

THE EMERGENCY PLAN

On Sunday morning 28th September the Emergency Plan Committee held a 'Table Top Exercise' at the Tunstall Village Hall. The 'Emergency' chosen was a prolonged heavy snowfall that cut off the villages in the parish for several days, instead of the more obvious choice of flooding.

The exercise commenced with a very realistic Radio Humberside adverse weather report. Power lines and telephone wires were already down and communication by mobile phone was unreliable, with the network eventually closing down altogether. Water supplies were frozen and food supplies rapidly running out. The exercise looked at how our Emergency Plan would cope with the situation, with particular reference to communication, opening up the local road network, and the welfare of the young, old and vulnerable, especially those who may need medical attention.

The exercise was planned by Cllr Jackie Cracknell, Chair of the Emergency Committee' and Matthew Groves of ERYC, who led the exercise. The Parish Council was represented by Chair Cllr David Winter and Cllrs Dodson and Craggs. Willis Ainley represented the Community. The whole exercise was observed by two members of Garton Parish Council.

Later Cllr Cracknell received a communication from Matthew Groves to say how pleased he was with the exercise and how The Emergency Plan represented best practice.

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Cookery Corner By Ann Coupe

<u>SOUP FOR HALLOWEEN</u> <u>Pumpkin Soup</u>

For an extra kick, replace the mild curry powder with extra hot. It's guaranteed to spice things up. Serves 4 Takes 10-15 mins

preparation, 30 mins cooking

<u>Ingredients</u>

2oz/50g butter 1 onion peeled and chopped 1 clove garlic, peeled and crushed 1lb/450g pumpkin flesh 1-2 tbsp mild curry powder ½ pt/300ml good chicken stock made from a chicken stock cube 2oz/50g long grain rice 400ml can coconut milk Salt and freshly ground black pepper

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Melt butter in a large saucepan. Sauté onion and garlic together for five minutes until pale golden brown.
- 2. Stir in the pumpkin, lower heat and simmer covered for about 5-8 minutes before adding the curry powder.

- **3.** Pour in the stock, rice and coconut milk. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat to simmer and cook for 20 minutes or until pumpkin and rice are cooked. Take off the heat and leave to cool.
- **4.** Blend in a food processor until smooth, then reheat. Season to taste. Garnish with chives.

This soup can be eaten with Garlic Bread, Cheese Straws or even the following Cheese Crisps

Cheese Crisps Ingredients

1 ¹/₂ oz/40g Parmesan cheese, grated in long strands.

1oz/25g semi-dried cranberries

1 ¹/₂ oz/40g shelled pecans, chopped finely.

<u>Method</u>

While the soup is cooking, mix the cheese crisp ingredients together.

Place 8 spoonfuls of mixture on a nonstick baking tray or one lined with parchment paper.

Cook under a preheated grill for 2-4 minutes or until crisp. Leave to cool before peeling off the paper.

Serve with the soup.

Herbaceous Plants

October when the soil is warm and not too wet is the best time for planting perennials. Plants make new roots quickly, but make sure they are not planted too deep, the soil line indicating the previous depth by the change in colour.

Take advantage of good weather conditions to move plants to their new locations.

Ponds


Spread netting over ponds to prevent leaves falling in and to deter herons.

Hardwood Cuttings

These are taken in the autumn from trees, shrubs, gooseberries, currants, privet, climbing roses and various other plants. Cuttings are taken from the current seasons growth 9" or 12" long , pencil thick, with a clean cut below a bud. Remove leaves leaving a few at the top and if these are long a good tip is to cut them in half so they do not cover neighbouring cuttings. The cuttings should be inserted in sandy soil about 4-5 inches deep and firmed in. Hardy plants can be inserted in the open garden in a shady sheltered place, whilst more choice cuttings should be placed in a cold frame. Hardwood cuttings will normally have made roots by the following Spring when they can be planted out or potted up and grown on for a while before being planted in their permanent position.

General

From October onwards is the time to remove leaves from borders and lawns and compost them, taking care not to include diseased leaves i.e. rose leaves with black spot.

Roos Parish Council Meeting 13th October 2008

Seven members were present. Apologies from Councillors J Cracknell and B Smales The September minutes were approved. Extracts below. The full minutes are posted in the parish notice boards. Proposed sale of land at Manor Farm Tunstall

The Chairman reported that negotiations were still ongoing with the prospective purchasers.

