Flying for Fun

Roos & District Model Flying Club

“Flying for Fun” is how Bryan Atkinson described the purpose of the club of which he was a founder member in 1984.

Before that, with a few fellow enthusiasts, Bryan had been making and flying model aircraft since the early 1960s in a variety of locations wherever they could find a suitable field and had the farmer’s permission. They took to the skies near the Black Mill at Waxholme, later at Hollym Carrs, Halsham and Holmpton and eventually on land belonging to Sid Kirkwood on Tunstall Road, Roos. During these years they had no name, no permanent site and no actual club.

In the 1980s their circumstances changed. The new Roos Playing Field Association was hoping to obtain a long lease of the field already used by a few local teams and develop it properly with changing facilities in a new pavilion. There were many fund-raising efforts. Grants were available to supplement local money but needed evidence that a minimum number of groups would use the field. Bryan and his friends were approached to ask if they would swell the list. Needless to say, they were delighted.

Formation of the club

Because they had to become official they formed the Roos & District Model Flying Club and joined the British Model Aeroplane Association. Membership provides insurance – at a cost. Each member contributes £28.00 as a share of the annual subscription but for this there is insurance cover for third-party claims up to ten million pounds. In addition, each pays a yearly subscription of £15-20 to the club itself.

Bryan (who before his retirement served for 25 years with the ambulance service in Withernsea) was initially Chairman and became a trustee of the Roos Playing Field Association. Gary Collinson (formerly of Roos) is also a trustee and acts as contact for the Model Aeroplane Association.

Benefits

Until the club began using Roos Playing Field the terrain they encountered was often unsatisfactory. Model planes need short grass to take off from the ground. A field grazed by sheep was fine but a field grazed by cattle tended to have longer grass, was bedevilled by cow-pats and sometimes had cows still feeding. The advantage at Roos is that the whole field (not just the cricket square) is mown regularly and provides the level playing field sought by all sportsmen.

Further, although the club uses the field mainly on Sunday afternoons, it is available at all times when no teams are playing and members are assured of a permanent home : they don’t have to up sticks and seek another venue whenever a farmer wants to plough his field or asks them to leave for other reasons. They can concentrate on making and flying their planes.

The aero-modeller’s year

Members spend their winters designing and constructing their planes and fly them during the lighter months. The club’s AGM is held in the Roos Pavilion in the afternoon

of the first Sunday in December. Apart from that, they have no formal meetings but meet, of course, to fly their models and some may visit shows and displays together.

Construction : plans, materials, tools

Specialised magazines such as that published by the British Model Flying Association are available from newsagents and advertise plans, materials and kits. The nearest local supplier of materials is Just Kits, 194 Hessle Road, Hull (01482-618001), though internet suppliers offer a speedy and reliable service.

Members work in whatever domestic space is available. At one time Bryan used a spare bedroom but now works in his garage. A set of sharp knives is essential and appropriate adhesives, such as balsa cement or super glue.

Plane engines have traditionally been run on diesel or glow fuel obtainable from model shops. More recently some use nitro-methanol. Some have battery-powered electric motors. These are initially very expensive but less so in the long run. Some use gas turbines. (None at Roos.)

Constructing a plane may cost £300 – 1,000 but after the initial outlay the cost reduces. If you are creative and enjoy a technical challenge, making and flying model aircraft can be very rewarding.

In the air

Models are radio-controlled and – after good tuition – easy to manage, even over long distances, as long as the model remains within sight.

Radio interference is an occasional nuisance – if, for instance, another enthusiast is somewhere using the same radio frequency. There may be other sources of interference. For example, planes flying in one particular area of Roos have been occasionally affected by transmissions thought to be from a radar beacon for shipping at Keyingham.

Sean made his model from a kit designed by Mick Reeves. Gary Collinson designed and made his biplane from spare parts. It “goes like a rat up a drainpipe” at an estimated 80-90 mph. Its identification – UBITZ VUNDY – was concocted from characters still left on a sheet of stickers.

Over the years several Roos residents have been members but at present there are none, though some lapsed members still live here. Sometimes modellers on holiday at Sand-le-Mere ask to use the field and are happy to pay the club a generously small fee to do so. At one time the club had 30 members but at present has only 10.

New members are, of course, very welcome and will receive help and friendly advice.

***Cookery Corner* by Ann Coupe**

Crispy Lamb Bake

A delicious way to serve lamb or any other cooked meats left over from the Sunday joint.

