TWELVE MONTHS ON FLOOD UPDATE

I am pleased to inform everybody that a storm overflow pipe which runs between the area south of Dove Lane to the open beck north of Cherry Hill Park has been satisfactorily completed.

This particular project will be a major beneficial improvement for the village of Roos, as we are now in a much better position to prevent any future severe flooding occurring. The pipe starts in Dove Lane and crosses through three gardens finishing in the open beck at the back of Cherry Hill Park. The pipe is over 80 metres in length and will act as a back-up to the village beck and existing drainage systems in periods of high rainfall and flooding.

The Parish Council are very pleased with the work carried out and would like to thank the three homeowners in Cherry Hill Park whose gardens were disrupted in allowing the project to be completed. This scheme together with the improvements to many other parts of the village drainage system has shown the determination of the Parish Council to implement the Taylor Report trying to reduce the threat of further flooding.

I can also report that ERYC will soon be implementing a full camera survey of the potted section of the beck at their expense. There has also been a manhole inspection chamber constructed in the area between the houses of Dimples Cottage and the Paddock, by Yorkshire Water. A considerable amount of work has also taken place at the entrance to Greenacre Park which flooded on a regular basis. A full camera survey was undertaken to ascertain the problem and all necessary work has now been completed to hopefully alleviate this problem for the future.

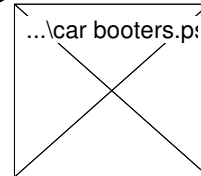
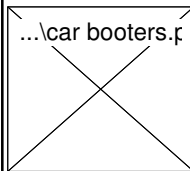

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TUNSTALL NEWS

All Saints' Church: When someone said that the Church ceiling needed painting it seemed like a good idea. It was definitely a good idea, but we just underestimated how much effort it would take and what the project entailed. We set up a volunteer task force of six, Christine and John Dobson-Youngman, Irene and David Fox and Christine and Stephen Midgley, who donned overalls and set to work. Fortunately, we had some lightweight scaffolding, which reached twenty feet up to the wooden rafters. David was the daredevil of the group, he showed no fear and was able to scale the dizzy heights. He climbed to the top and actually sat on the beams to carry out the necessary repairs, while the rest looked up in awe. Memories of his days at sea climbing the ships' masts came flooding back. Stephen, who is not a great fan of heights, cleaned and painted the lower roof rafters and top side walls, while John carried out the necessary repairs to plaster. The girls worked on the ground levels, painting walls and cleaning and polishing where required.

Dust and debris, plaster and paint, the whole team were covered in it. The original specification was just to paint the ceiling. However, in the end, we just carried on painting and cleaning everything in sight, including the stone floors and brass candlesticks.

The reason the PCC started the project was that there was to be a wedding in July and we wanted All Saints' to look its best. We all had a great time and were surprised at how much was accomplished in a reasonably short time. The Archdeacon of the East Riding, The Venerable David Butterfield, was visiting the church while the repairs were in progress and wrote a very complimentary letter thanking us for the generous support from the local community. It was a very rewarding experience and a great team effort.

Tunstall Village Hall: Once the first ray of sunshine appears it highlights how much work is required outside the village hall, maintenance projects, grass and hedges to be cut and lots of weeding. The Village Hall Group held a work party at the end of May to spruce up the community garden in time for our forthcoming programme of events. The grass was cut, lawn edges trimmed, garden borders weeded and shrubs pruned. We also laid shingle and paving slabs by the entrance to the Hall. Alec of Avondale

No not a knight of the Round Table more like a night in the Black Horse.

Alec Dodson:- Councillor; Chairman, Rooster Association; Chairman, South Holderness Gardening Club; Secretary, Withernsea Homing Society; and Vice-President, Yorkshire Middle Route Combine of Pigeon Societies.

Born: 13th August 1942 in Hull.

He moved to Burstwick in 1953 at the age of 11 and attended Keyingham school until moving to Withernsea High School which he left in July 1959 at the age of 16

His original career choice was to be a poultry farmer. However this meant leaving home to work in Lincolnshire where many large poultry farms existed.