Hodgson Lane

It was reported that the Chairman and Clerk were meeting with ERYC on 11th September to progress the proposed improvement works on the lane.

Parish Plan

Tree-planting - The Chairman reported that HEYwoods had been notified of the Council's approval of the proposals with a request that no trees be planted on Tunstall Village Green.

Emergency Plan

Councillor Cracknell reported that arrangements were being made for the table- top style exercise on 28th September at Tunstall Village Hall and the Clerk confirmed that neighbouring parish councils would be invited to attend. Councillor Craggs enquired whether the Emergency Planning Committee would be meeting prior to the event and Councillor Cracknell confirmed in the affirmative.

Parish paths

It was reported that 50 copies of the Parish Paths leaflet had been initially produced at a cost of $\pounds 22.50$

Proposed allotments in Roos

The Clerk reported that he had been informed by ERYC that no land owned by that authority was available and that he was pursuing with ERYC an area of land which had recently been the subject of a planning approval at Hilston road.

Flooding and related matters

The Clerk reported receipt of a copy of the camera survey undertaken by ERYC and the subsequent report on the potted section of Roos Beck. The report was circulated for members' consideration. The accompanying disks are available from the Clerk on request.

Councillor Craggs referred to proposed flood preventative measures referred to in the Taylor Report at North End/Main Street and it was agreed that the Taylor Report be placed on the agenda for the next meeting.

The Chairman reported that progress was being made with the relevant parties on the proposed improvements to the drainage system in the vicinity of Dimples Cottage and that unfortunately recent flooding had occurred once again in the area.

Councillor Cracknell again reported that she was still awaiting feedback from ERYC on the signing off of risk assessments in relation to working in and around Roos Beck and flooded areas generally.

It was reported that ERYC had agreed to undertake improvement works to the access to the grille on Roos Beck in Lamb Lane and that it was hoped that ERYC would employ Bob Smales to clear the area of shrubs and undergrowth in the vicinity.

Parish Council liaison meeting 2008

Further correspondence was reported from ERYC in connection with the Planning liaison meeting and it was agreed that Councillors Coupe and Cracknell attend the event at County Hall on 8th October.

ERYC Task Force visit

Councillor Cracknell enquired whether gully emptying would take place during the visit and the Clerk undertook to ask ERYC and inform Councillor Cracknell directly in the matter.

Rectory Road, Roos - speeding vehicles

The Clerk reported that a meeting had been arranged with ERYC for the 11th September to consider the above.

Correspondence

East Riding Local Development Framework

A letter and enclosures was received from ERYC together with a draft Settlement Profile of Roos and an invitation to attend an event where the introduction of the general concept of Settlement Profiles and how they fit in with the LDF would be outlined to interested parties.

It was agreed that Councillor Cracknell attend the event at the Council Offices Skirlaugh on 18th September.

BT payphone at Main Street, Tunstall

Receipt of a letter from ERYC was reported on the de-commissioning of the above facility and the option given by BT of the Parish Council adopting the kiosk by allowing the Council to own the box as a village landmark at a notional purchase price of £1 and the Council attending to its future maintenance and payment of an annual electrical charge of around £17. Councillor Craggs mentioned that Tunstall Village Hall Group may be interested in maintaining the kiosk on behalf of the Council at no further expense to the Council and it was agreed that the kiosk be adopted provided that the Village Hall Group accept responsibility for its future maintenance.

ERYC parish newsletter

The latest edition of the parish newsletter was circulated amongst members.

Holderness Flood Defence Group

A letter was received from the above group asking for a donation towards the salary of a Clerk for the organisation and it was agreed to donate $\pounds 20$

It was reported that the Planning Inspectorate had dismissed the appeal on ERYC's refusal of planning permission.

Southfield Lane

It was reported that school buses had continued using the lane and Councillor Craggs referred to a bus timetable which stated that a bus route serviced Tunstall of which people were unaware and Councillor Craggs undertook to supply the Clerk with details in order that enquiries could be made.

Gullies at Hilston Road

Councillor Cracknell referred to problem gullies in the vicinity of two properties and said that the occupants had agreed to mark them in order that they could be readily identified by ERYC.

Footpath maintenance

It was agreed to ask ERYC if provision had been made in the current financial year for footpath maintenance works in Roos.

Public Session

The Chairman undertook to take up with ERYC the gully at the bottom of Church Hill and Mrs Earle expressed the hope that when the improvement to the access to the grille at Lamb Lane was completed it would not be key operated for access purposes to the site.