Serves 4

Ingredients

50g/ 2oz butter

25g/ 1oz plain flour

300ml/ ½ pint milk

225g/ 8oz cooked lamb (chopped)

1 tablespoon parsley (chopped)

2 teaspoons curry powder

Salt and pepper

450g/ 1lb potatoes (cooked)

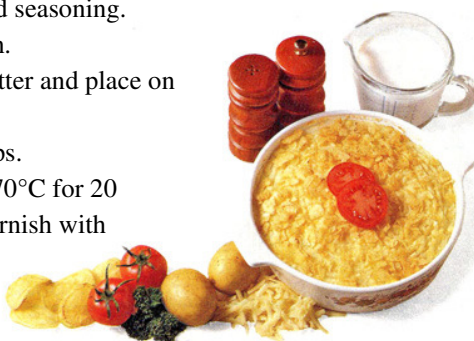
25g/ 1oz Cheddar cheese (grated)

1 packet potato crisps (crushed)

1 tomato

Method

1. Place 25g/ 1oz butter, flour and milk in a saucepan. Heat, stirring continuously until the sauce thickens.
2. Stir in lamb, parsley, curry powder and seasoning.
Place in a 1 litre/ 2 pint ovenproof dish.
3. Cream potatoes with the remaining butter and place on the top of the lamb mixture.
4. Sprinkle with cheese and crushed crisps.
5. Bake gas mark 5, 190°C/375°F, fan 170°C for 20 minutes or brown under a hot grill. Garnish with sliced tomato.

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Alec's Patch ... By Alec Dodson

November can be a dark and dismal month, but there is often work to be done in the garden before winter really sets in.

Traditionally this is tulip-planting time so put them in a sunny position and they prefer well-drained soil so choose a suitable site.

The autumn colour on shrubs and trees has been outstanding this year, possibly due to the dry spring and early summer. Locally many hedges are a blaze of colour mainly from the Field Maple, *Acer campestre*, which is indigenous. It is a small to medium tree of which cultivated forms can be grown in the average garden.

The sunsets have also been brilliant and there may be more so keep your camera handy. If you intend to repair a worn lawn or are embarking on a new one then this is an ideal time to lay turf.

House plants should be placed where they have adequate light but are not subject to big variations in temperature. Check their condition every week, preferably on the same day so that any subtle changes in their condition can be observed.

Many greenhouses tend to end up in the winter months as another shed. However if you intend to over-winter fuchsias, geraniums, cacti or other plants if it is unheated use bubble wrap to insulate where possible. Do not over-water the plants and ventilate on fine days to keep air circulating.

Finally don't forget the wildlife. Leave some stems of herbaceous plants for overwintering insects and a source of food and protection for birds.

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Roos Parish Council Meeting 8th November 2010

All Councillors were present

The October minutes were approved. Summary below.

The Chairman welcomed Cllr Tyson to his first meeting as a co-opted member.

Proposed allotments in the parish

The Clerk reported that an approach had been made to the Land Registry to confirm ownership of the land identified by him and the Chairman which may be suitable for allotment purposes and that a response was awaited.

Car parking on Main Street near the school

It was reported that a site meeting of interested parties was taking place on 21st October to discuss ongoing problems of traffic congestion caused by vehicles parking outside the school.

It was also agreed to remind ERYC at the same meeting of the cracks in the carriageway on the Roos to Halsham road.

Parish path Issue

The Clerk reported receipt of written confirmation from Burton Pidsea Parish Council offering support to the group seeking the reinstatement of a parish path leading towards and linking up with Burton Pidsea footpath no.8 a copy of which was handed to Cllr Dodson for forwarding to the group concerned.

Speeding vehicles in Main Street

Receipt of a reply from ERYC was reported which stated that two speed surveys had been carried out on Main Street and that the readings had shown that traffic was reaching higher speeds above the 30mph limit on the section north of the school and that the findings would be forwarded to the police for appropriate action.

The Council agreed to take up ERYC's offer to provide a 30mph roundel at the location of the existing 30mph repeater signs in the next financial year.

Footpath - Main Street

A reply was reported from ERYC which stated that when the path was recently improved works were carried out wider than the path actually was and it was to be expected that some shoots would show through.

Flooding and related matters

It was reported that the proposed meeting with Mr Beal was in hand and that Neil Ager of ERYC would be asked to consider re-surveying the piped section of the beck through Mr Beal's land in Dove Lane to determine whether there were any defects in the system and Cllr Ward confirmed that he would now endeavour with Mr Wray to remove the tree trunk adjoining Mr Wray's property at an early date.

It was reported that ERYC was still awaiting a decision from the Church authorities on making land available for drainage improvements off Rectory Road and that it was expected that ERYC would make early contact with that party bearing in mind that works needed to be commenced in the current financial year.

Correspondence

Withernsea & South Holderness Partnership Parish sub-Group

An invitation was received from ERYC to attend a meeting of the above group on 11th November at Skeffling Village Hall and it was agreed to enquire of Cllr Cracknell if she would be interested in attending the meeting on behalf of the Council.

