'Cruel Summer'

So far this summer has been a wash out with June 2012 proving to be the wettest since records began! We were extremely fortunate to have enjoyed such a very fine day for the Jubilee celebrations, the following day being very wet and miserable. Recently several events have had to be cancelled throughout the parish. One only has to read Michael Flower's article, our gardening feature and other reports to realise just how poor the summer has been.



Just a few days ago on the 6th July the Environment Agency and ERYC issued an Amber Flood Alert for the area. The Parish Council had at least three pumps provided by local farmers and contractors on standby. Sandbags were made ready to be used and councillors monitored Roos Beck throughout the day. Fortunately the main belt of heavy rain passed us by and we missed the worst of the weather which wrecked havoc elsewhere.

However a week earlier, on June 18th two torrential rain storms hit Roos almost 5 years to the day since the flooding event of 25th and 26th June 2007 bringing fears that it was about to happen all over again! However, unlike 2007, the rain was not so long lasting and this time the major drain, Roos Beck, flowed freely. If remedial work had not taken place and the Beck regularly inspected then the grilles would almost certainly have become blocked with the risk of the problems of 2007 recurring.

Future Planning and Land Use



Readers will see from the Parish Council Report that the "Refreshed" Parish Plan is reaching a conclusion. They will also have read that the Parish Council has received documentation from ERYC inviting comment upon the various Land Bids submitted by landowners for future building development. This topic was included in the Parish Plan Questionnaire and attracted comment from some respondents.

The following outlines some of the factors being considered by ERYC in evaluating sites suitable for future building. Readers who wish to undertake some research for themselves are invited to click on the ERYC website links provided later.

Building Development

New building is subject to policies determined by Government including, for example, the Localism Act 2011. As long ago as 2006 the Roos Parish Plan indicated that ERYC was developing a Local Development Framework (LDF). This is now in its final draft stages of development and has been subject to widespread consultation. It is likely to receive Government Assent in 2013/14. It will then replace all previous policies including the Holderness District Wide Local Plan.

The Draft LDF identifies:

- Roos as a Secondary Rural Service Centre of Withernsea and projects that an average of 2.1 dwellings per annum should be built over the next 14/15 years in order to sustain the settlement and maintain its community assets
- That any proposed building development in the settlements of Tunstall, Hilston and Owstwick and the countryside outside the Development Limit will be subject to strict planning criteria and conditions which will restrict much future development

Within Roos village, further building is constrained by the current Building Development Limit, established some 25 years ago. So where should new building take place to meet the projected future need identified by ERYC to maintain the sustainability of Roos? The 'Refreshed' Parish Plan Questionnaire sought resident's opinion:



In this respect, Riparian Owners have a statutory responsibility for maintaining the stretches of Roos Beck adjoining their properties to ensure that water can flow freely.

However, on this occasion the level of rainfall was such that the drainage system within the village was fully stretched and could not adequately cope with the sheer volume of water pouring into the foul water drainage system. It was reported that some sewer covers were lifted by the pressure of water particularly in Main Street and Dove Lane where raw sewage was released which overflowed into the new storm drain.

At one point the water level in Main Street rose to the extent that Dimples Cottage was under imminent threat of flooding again. Ever since 2007 this has been an ongoing matter of worry and concern for Mr and Mrs Cook and although much remedial work has been undertaken it does not seem to have fully resolved the issue. There are believed to be particular problems with the drainage system at this point in Main Street, where a 9 inch diameter drain does not have the capacity or the level of fall to allow the volume of surface water to flow freely away into the main drainage system which is already full. Elsewhere, surface water had to be swept out of a garage in Rectory Road and there were concerns at the bottom of Chestnut Garth.

The problem seems to have become progressively worse over recent years as new house building and hard paved landscaping has increased the volume of surface water running off into the drainage system. ERYC planning approvals for building development in Roos within the Village Limit on "back land" sites, often counter to the advice of Roos Parish Council, is likely to add to the problem.

