the dumped waste had been removed from Rectory Road and the Chairman reported that he had been in contact with ERYC and sought approval to place an editorial in *The Rooster* informing householders of their obligations in ensuring that their waste is properly disposed of, together with an appropriate notice to be displayed in the notice boards. Approval was unanimously given on the proposed course of action to be taken and the Chairman was thanked for his efforts.

CORRESPONDENCE

Code of conduct training

An invitation from ERYC was received inviting representatives to attend a training event at Count Hall and it was agreed that the Chairman and Vice Chairman together with the Clerk attend the event

on behalf of the Council.

Temporary road closure - Southfield Lane Tunstall

Receipt of a public notice from ERYC was reported which stated that a temporary prohibition of through traffic Order would be made commencing on the 15th November to enable construction works to be carried out. An accompanying plan showed the site referred to and the alternative route for traffic.

Basic development control

Members were individually furnished with a copy of details from ERYC outlining the establishment of an internet based training programme to enable members to help develop their understanding of planning processes.

Planning applications

Erection of first floor extensions to either side of existing dwelling at 5 Cherry Hill Park, Roos, for Mr & Mrs Kelly.

Members recommended approval for the above.

Change of use of land to relocate and extend caravan park with ancillary facilities, new vehicle access, and engineering works to form a wildlife lake at Sand-Le-Mere Caravan Park ,Seaside Lane, Tunstall, for Mr A Ellis.

It was agreed to arrange a site visit and in the meantime the submitted documentation to be circulated amongst members for their consideration.

Erection of conservatory at rear of 14 Hinch Garth Roos for Mrs Brocklehurst.

Members recommended approval for the above.

Decisions

The following application was granted by ERYC:-Formation of wildlife amenity lake and landscaping works at land south of Red Roofs Southfield Lane Tunstall.

Flooding within the parish

The Chairman and Councillor Grant gave an update report on the situation with regard to various discussions and correspondence they had had with all the relevant agencies to address the whole matter of flooding in the parish.

The Clerk also confirmed that he had been in discussions with ERYC and that a draft letter he had prepared had been sent by ERYC to residents of some thirty properties alongside Roos Beck pointing out their riparian ownership of their section of the beck and he read out the relevant letter referred to.

It was agreed after lengthy discussions that the £5,000 available to the parish to bring relief to the community be allocated towards a scheme for the improvement of the drainage in the vicinity of Dimples Cottage in South End Roos and not towards equipment outlined by the Emergency Plan Committee.

A letter was received from Mr & Mrs Audley expressing their disappointment that their garden area had not been reinstated after allowing contractors entry to gain access to the flooded Beck area in the summer. The Chairman agreed to make contact with them to discuss the situation.

Parish Plan

Members referred to items in the plan which required financial input and it was agreed that members determine any costing for proposals they would wish Council to proceed with in the financial year 2008/09 and report on them to the next meeting.

All members had now considered the Quality Parish and Town Council Scheme and it was resolved that Quality Council status be not sought at present.

Council vacancy

It was reported that there had been one expression of intent from Mr David Craggs in relation to the Council vacancy and it was agreed that Mr Craggs be co-opted onto the Council and that he be invited to attend the next meeting.

Treasurer's Report

The treasurer sought and was given approval to support

the Poppy Appeal in the sum of £50, the purchase of bulbs for planting in areas of the parish in the sum of £70 and it was also agreed to donate £200 to Jelly Tots Parent and Toddler Group towards the purchase of play mats for pre-school children arising from their earlier request.

He circulated an account update which also gave a projected balance for the financial year end and reported that budget discussions for the next financial year should take place at the next meeting with the precept demand on ERYC being determined at the January 2008 meeting.

Public Session

Mrs Cook related her family's experiences in consequence of the devastating floods earlier in the year and trusted that action to improve the drainage system in South End would be addressed by the various agencies as a matter of urgency.

Mr Ainley referred to the Parish Plan with particular respect to tree planting and also to a draft emergency contingency plan he had recently been involved with covering all aspects of future crises which may effect South Holderness.
