# PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

All members were present at the meeting of 13th April, which was chaired by Councillor K.G.Grant.

#### Minutes and Matters Arising.

The Minutes were read and approved.

The following topics were discussed under 'Matters Arising'.

Litter Bins. It was decided to buy two sections of drain pipe to serve as litter bins provided that they could be fitted with standard bin liners.

The hedge at Ivy Row. At the previous meeting it had been noted that the hedge running alongside Ivy Row (The Oratory) was overgrown and in danger of obstructing the footpath. It had been agreed to ask tenants of the neighbouring allotments to cut the hedge. It was now reported that only one of the allotments was tenanted. It was agreed that the Clerk should write to the Secretary of the Parochial Church Council, owners of the land, to request that the hedge be cut.

Footpaths. There had been no reply yet to the Clerk's letter about the state of village footpaths.

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Coast Erosion. Four councillors had attended the recent exhibition at the Grand Pavilion, Withernsea. Their opinions were discussed.

#### Correspondence.

The Manager of a Community Programme sponsored by the East Yorkshire Borough Council had written offering to supply timber signs and map boards for villages. The cost ( $\pm 60$  -  $\pm 80$  each) would be for materials only. No decision was taken to pursue the matter.

#### Planning

The Council supported the following applications.

East View, South End, Roos. An application by Mr S.J. Thackeray to build a rear extension and garage.

Owl Tree Cottage, Rectory Road. An application by Mr B.P. Pawson to erect a workshop, a carport, and an extension to the house to provide a kitchen and a hetherary. kitchen and a bathroom.

Honeysuckle Cottage, Main Street. An application by Mr M. Hunt to

build a rear verandah.

#### Accounts

Payment was approved of a bill (£16.00) for the hire of the Memorial Institute for four Parish Council meetings.

#### **Any Other Business**

Roos Beck. Councillor Quarmby raised again the need for the Beck to be cleared of rubbish. If necessary, it should be fenced until it could be potted. As Borough Councillor, Councillor Winter offered to take the matter up with Mr Allan Chilton, Holderness's Assistant Director of Development (Engineering) who acts for the Borough in its role as agent for the Yorkshire Water Authority. In addition, it was agreed that the Clerk should write formally to Mr Chilton urging the need for action.

Low Road, Tunstall. Councillor Quarmby pointed out that this narrow twisting road was often flooded and that the width was inadequate for vehicles to pass each other without running dangerously on to the verge.

The Council noted that, in approving the planning application to extend Sand-le-Mere, they had stressed the need to improve the approach roads to Tunstall. It was agreed that the Clerk should write on the matter to Mr. Sowerby, the Area Surveyor at Hedon. The letter was also to include reference to the potholes in Hodgson Lane and to the hazardous surface of Pilmar Lane where the road had been dug up to repair a gas pipe.

#### Last Meeting of Present Council

The Chairman remarked that this was the last meeting of the Parish Council before the election on 7th May. Councillor Quarmby pointd out that Councillor Benson was not standing for re-election (after service extending over fourteen years) and other members wished him well on his retirement from the Council. The Chairman said that, with eleven nominations for nine Council places, there would be a ballot and it would be for the electorate to decide what new faces there might be at the next meeting.

(The council members who are standing for re-election are: J.R. Beal, M. Cheeseman, J.R. Clark, T.K. Cook, K<sub>0</sub>G. Grant, J.C. Priest, J.D. Quarmby, and G.E. Winter. Three other candidates have been nominated: A.G. Bowden, I.B. Broom, and L. Helliwell.)

The first meeting of the newly-elected council will be held on Monday 14th May at 7.30 p.m. in the Memorial Institute. Members of the public always welcome.

#### Roos F.C. 'A' - League Champions!

From mid-March onwards Roos had their eyes on the championship of Division 9. In spite of sterling work in successive weeks, the issue was not decided until their very last match against Thoresby Y.C. on Sunday 26th April. Meanwhile,.

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Away to Amy Johnson Y.C. on 22nd March, Roos won much more comfortably than the 2-1 scoreline suggests. After being behind early in the game, Roos fought back well to equalise through Nick Derbyshire and then to get the winner from Dave Hampton five minutes from the end. Unfortunately, the following week, in the big crunch match at home to fellow promotion-contenders Waterloo 'B', Roos lost to a single goal scored with a speculative wind-assisted shot from 30 yards which gave no chance to Pete Dearing in goal. the goal back, the Waterloo defence held out, assisted mainly by an excellent performance by their goalkeeper and some rather indifferent finishing by the home forwards.

This defeat meant that the best Roos could hope for was to become joint league champions. This could be achieved if Waterloo lost one of their remaining games or Roos won all theirs. Roos were determined on the latter and set about their task with relish.

On the evening of Tuesday 15th April, at home to Y.E.B., in a match played for 4 points, Roos gave an excellent all-round performance and emerged worthy 6-1 winners. Dave Cowell had probably his best-ever game for the first team, scoring a first-half hat-trick of goals, two of which were excellently taken. The other goals came from Carrick (2) and Derbyshire.