Looking further ahead, the ERYC Local Development Framework is proposing plans to allow further building development in Roos over the next 15 years or so. ERYC has produced a detailed analysis of the suitability of all the various sites submitted by landowners for proposed housing development. They identify the current drainage system to be a limiting factor.

The first outcome indicates that over 55% of respondents did not want the Building Development Limit extended, 27% did (Question 13)

Subsequently the Questionnaire asked residents for their opinion on:

- In-fill sites within Roos. (This was because recent building and planning approvals have served to detract from the 'sense of spaciousness' identified in the VDS and concern about increased water run-off since the flooding incident of 2007). (Question 12)
- The type of dwelling required. (Question 11, see Bar Chart)
- The preferred location for any future building. (Question 13a see Composite Map)


These outcomes provide contextual information for Roos Parish Council and ERYC when considering extending the current building development limit and establishing a new one!

Affordable Housing

Although the Questionnaire 2011 did not specifically ask about Affordable Housing, the Parish Plan 2005 identified a need for such development. ERYC maintains a register of requests and demand. 'Affordable Housing' is subject to specific planning criteria.



Gardening Again!



It is only July and we should all be enjoying the fruits of our labours in the Spring when we planned for a beautiful summer display and

dreamt of relaxing amongst colourful of flowers! Well, this summer has had mixed blessings! We escaped the threatened drought and apart from the wonderful Jubilee Day on 2nd June, most of the month was a washout!

The baskets and tubs of flowers may be looking a little sad now but try to prolong flowering by dead-heading the flowers regularly. Tidy up the old leaves and keep watering. Adding a little feed, such as tomato food, to the water will help boost the plants. In the flower borders there is always work to be done! The roses will need dead-heading and feeding and the lawns should be looking lush and will need mowing regularly.

It will soon be time to plan for autumn colour. An autumn flower border can be a late and lovely show. We can grow a wealth of flowers for cutting, so take up the challenge and be ready!

Plants for autumn colour:

Chrysanthemums, Helenium, Japanese Anemone, Coreopsis, Cyclamen, Michaelmas Daisy, Penstemon, Eupatorium.



Roos Woodland Group

There has been a very quick and gratifying response to the short piece published in last month's Rooster under the headline "£15,000 – Do we want to lose it"?

It will be recalled that monies have been made available by RES UK & Ireland Ltd as part of the planning agreement for Roos Wind Farm. Now a new body, Roos Woodland Group has been formed to take a lead under the chairmanship of Gerard Baker. He reports:

"Following a well attended meeting last week, a woodland group has been established which aims to apply for grants from the RES wind farm tree fund in addition to other monies. Presently, the group is liaising with the ERYC and Stephen Robinson HEYwoods Partnership Manager, and is consulting with local landowners in order to identify areas in which hedges in addition to small and larger trees could be planted.

Following the Parish Plan consultation exercise it is clear that a large majority of parishioners support additional tree planting and would support more

wildflowers being planted throughout the parish. Sadly, some of the planting that has taken place in recent years has suffered due to the trees being planted during very dry conditions. Given careful planning, we hope to be able to enhance existing planting with colour and heritage fruit varieties. Establishing new hedgerows will hopefully link existing pockets of woodland to create 'green corridors' throughout Roos and the wider parish which will ultimately benefit wildlife in addition to improving the environment for us all. Community involvement is important as it will help support bids for funding and help sustain the scheme. It is proposed to launch a 'Plant Your Family Tree' initiative which will enable families and individuals to sponsor or plant their own tree within the wider scheme. It is an opportunity to place a 'time capsule' or a plaque to commemorate their family".

Italian or Indian

Alan regularly contributes to the curriculum at Roos School. Following the pupils highly successful entry in the 'Cook for the Queen', Jubilee Competition they recently worked together on the School's 'One World' Food Event. This involved each class looking at the food typical in each of the different countries selected. Italy and India were just two of the featured countries.