Whilst at school his mentor was the late Harry Waller, whom many Roos residents will remember. He taught gardening. So with gardening now in mind he got out his bike and set off to visit market gardens in the area seeking employment. A couple of hours later he had been successful, starting on the following Monday at Preston Nurseries, not to be confused with Sandhill Nursery which was only in its infancy. Preston Nurseries was owned by George Caley, local Farmer and Auctioneer and they grew four crops, Celery, Tomatoes, Cucumbers and Mushrooms. He stayed there 15 months. The work was hard but enjoyable and very rewarding seeing the crops grown and then harvested. There were 15 permanent staff employed and around 20 casual employees during harvesting. This was also the time when he met his wife Margaret, who lived next door to the nursery and came to work there. She lived the nearest but Alec says that she only managed to arrive on time by eating her Weetabix en route and leaving her dish in the hedge to be collected on the way home.

In the summer of 1960 his father told him that he really needed a trade. The local parks department in Hull were advertising for apprentices so he applied. He was successful and although the normal apprenticeship was five years, the 15 months he had already spent at the nursery was to count as a probationary period. On the 14th November 1960 he went to work at East Park as a fully-fledged member of the Hull Corporation Parks, Cemeteries and Allotments Department. He signed his indentures and promised to serve the Lord Mayor, Alderman and citizens of Hull. The journey to work involved a bus ride on the Connor and Graham bus which went down Hedon Road. These buses were based at Easington and

were rivals to EYMS, cheaper but ancient and with no refinements such as heating or passenger doors. The bus stopped outside the Jail and he had to walk the rest of the way down Southcoates Lane. Work started at 7.30 am but on his first day he was there at 7.

The messroom was a fairly new brick building, but inside was something of a time-warp. Around the walls was an array of green and silver-painted park seats and an equally interesting selection of wooden kitchen tables and at one side was a cast-iron stove of gigantic proportions being lit by an elderly labourer who came in early every morning to open up and light the fire. A search for a suitable seat was in vain as the workers came in and seated themselves in time-honoured positions gained after several years' service. It soon became obvious that his position was to be near the door, draughty, with the added task of closing the door when it was left open.

The Foreman he reported to was named Mr T Baker an archetypal gardener with grey hair. His counterpart based at East Park was Mr D East and in his innocence Alec thought that the park had been named after him. Mr East was the District Foreman and covered the entire area east of the river Hull on his bicycle and supervised about 60 men. Both the men shared a 12ft x 8ft office and smoked pipes. A hatch in the wall served as a communications outlet which was just as well due to the smoke and the strong smell of tobacco.

Alec was allocated to the Rock Garden Team which consisted of a charge-hand, a labourer and an apprentice and even in the early 60's demarcation was still common as only gardeners were allowed to use a trowel, but a labourer could use a dibber.

The apprenticeship scheme was based around spending several months in each section. This made for a good grounding in practical skills. Also if you did not get on with the foreman a move was beneficial to all concerned.

The four parks were self-contained and grew all their own plants and the rivalry between them to produce the best display was intense. It also had the advantage that if a crop of wallflowers failed in one park, the others could rally round to make up the shortfall.

Most of the gardeners were very helpful to the up-and-coming apprentices. Many were self-taught or had been in private service at a stately home. Several had also attended that other University of Life, the armed forces and loyalty, discipline and tidiness were paramount in their approach to work. The various sections of the department tended to specialize so that gave the apprentice the chance to further his knowledge. In his final year as an apprentice he successfully applied for a full-time course in horticulture at Askam Bryan Nr York and so at 21 it was back to college.

Tangy Lemon Mousse

Ingredients Serves 4

½ packet of lemon jelly
150g/5oz lemon or orange yogurt
150g/5oz natural yogurt
300ml/½ pint milk
Glacé cherries and angelica leaves for decoration.

The lemon jelly can be replaced by orange or strawberry and glacé cherries and angelica leaves by fresh fruit and mint or chocolate leaves



Method

1. Cut the jelly into cubes and put in a bowl with four tablespoons of water.
2. Put the bowl over a pan of simmering water and heat, stirring occasionally until jelly has dissolved. Allow to cool without setting.
3. Whisk in the yogurts and milk until frothy. Pour into individual glasses or a serving dish. Leave to set.
4. Serve decorated with glacé cherries and angelica leaves

***Alec's Patch ...* By Alec Dodson**

Propagation:

