Next book club is on 16th August, 7.30pm at The Nancy in Burton Pidsea and the craft club is meeting on 27th September at the Institute.



Annual Parish Meeting 2017. This gives opportunity for members of the parish to raise issues with the Council.

- It was suggested that future meetings be held outside the school holidays and harvest times. It was agreed to review the calendar accordingly.
- A request for a footpath on Rectory Road has been raised on several previous occasions and discussed with the ERYC. The estimated costs were prohibitively expensive.
- It was asked whether wind farm community fund monies could be directed towards such initiatives. It was noted that each fund awarding panel is constrained by their specific Constitution and Legal Agreements established between the Developer and the ERYC. Discussion highlighted the need for groups and organisations to join together to develop an overall strategy for community initiatives across the parish and wider area of benefit.

### **Roos Parish Council Report: August 2017**

Parish Council Minutes are published in full on Parish Notice Boards and on the parish website – roosparish.info

**Proposed bus stops -** Main Street. It was reported that ERYC had received several objections and comments which noted that the location is very close to residential properties, shops and pubs in the busiest part of the village. Additionally, it was likely to create a blind spot for drivers exiting Hodgson Lane. A less disruptive location will be identified further up the road.

Pilmar Lane A few objections had been received from some residents of Eastfield Estate.

A location adjacent to the bench seat would cause least disturbance.

### Planning applications

Display of 1 externally illuminated fascia sign and 1 non-illuminated hanging sign at 1 Main Street, Roos - 17/02219/PAD - No objection.

Erection of two storey extension to side and associated alterations at Butterfly Cottage, 1 North End Road, Roos - 17/02426/PLF - No objection.

Erection of Log Cabin as a replacement dwelling for 2 Coastguard Cottages, at land west of Parkfield, Seaside Lane, Tunstall - 17/02566/PLF. - No objection. (It was noted that this application would be considered in relationship to ERYC 'Coastal Policies' - coastal erosion and 'roll-back' conditions.

### Planning decision

Erection of single storey extension to rear and side at Manesty, 6, South Park, Roos. Approved **Any other business** 

### Tedder Hill Wind Farm Fund re-launch.

The fund is now open to receive new applications with a closing date of October 31<sup>st</sup> 2017. It is proposed to move the annual timetable for applications to the Autumn.

Community Chest - In line with emerging ERYC policies it was agreed to consider on-line applications at any time during the year for funding of projects and items costing up to £500. (subject to available funding). The financial limit is set to avoid the need to submit three quotations. Current fund balances: £25,393 (sustainability criteria) and £7,260 (broad criteria).

### **Tunstall Coastal Defence Scheme**

Enquiries were raised about the silting adjacent to the drain outfall into the Humber at Stone Creek and its impact upon the Tunstall Coastal Defence Scheme. It was agreed to invite representatives of the Internal Drainage Board and ERYC to a meeting in October/November to provide a progress report. Date of next meeting: 11<sup>th</sup> September at 7.30 in the Memorial Institute.

## ROOS WOODLAND GROUP

As the summer draws on, the apples are ripening on not only the Roos Woodland Group trees, but on those in gardens around the village. Once again we will be collecting apples to press into 'Roos Juice' to sell around the villages to raise money for our tree planting efforts. If you have apples to offer, please let us know - and also of course if you would like to offer assistance picking. Everyone that gives us apples, or helps, gets a fair share of the juice made. We will aim to pick apples in the first three weeks of October. At the same time in the autumn we will be planting spring and autumn flowering bulbs around the village paid for by our recent grant from the Roos Windfarm Fund. If you have a sunny grass verge that you would like to plant with crocus and other bulbs, please let us know and we can get some to you. Equally, if you would just like to help us plant, please get in touch - we've trees to plant as well! Planting sessions involve a fun hour or two with refreshments provided. Later in the autumn, on October 28th, we will be hosting a winter. feast in the Village Memorial Institute - keep the date free in the diary as it is bound to sell out quickly.