"Whilst everyone nowadays loves Italian food pasta or pizzas tend to be the most popular. Gnocchi are a nice change and really easy to make, provided the potato is dry! The best way to ensure this is to use scooped out jacket potato as you can get a really dry mash this way. The tomato sauce can be used for any recipe needing a tomato base and the choice of vegetable that can be used is almost endless. The recipes can be made in larger quantities and frozen for future use.

Tony Blair was a regular summer visitor to Italy and loved Italian food. He often returned with wonderful food gifts for the kitchen, such as truffles, Italian sausages, and even trays of fresh Italian tomatoes which we cooked down to make wonderful sauces for future use. John Major was a real fan of Indian food so the Biryani recipe was in regular use. It was normally served with a fairly hot curry sauce as an accompaniment which he always liked.

Of course, the choice of meat can be changed and even shell fish can be used to suit individual taste.

Potato Gnocchi



300gm dry mashed potato

100gm plain flour

1 egg

1 egg yolk

Salt and pepper

Grated nutmeg

250ml tomato sauce

150gm grated cheese

Mix the potato with all the other ingredients whilst hot and mould into small balls and flatten slightly with a fork.

Poach in gently boiling water for approx 5 minutes until they float and drain carefully and place in an ovenproof dish.

Cover with tomato sauce and sprinkle with grated cheese and brown lightly in a hot oven.

Tomato Sauce

2 tins of plum tomatoes

500gm roasted vegetables (to include onions, carrots, courgettes, peppers)

Clove of garlic

Fresh basil

Salt and pepper

Liquidise the vegetables, tomatoes basil and garlic

Taste and season as required

Chicken Biryani



300gm basmati rice

850ml chicken stock

1 bay leaf

3 cardamom pods

4 tablespoons curry paste

2 skinless chicken breasts cut into chunks

85gm raisins

1 chopped onion

1 crushed clove garlic

Fresh coriander

Diced green pepper (optional)

2 hard boiled eggs

Fry the onions, chicken, curry paste, garlic, turmeric and cardamom in a little oil and add the washed rice and stir.

Add the hot stock and bay leaf, and gently simmer with a lid on until the rice is cooked, stirring occasionally to avoid it sticking.

Mix in the raisins and fresh coriander, check seasoning and serve in a dish with sliced boiled eggs as a garnish.

Unfortunately their truck became stuck in the mud in the churchyard, so everything had to be unloaded and carried by hand. Somehow they managed to manhandle the heavy bells up the ramps and into the church. Helen Audley takes up the story :

“Graham and Gary Audley assisted by James Blackburn and Andrew Bicknell from the Beverley and District Ringing Society masterminded the operation from high up in the bell room. At the next level down was Peter Cook and the rest of the Roos team were safely on the ground floor. Brian Rannard of the PCC who only came to take a picture or two laboured alongside the others throughout the three days.

Next morning, the former No 2 bell (which is now No 3) of the 6 was hoisted up and hung in its newly constructed frame. Then it was the turn of our much admired and photographed new bell. When it was suspended ready to be hoist up the tower I gave it a ‘ceremonial’ tap with a hammer. This was promptly followed by Gary, delivering a welcoming response from one of the bells already installed high up in the tower”.

Since April a lot of work has gone on in the bell tower to get the existing steel frame degreased, shot blasted and repainted with high specification paint in preparation for the dedication of the refurbished bells and the new Treble Bell by the Archbishop of York on September 23rd.

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
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

I need to get back into practice – my middle daughter is getting married in October, and she's asked if I could help ring the bells on the Big Day. What a strange request! 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Parish Council Minutes are published in full on Parish Notice Boards and on the parish website – roosparish.info
The following are edited extracts from the June 2012 Meeting.

Present: Cllrs. D. Winter (Chairman), W. Ainley, J. Cracknell, D. Craggs, A. Dodson, K. Tyson and J. Ward. An apology for absence was received from Cllr. B Smales. A single member of the public was also present.

1. Consideration of Councillor's declaration of interests

There were no changes declared by members to the register of interests.

2. Minutes of the meeting held on 14th May 2012

These were agreed as a true record and signed by the Chairman.