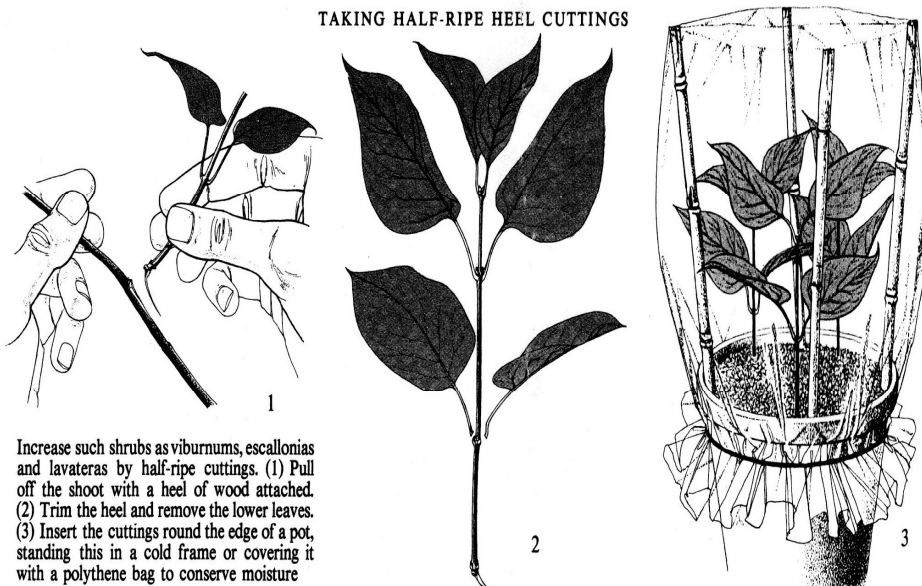
Midsummer is a good time to increase your shrubs by taking half-ripe cuttings. Choose a sturdy side shoot about 3" long, green at its tip and stiff at the base, with about 3 pairs of leaves. The cutting should be taken below a leaf joint where there is a store of food and the lower leaves removed.

The diagram shows heeled cuttings or as the old gardeners called them Irishman's cuttings. Dipping the base of the cutting into a rooting hormone can prevent rotting until roots are established, but is not essential. Use seed and cutting compost or make up a mixture of soil and sand.

Examples of shrubs that can be rooted this way are:-

TAKING HALF-RIPE HEEL CUTTINGS



Increase such shrubs as viburnums, escallonias and lavateras by half-ripe cuttings. (1) Pull off the shoot with a heel of wood attached. (2) Trim the heel and remove the lower leaves. (3) Insert the cuttings round the edge of a pot, standing this in a cold frame or covering it with a polythene bag to conserve moisture



Roos Parish Council Meeting 14th July 2008

All Councillors were present. Inc. Councillor Pickering and Officer Gerry Frisby.

The June minutes were approved. Extracts below.

The full minutes are posted in the parish notice boards.

Proposed sale of land at Manor Farm Tunstall

The Clerk reported that together with Councillor Grant he had met with the prospective purchasers and had informed them of the absolute title granted to the Council and that an approach had been made to an estate agent/ land valuer to ascertain the land value. The matter is ongoing and an update will be given at the next meeting.

Hodgson Lane

The Chairman and Clerk had attended the ERYC Overview and Scrutiny Committee meeting on 4th July at which the petition had been heard and sympathetically received. An ERYC officer had now been assigned to draw up plans for its improvement

Parish Plan

Tree-planting - The Chairman reported that a further meeting with Stephen Robinson of HEYwoods was soon to take place at which Michael Brown of ERYC Highways would attend to discuss planting on roadside verges.

Emergency Plan

In View of Councillor Cracknell's absence it was agreed to leave any further discussions until the next meeting.

It was reported that the James Reckitt Charity had awarded a £500 grant towards the cost of implementing the plan and it was agreed that Mrs Earle be thanked for her efforts in securing the award.

Parish paths

Councillors Coupe and Dodson reported on the various costings for producing the parish paths leaflet in both mono and colour and it was agreed that a sample copy be placed in the notice boards, that an article be placed in "The Rooster" and that a decision be made at the next meeting as to action to be taken.

Flooding and related matters.

Storm overflow pipe at Cherry Hill Park, camera survey of potted section of Roos Beck and manhole inspection chamber. *(See front page)*

The Chairman reported on the recent meeting with the Environment Agency arising from the development at Roos Beck adjacent to 3 Beckside Manor at which the Agency reiterated that the works did not contravene the requirements of the Land Drainage Act for consent for specific works.

Proposed Tedder Hill Wind Farm

The Conservation addendum which has now been provided by E.ON to ERYC was circulated for members' individual scrutiny. The Clerk had requested an extension of time from ERYC for consultation and this had been granted.