South Holdernes Liaison Panel

Copies of a newsletter received from the Environment Agency relevant to managing flood risk in the region were circulated amongst members.

Planning

Applications

Erection of extension to agricultural building at Town Farm, Main Street, Tunstall.

It was agreed that no objections be made to the above proposal.

Conversion of and alterations to redundant agricultural buildings and change of use to 4 no. units of holiday accommodation at Grange Farm, Pastures Lane, Tunstall

It was agreed that no objections be made to the above proposal.

Notice of public inquiry

Notice was received from ERYC that the planning appeal against ERYC's refusal to grant planning permission for the erection of 3 no. wind turbines and associated development at land south of Hogsea Lane Hilston would be heard at County Hall on 2nd November at 10.00 am.

Decision

Variation of condition 2 of planning permission 357-10004 at Church Farm Riding School, Tower Road' Hilston

It was reported that ERYC had approved the above application.

Parish plan

The Chairman confirmed that he had received from Mr Ainley correspondence received from Humber & Wolds Community Council relative to a questionnaire and it was agreed that the Parish Plan Committee be asked to complete the document bearing in mind that the Council needed to consider a couple of items in the survey prior to its return to the Community Council.

Snaith Charitable Trust

The Chairman reported that he had received documentation with regard to the trust and it was agreed that Cllr Craggs be appointed as a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Cllr Grant.

Treasurer's report

The Treasurer sought and received approval for payment of the following accounts:-

Avondale Landscapes –maintenance of parish paths - £285.00

B Lee – clerk's salary/expenses for three months - £775.00

Any other business

Pinfold on Pinfold Lane

The Chairman reported that he was pursuing ERYC to clear the pinfold area of brambles and overgrown vegetation prior to an assessment of works necessary to improve the site with particular emphasis on the condition of the wall.

Highway matters

Cllr Craggs referred to his attention being drawn by a resident that a salt bin at Tunstall was overgrown with vegetation and it was agreed to refer the matter to ERYC should this be the case on inspection.

Cllr Dodson referred to complaints received in connection with untidy areas in South End and it was reported that ERYC was monitoring the situation.

It was agreed to purchase the usual amount of daffodil bulbs for planting in the parish highway verges again this year.

Wind Farm at Sunderland Farm

The East Riding refused planning consent but developers RES (Renewable Energy Systems) appealed and were successful. The wind farm will now be built.

RES has provided a fund for the benefit of the parish. A panel to decide how to spend the money will include three Roos parish councillors, one East Riding ward councillor, one RES member and two parish volunteers.

The Council are still seeking applications from local people to serve on the newly to be formed seven member panel which will meet on regular occasions.

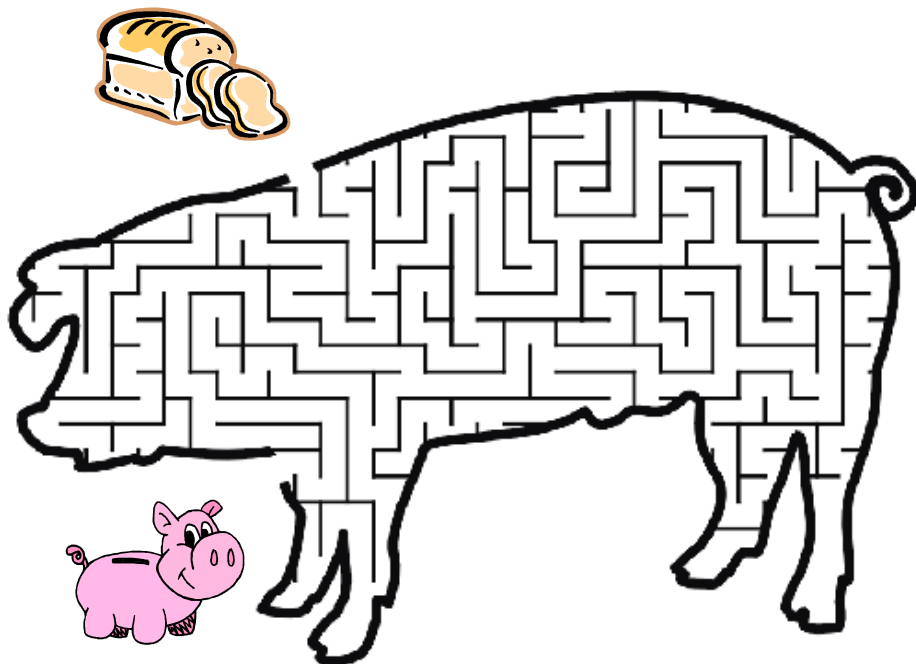