Matters arising from the minutes

3. Highway issues

A response from ERYC stated that the causes of standing water on Rectory Road near Chestnut Garth would be further investigated. The road markings on the highway over the drain at the end of Rectory Road had been inspected and after consultation with RES and several local residents who regularly use the route, it had been agreed that no action be taken at the present time.

4. Proposed upgrading of former footpath to Burton Pidsea

Cllr. Dodson reported that ERYC was endeavouring to obtain further evidence of the previous existence of the footpath in order that it could be added to the Definitive Map and Statement. Cllr. Ainley commented that an appropriate article had been published in The Rooster inviting any resident who may have information or recollections of the footpath and/or the bridge over the drain to make contact with Cllr. Dodson or any other Councillor.

5. Roos Wind Farm tree planting fund

Cllr. Cracknell commented that two schemes proposed by the Hilston & Tunstall Residents Association would be submitted for consideration for funding. Cllr. Ward reported that he would be arranging a meeting with Stephen Robinson of HEYwoods, ERYC, to discuss another proposed scheme.

6. ERYC South Holderness Association of Parish Enterprise

Cllr. Coupe reported that she had been unable to attend the meeting held at Easington in May. The Chairman and Cllr. Cracknell had attended and indicated that they would also endeavour to attend the

next meeting to be held on 21st June at Skeffling Village Hall.

7. Vehicle parking issues South End, Roos.

The Clerk read a letter received from Mrs Crombie which raised several issues in respect of the communication to local residents distributed by Cllr. Ward in relation to damage caused to the grass verges.

Cllr. Ward confirmed that he had since discussed the reasons for sending the letter to residents and that she had accepted his explanation. It was agreed that the letter be acknowledged and the contents of her letter noted.

8. Woodland adjacent to All Saints Church

The Clerk confirmed that he had written to the Parochial Church Council asking whether the woodland was surplus to its requirements. It was reported that the matter would likely be raised at the next meeting of the Parochial Church Council.

Correspondence

9. Police report

The report highlighted the theft of two mini digger buckets at the Rostun Road/Main Street junction, and, theft of a galvanised sink from a field in Pasture Lane, Tunstall.

10. ERYC Parish News

The latest edition was circulated for member's individual attention.

11. Grassed area in Pilmar Lane, Roos

A letter was received from a resident enquiring who was responsible for cutting the grass at the site. The Chairman outlined arrangements previously in place for its upkeep, following which it was agreed that ERYC be asked to consider including it in its future maintenance programme. Should this not be possible the Chairman was authorised to seek alternative arrangements.

Planning

The Clerk confirmed that there were no applications to consider or ERYC decisions to report.

12. Refresher Parish Plan

Cllr. Ainley welcomed comments on the draft report circulated earlier in respect of recommendations and an action plan for implementation.

On a related matter following receipt of ERYC documentation showing 'land bids' put forward by landowners for future building development, it was agreed that further information be provided in respect

of two of the proposed sites. Firstly, that Site 8 was not in conformity with the settlement network, and, secondly, that Site 9 may not be compatible with existing neighbourhood users, an example being the playing field facilities.

13. HM Queen's Diamond Jubilee

Cllr. Ward gave a detailed report of the highly successful events staged to celebrate the Jubilee which had all been well received by those attending them. He expressed thanks to those who had contributed in various ways but with special thanks to the Chairman and Cllrs. Coupe and Smales for their particularly valuable inputs. He further reported that the financial shortfall to be underwritten by the Council would be £535.88 including VAT which would be substantially reduced when reclaimed by the Council. The Chairman thanked Cllr. Ward and the Jubilee Committee for their outstanding efforts in ensuring highly enjoyable entertainment throughout the celebrations.

The Chairman reported that he together with Cllrs. Ainley and Coupe had presented commemorative Jubilee Mugs to pupils of Roos School.

Cllr. Ainley confirmed that the events would be especially featured in The Rooster and that he would be producing a photographic record of the celebratory events.

