Roos Parish Council

Councillor G.E. Winter chaired the meeting of 11th July. All members were present except for Councillors Cook and Quaraby, who sent their apologies.

Minutes

Minutes of the meeting of 13th June were approved.

Highways. County Councillor Croft had reported that 1st September was the closing date for tenders for roadworks in Roos. Councillors were concerned that the work should cover the known needs; Councillor Grant said that resurfacing before road edges were repaired would be a waste of time; Councillor Clark referred to standing water after rain on the road into Tunstall; Councillor Bowden urged that, as the Parish Council had agreed, kerbs should be fitted on the main road through Roos. It was hoped to discuss these matters (and the status of Dove Lane) with a representative of the Highways Department before work was carried out. Meanwhile, though specifications for tender would already have been issued, the Clerk was asked to write again to stress the need for kerbs and repairs to road edges before resurfacing.

Coast Protection. Councillor Helliwell observed that no decision had been taken about the coast protection scheme. It was decided by six votes to none, with one abstention, not to contribute to the cost since the parish could not afford a significant contribution.

North End Garage. The Chairman reported that the application to store scrapped cars had been turned down by the Planning Department - he assumed because the site was outside the development area indicated in the Roos Village Plan. He also assumed that the Environmental Officer would now monitor the use of the site. Other councillors were not so sanguine.

Parish Meeting

Councillor K.G. Grant, who had chaired it, reported that the meeting had been attended by five councillors, the Parish Clerk, and eighteen members of the public. (The meeting was reported in the July issue of "The Rooster").

Best-Kept Village Competition. Councillors noted the lack of enthusiasm to enter the "Beautiful Britain in Bloom" competition and the allegation that daffodils

planted along Pilmar Lane had been damaged by vehicles running on to the verge.

"The Village Green". Some residents had wanted to remove the seat at the corner of Main Street and Pilmar Lane. They complained of serious nuisance from young people congregating there. The Council did not agree that moving the seat would eliminate the alleged nuisance. It was in any case a matter for the police. As Councillor Priest argued, it was known that other residents were anxious to retain the seat. As to landscaping and other work (as indicated in a sketch by Mr Arthur Allott some years ago), the Council rejected Councillor Helliwell's proposal to ask the Highways Department to discuss such a specific scheme. Instead, they favoured an amendment from Councillor Grant that a meeting be sought with the Highways Department before the next Parish Council meeting to discover what Highways would do to fulfil their responsibility to keep the site tidy.

Payments were approved for; Hire of Memorial Institute for meetings; £18.00 (2 @ £4; 2 @ £5); Cost of Account Book; £13.60; Audit Fee; £21.85.

Outstanding Items

Parish Notice Board. The Clerk had the provision of a new board in hand. The existing site might not be available since the property was to be sold. Most councillors favoured an alternative site. The Chairman undertook to enquire about one alternative.

Any Other Business

Councillor Clark urged that the letter to the Highways Department should refer to the need to repair potholes, some of which were very dangerous.

Public Session

Criticism of "The Rooster"

There was a complaint that residents who raised topics in the public session were sometimes identified by name in newsletter reports. The Chairman ruled that this was not a matter for the Parish Council but allowed Councillor Helliwell, as Editor, to deal with the point.

He said that he would always wish to avoid embarrassment to individuals and opinions were sometimes reported without attribution. However, if a person expressed a view at a public meeting, he or she would normally expect to be reported - some persons would object if they were not.

It was then argued that the reporting of the public sessions was a recent innovation. Councillor Helliwell pointed out that public sessions had always been reported and no one had previously objected.

A further complaint was that too much space was taken up with Parish Council matters. If people wanted to know about the Parish Council they should attend the meetings. Councillor Helliwell agreed that reports of meetings were seldom riveting but said that one of the main aims in establishing the newsletter was to provide regular information about Council affairs. Many people seemed to approve of the reports. Few would be interested in all of a particular report but many might be keen to learn about issues that concerned them. For this reason it was hard to know what to leave out. If the reports were more selective, they would be accused of bias.