This success was followed on Sunday 19th April with another clinical demolition of the opposition, this time Cross Keys 'A'. The final score was 4-1. Dave Hampton scored two of the goals: one a well-taken penalty and the other an excellently-taken goal after a brilliant defence-splitting pass from 'Leb' Battye. The other two came from a Nick Derbyshire special from 25 yards and a superb volley by 'Leb' who crashed the ball into the net after it had been 'cleared' to him by a hard-pressed Cross Keys defence.

At last, on 26th April, Roos 'A' clinched a share of the Division 9 title with a hard-earned 3-0 win over a lively Thoresby Youth Club. On a bone-hard and badly-rutted home pitch Roos proved to be the sharper team in front of goal and fully deserved their victory on the day.

Although Thoresby had nothing to play for, they performed very spiritedly, especially for the first twenty minutes, and put the Roos defence under considerable pressure.

under considerable pressure. However, Roos weathered the storm and took the lead five minutes before half-time with a superbly-taken header by Leb Battye from a corner kick.

The second half continued in much the same vein as the first. Both sides had chances to score but good goalkeeping by both keepers kept the

scoreline at 1 -0.

But then a very timely substitution brought Mark Nesti on to the field to replace the admirable Paul McKinley who had picked up an injury early in the second half. The switch proved to be the turning-point of the match. Mark almost scored with his first kick and made no mistake with his second chance, calmly tucking his shot into the bottom corner of the net

from twelve yards. This goal took all the pressure off Roos and knocked the stuffing out of Thoresby, whose heads went down.

Nick Derbyshire then sealed the game for Roos with a thunderous shot from the edge of the six-yard area after being set up by a good cross from 'Nibbs' Carrick.

This win has crowned another excellent season for Roos 'A', whose players have all performed admirably throughout, none more so than Leb Battye, Andy Bailey, Stu Blenkin and Steve Foster.

Nick Derbyshire wins this season's leading goal-scorer award with 22 goals, followed by last season's winner, Dave Hampton, with 14 and Dave Cowell with 12.

At the end of another fine season for Roos I should like to take this opportunity to thank, on behalf of all the club members, Geoff and Lesley Prest of the Black Horse for all the assistance they have once again given us in our fund-raising efforts and for providing us with sandwiches every Sunday lunch-time. Their contribution to the success of Roos F.C. is a valuable one and is very much appreciated.

#### **Playing Field Committee**

The Spring Draw on 8th March produced a net profit of £178.40. The Sponsored Family Walk scheduled for 12th April had to be post-

poned because parts of the route had been made impassable by the gales and heavy rain over the previous two days. It took place - in glorious weather - a fortnight later on 26th April.

The circular route - roughly eight miles long - led from Roos south and east to Rimswell; then via Black Mill and Waxholme to Sand-le-Mere; and from there by the public footpath across the fields back to Roos Main Street opposite the Roos Arms.

Some twenty walkers of all ages set out, equipped with a well-designed sketch map and notes compiled by Gordon Green - who unfortunately was unable to take part owing to illness. (We wish him a speedy recovery). All completed the walk, some more quickly than others, the earliest having done so in about 2½ hours.

The weather was excellent, sunny but fresh, and the ground underfoot was firm after two or three days of clear skies and relatively high temperature. Those who took part had an enjoyable time raising money for the Playing Field Committee. Thanks to them and to the people who sponsored them. The Committee's chairman, Stewart Wilson, estimates that about £80 will have been raised.

#### **Roos Memorial Institute**

It was reported in 'The Holderness Gazette' on 17th April that a grant of £3,000 had been awarded to the Memorial Institute to help pay for the planned extension and renovation. Sadly this information was incorrect and sadly it has not yet been corrected in the 'Gazette'.

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The Institute Committee did indeed apply for a grant through the Community Council of Humberside, who make recommendations for grant aid to the Education Authority (Post-Compulsory Section). They had been led to believe that they had a good chance of being given help. However, they were later informed that no grant would be made.

Naturally, the misinformation in the 'Gazette' has irritated the Committee since it will lead people to assume that there is no further need for fund-raising. This is far from the truth. As this article goes to the printer, the Committee still need £600 to reach the target required for material costs before N.A.C.R.O. will begin work.

Before this newsletter appears, another major fund-raising event will have taken place - the May Fayre and Mini-Market on 2nd May - and perhaps a substantial amount will have been raised to close the £600 gap. It is likely, however, that there will still be a relatively small balance to find. So near and yet so far! So near and yet so far!

It has been suggested that one way to close the gap is to invite people to offer short-term loans -£10, £25, £50,... Any such loans would be repaid within a few months. They might make all the difference: it would be better to get the renovation work started during good weather than to delay until the autumn or winter for lack of the last few pounds. The actual amount still needed will be clearer after the May Fayre. Meanwhile, anyone willing to offer a loan for this worthwhile purpose is asked to contact the Institute Treasurer, Mrs Jean Jackson, at Roos House, Main Street (Phone: 70808).