14. Code of Conduct

It was agreed that the Council also adopt the revised Code of Conduct recently adopted by ERYC.

15. Conservation Areas

It was agreed that the ERYC Conservation Officer Peter Hopkins be invited to attend a walkabout to view the Conservation Areas in early July.

16. Treasurer's report

The Treasurer sought and received approval for payment of the following account:- Cllr. J Ward – reimbursement of expenses incurred for Queens's Jubilee events - £535.88.

Any other business

17. Highway in South Park

It was agreed to again refer the condition of the highway to ERYC as previously reported to them by the Chairman.

18. Notice board in Main Street

Cllr. Ainley reported that comment had been made to him about the condition and accessibility of the board. It was understood that it was in reasonable condition but access to it was occasionally

prevented by parked vehicles. It was agreed to monitor the situation.

19. New litter bins

It was agreed that a further bin be provided at Hodgson Lane to supplement those to be provided for The Pinfold and in the vicinity of the church. This would be funded from the balance of monies remaining in the ERYC severe weather grant.

20. Cllr. Cracknell

Cllr. Cracknell commented that her increasing workload with ERYC particularly with Community Partnership commitments may prevent her from attending some future meetings. However, she would endeavour to attend as many as possible.

21. Police attendance

The Chairman reminded members that PCSO Jenny Gray would be attending the Annual Parish Meeting in July to discuss policing issues.

22. Public session

The Changing Seasons - 'Butterflies and birds'

Birding with Flowers

In July several garden bird species such as Blackbirds and Robins can be hard to find, as parents which have brought up as many as 3 broods undergo a major moult of their feathers. At this time they are more vulnerable to predators, so they hide away in thick vegetation until their moult is over.

In summer many birdwatchers turn their attention to Butterflies and Dragonflies. In a normal July several butterfly species should be on the wing. However, the weather has been so unseasonal that there are relatively few butterflies to be seen. However, if the weather improves then one of the butterflies we should see is still the most numerous species in the UK: the Meadow Brown. This is a fairly large butterfly to be found on virtually any un-grazed grassy verge during Summer. Although the first males can appear in late May and the final


individuals seen in October, it is at its most abundant in July and August. Like many butterflies it prefers sunnier days, but may also be encountered in overcast conditions. It may be distinguished from the similar Ringlet by a flash of orange as it sails past.

The Ringlet is a very smart, dark brown or even black butterfly, but is identified by the dark rings surrounded by gold when its wings are closed. Although it is often seen in the same habitat as the Meadow Brown, it favours shady woodland glades and the edges of damp woodland. Unlike most butterflies it can often be seen on the wing in drizzly conditions.

Much brighter than either of these two species is the Gatekeeper, or Hedge Brown. This is a smaller butterfly and has bright orange areas, bordered with brown on all of its wings. 40 years ago it was only found as far north as South Yorkshire, but in recent years

it has extended its range and its flight period (late June to late August) and is currently colonising Cleveland and Cumbria. The Gatekeeper is found in similar grassy habitats to Meadow Browns and Ringlets, but is often seen fighting other Gatekeepers around Bramble flowers.

There will still be some butterflies to see when my wildlife classes resume on the 4th of September. For more than two hours a week encounter the natural world as a completely new sensual experience. You'll be amazed at what can be found just by listening, and looking looking! In the Autumn we'll be paying special attention to birds migrating along the East coast & the Humber estuary. Specific birds we will be hoping to see include: Bearded Tit, Hobby, Bittern, Kingfisher, Barn Owl,

Red Kite, and nearly 100 others! So, if you are interested in learning more about your local wildlife in beautiful and secluded venues for less than £10 a week, then this is the course for you! We visit a different local hotspot each week and identify all the birds and as much other wildlife as we can.

Although Wednesday, Thursday, & Friday mornings are pretty fully booked, there are vacancies on some of the other sessions with most vacancies on Tuesday mornings, but if afternoons are preferred, there are spaces currently available on Tuesdays, Wednesdays & Fridays.