ERYC matters

Receipt of a reply from ERYC was reported apologising for the lack of further consultation with the Council on winter gritting at Southfield Lane together with a response that the lane does not meet the necessary criteria but that consideration would be given to providing further salt boxes along the highway.

It was also reported that the damaged footpath at Hazledene, South End, Roos, had now been satisfactorily repaired.

East Riding Local Development Framework

The Core Strategies and Options document received from ERYC was produced which had been completed by Councillors Coupe and Cracknell and subject to further additional comments and the Chairman reporting that an extension of time had been allowed by ERYC, it was agreed that when fully complete the document be sent back to ERYC for consideration.

Hilston Road, Roos and standing water at Southfield Lane, Tunstall

Receipt of a reply from the Area Engineer of ERYC was reported which stated that the pipe near Glebe Farm would be inspected and jetted if necessary and that ways of alleviating the problem of standing water at Southfield Lane would be investigated.

Fly-tipping - Beechwood Views

It was reported that ERYC had sent letters to residents of properties in Beechwood Views arising from the fly-tipping of garden waste previously reported reminding them of the consequences of their actions and also that an appropriate warning sign would be displayed advising the public that fly tipping is illegal.

Planning

Appeal

Erection of a 2kw wind turbine on a 9 metre tapered tower at Manor Cottage, Main Street, Tunstall.

It was reported that an appeal had been made to the Planning Inspectorate following refusal of the above planning application.

Applications

Erection of 1 no dwelling at land east of The Paddock, South End, Roos for Vidi Vici.

A communication was reported from the agent of the above applicant requesting a meeting with the Council to discuss the proposed development of the above site. After discussion it was agreed to deny the request at this time as it was considered to be inappropriate in view of the above pending application and the awaited ERYC Flood Review Panel report and the consequences outlined in the Taylor report for the particular area.

Proposed construction of the Humber Gateway Offshore Wind Farm 8km east of the Holderness Coast for E.ON.

It was agreed after members had individually considered the above that in principle no objections be made to the above proposal.

Any other Business

Garage at Lamb Lane over Roos Beck

It was reported that enquiries were still ongoing as to the ownership of the above.

Trees at Dove Lane and Rectory Road

It was agreed to refer the above trees which require trimming back to ERYC at the forthcoming meeting with representatives to discuss tree-planting opportunities.

Public Session

Mrs D. Cook referred to Southfield Lane being a school bus route and she was advised that it was understood that the lane was not being used for this purpose at present. Mrs Cook also commented on the council's decision not to meet the agent in relation to proposed development at The Paddocks, South End, Roos.

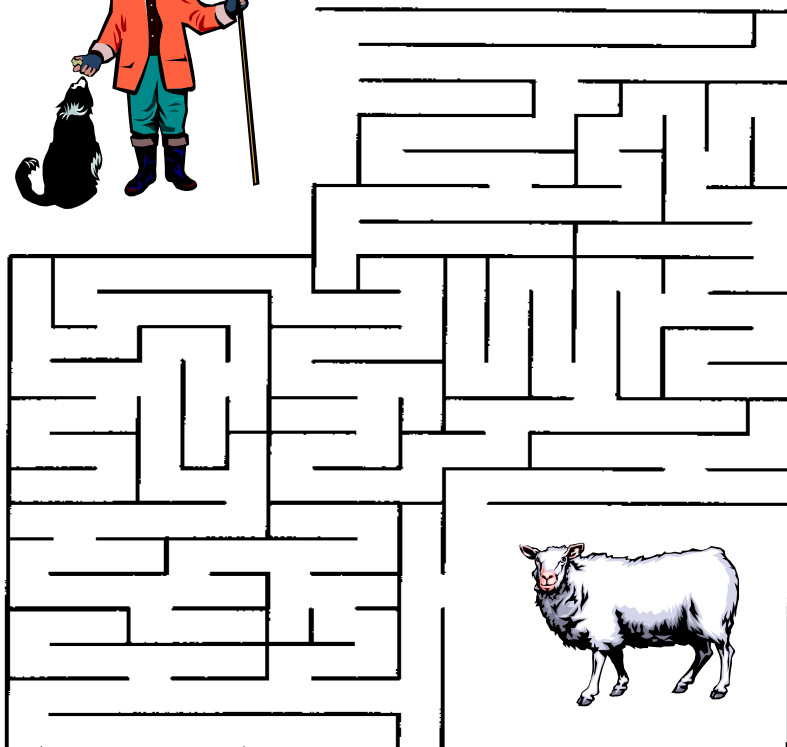
